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A Relation of the taking of Sign in Dalmatia by the Forces of the Republick of Venice.

HE Proveditore-General Cornaro and the Prince of Parma having drawn together near Scalona 1000 Horse and 5000 Foot of regulated Troops, and 5000 Morlaques commanded by the Chevalier Jance, with the Artillery and Ammunition necellary for a Siege, held a Council of War, whereit was unanimoufly refolved to attack Sign. Accordingly the march was directed thither through very difficult ways, infomuch that Men were forced to draw the Cannon, the steep passages over the Mountains not permitting them to make use of Horses. The 23 of September they arrived before Sign, scituated on a Rock, and fortified with a good Wall, and a strong Castle; The Venetians broke ground the same day, and raised three Batteries of two pieces of Cannon and one Mortar each, with which they began the 25th to batter the Wall of the Town and the Castle, and in few hours dismounted the Enemies Cannon which were planted on the great Rondel. The Proveditore-General furnmoned the Belieged, offering them the fame conditions that had been granted to Navarin and Modon; but the Commandant who was a Dalmatian Renegado, answered, That he would defend the place to the last; and would lose his Life with the Town, which the Grand Signior had entrusted in his Hands; adding, that he expected speedy relief from the Basia of Ancegovini, who was within 12 hours march of the place. The Truce occasioned by this Parley latted near three hours, after which the Besiegers began to fire again from their Cannon and Mortais, which they contimued to do the 26th and 27th; The 28th the breaches being large enough, and the Palifadoes and other Decences the Enemy had made behind them, being beaten down, the Prince of Parma appointed 500 Foot under the command of the Marquis Borra, accompanied with divers Volontiers, and supported by a Reserve of 400 Men to give an Affault; The Turks steing them approach, put themselves into a posture to oppose them, and with Grenadoes and Stones, withstood the efforts of the Affailants above three hours, but these being encouraged by the prefence of their chief Commanders, at last gained the Breach, and drove the Enemy into their second Retrenchment, and into the Castle, where they put up a white Flag, which the Commandant pulled down with his own hand; The Assailants soon after forced the second Retrenchment, as likewise the Castle, and cut in pieces about 250 Traks who composed the Garison, sparing only some few Women and Children: The Marquis de Borri endeavoured to hinder the flaughter, but the Chevalier Janco to revenge the death of come of his Relations killed in the Affault, but all

he met to the Sword. Of the Assailants about 200 were killed and wounded in this occasion. The Morlagues prefented above 150 Heads to the Proveditore-General, who gave them 4 Sequins for each. In the place were found 8 pieces of Cannon, with a great many Muskets and other Aims, and a very good Magazine of Powder, About 100 Women and Children were made priloners, and 20 Christians delivered from flavery; the Plunder was inconfiderable, the Turks having before the Siege semoved their best Goods to other places. The 29th the Proveditore-General, the Prince de Parma and the other Generals entred into the Town, and went directly to the chief Mosque where To Deum was fung. The Proveditore having given the necessary O: ders, and put into the place a Gar fon of 5 Companies of Foot, and 3 Troops of Hose under the Command of Signier Bolugni, returned with the Army to Scalond; and if the weather continue favourable, he will undertake some more considerable Enterprize: By the taking of Sign the Veneralus are become Ma-Hers of the fertile Province of Zet.inn.

Madrid, Octoct 10. Dom Gonzalo Clincon General of the Galeons has fince their arrival at Cide been made a prisoner, and Commissioners are appointed to form his Process; He is charged with having disobeyed his Orders, which express/commanded him to put with the Fleet into the Port of St. A. dere, whereby the Frauds practifed at the unlading the Galeons at Cadiz would have been prevented, and the Ring's Duties greatly increased, The 5th Inflant an Extraordinary Council was held on this subject in the Aing's Presence. After which an Express was sent to Cadiz with Orders to the Commanders of the Fleet, and the Officers of the Chamber of Sev. I.e. It's faid the hing demands of the Merchants a Million of pieces of Eight, one half by way of Tax, to be freed from all protecution for Counterband-Goods, and the other balf by way of Loan. The Lading of the Galeons amounts, as we are affured, to 30 Millions; but there are not above 12 Millions and a half Regifired. The King has named the Duke d'Escalora, who served this Campagne in Hangary to be his Ambassador at the Emperor's Court, in the place of the Marquis de Bryomannero, who is made Viceroy of Galicia.

Vienn., Octob. 17. The Duke of Lorrain was according to our last advice encamped with ten Regiments not far from Pest, having sent some Troops as we told you in our last, to possess themselves of Historia. (where they found 17 pieces of Cannon, which the Tirks had been forced to leave behind them) and a detachement to reinforce the Garison of Buda, which was weakened by the departure of the Brandriling and Saxon Troops that were put into the place presently after it was taken. The Express that arrived here the 13th Instantiforn the Camp before Seguain, parted from thence the 6th; and brought an account, that the day before the

Imperial Forces invested that Fortress; That Lieutenant-General de la Vergne who commanded the Attack was shot with a Cannon Bullet as he was viewing the place, leveral of thole that were with him being killed and wounded at the same sime; That Lieutenant-General Souches had thereupon ta-Ken upon him the Conduct of the Attack, which was carried on with all the vigor imaginable; and that three great pieces of Cannon for batter, had been brought from Zinocke to be employed in this Siege, which it was hoped would not hill many days. An Officer is arrived here from Prince Louis of Baden who desforms us, That in his march by Capelwar he had taken the Town where the Rifeians liyed, which the Soldiers plundered and burnty but that he slid not think fit to attack the Oalties by reafor hewanted great Cannon for battery: That from thence he continued his march to the Drave, where he joyned the 9th Instant with the Forces of Croatia commanded by Lieutenant General Scherffenberg; and that they intended to begin their march the next day towards Five Eligropie. We have advice that the Ban of Croatin having on the A instant detached 2000 Men under the command of Colone Ivanowich, to make an incursion into the Enemics Territories, they took their trurch towards Fire Churches, and arriving before that place the 5th by break, of day, immediately attackt it, and though the Turks made a very good defence, yet the Creats (part getting over the Walls and opening the Gates to the rell.) imade themselves Masters of the Town, and successible Turks to retire into the Caltle, but minding more the Plunder than their own security, the Enemy sallied upon them from the Castle, and obliged them to quitthe place; However, above 700 Christiant Slaves regovered their liberty in this occasion, and the Tarks loft, above 400 Men, and fome of their principal Officers. The Croats had about 1 do killed and wounded, and returned to their Camp with 2000 head of Cattle. They write from Upper Hugary that Count Teckeley had defired 800 Men of the Baffa of Great Wilradin, which he intended to put into Mongatz, but had, received an absolute denial. The Forces of Brandenburg and Saxony are marching home.

Hamburgh, Octob. 25. The differences between
