Since our last another vessel is arrived here from the Levane, by which we have advice, that Captain-General Morofini was in the Archepelago with 28 Galleys and feveral Men of War and Palanders, having left the Galeasses at Napole di Romania, but the Master of a Magica to confrom Confoil, Tays a Ship arrived there before the departure with the news, that the Captain-General had taken his confletowards Candin, having some Intelligence with the Bassa of that Kingdom, who is nearly related to the late Bassa of Napoli di R. mania; but these reports are not to be relyed upon. We have an account from Dalmatia, that the Proveditore-General Corn tro after the taking of Sign marched with 12000 Men, most M laques, to attack the Town of Seraglio in Bossian. Multafa is 63 years old, was two years ago Serasquier or General of the Forces of the Morea, and Bassa of Napoli at the time it was taken; Asam is about 60 years, and was formerly Commandant of Chie tfa which he furrendred to the Vinetians, and being now at Napole, contributed very much likewise to the surrender of that place; they have with them some Officers of Note, and in all about 70 Turks, one half whereof are Women; They intend to live here under the Protection of the Republick, which the Senate has granted them, and Orders are given for the providing two Houses for them.

From the Polish Camp near Jassi, Sept. 20. The sing having advanced with the Army to Falxin, intended to have continued his march to Budziar's, but being informed that he mult pass over several great Mountains, and that the Towns and Villages were burnt, and the Forage destroyed by the Tartars, his Majesty, held a Council of War, where it was resolved, That the Army should pass the River Prub for their better subsistence, the Country not being yet ruined on the other side; a Bridge was therefore laid over the River, and in two days the

whole Army had passed it, and marched along the River; but upon advice that the Tartare had sikewise passed the River, and that they burnt and ruined all the Countrey to deprive us of the means of subfifting, and that they had like vise destroyed all he Springs of Water, it was resolved in a second Council of War to march back towards Jassi. In out march, on the 4th Infant we saw the Forces of the Turks and Tartars, being joyned together, the first commanded by the Serasquier, and the last by Sultan Nuradin, advance on the other side of the River. After a march of 6 days we returned into the neighborhood of Jass, having the Enemy conqually in fight on the other fide of the River, who of feveral places, where we were to pass through narrow passages palay'd upon us with their Cannon, but we answered them in such manner with ours, that we still obliged them to retire. The prisoners we took assured us that the Turks were 20000 and the Tartus 50000 strong. The Hospodar of Valuchia appeared in our fight with a great detachement on this side the Pruth, but some of our Troops advancing towards him he made to be some began to pass the River; but the King continued his Retieat towards Jass, that he might draw them farther into the Country, and have an opportunity to bring them to a Battle. We are affured that all the Enemies Infantry and Artillery have already passed to this side of the River, and that they are not above two Leagues from our Camp; The King is therefore disposing every thing: for a Battle; and our Parties begin already to skirmish with the Enemy. Greatest part of the Town, of Jassi has been burnt by accident.

Vienna, Octob. 16. The Letters from Buda of the 11th Instant told us, that the Duke of Lorrain was then encamped with part of the Imperial Army between Peft and Colocza, the Forces not being able to sublist in the present season for want of Forage and Provisions but in small Bodies; That his High-ness intended to continue there to observe the Enemy, in case they should endeavor to relieve Segeding That General Caraffa was gone with 4000 Horse to joyn the Forces that were before that places for whose subsistence a Magazine thas been provided at Hallacke: and that the Trooms which were fent to Hatman had begun to raife Breaft-works of Earth, and to secure them with Palisadoes, so that that place will quickly be made defenfible against any suddain Attack.
