

ing seamen who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories of any Foreign Power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to a subject of such Power, when within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty, that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories belonging to the Republic of Chile :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves, and not being British subjects, who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to citizens of the Republic of Chile, within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships: Provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, or the territories of the East India Company, he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence (if any) has been fully carried into effect.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners for the affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Paddington, in the county of Middlesex, and within the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated

church called Christ Church, situate at Craven Hill, in the said parish of Paddington, under and by virtue of the power and authority for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and also in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be called 'the District Chapelry of Christ Church Paddington,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary line of the district chapelry of Christ Church Paddington commences in the middle of the Uxbridge-road, opposite to Elms-lane, and thence proceeds northerly along the middle of Elms-lane and Craven-terrace, crosses Craven-hill, and proceeds along the middle of Devonshire-terrace to Charles-street, where it turns to the west and proceeds along the middle of the road forming the south side of Cleveland-square; thence, turning to the north, extends along the middle of Leinster-terrace, including the houses on the east side of Leinster-terrace, to James-street, and turning to the west proceeds along the middle of James-street into Porchester-terrace; then turning southward along the middle of Porchester-terrace to Porchester-gardens, thence through the middle of Porchester-gardens to the Queen's-road, and turning to the south proceeds along the middle of the Queen's-road to the Uxbridge-road, thence turning to the east along the middle of the Uxbridge road to the point opposite Elms-lane, where the boundary line commenced, as such district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and thereon coloured red.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed in the said church called Christ Church, at Craven Hill, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be equally divided between the incumbent thereof for the time being and the Reverend Archibald Montgomery Campbell, the present incumbent of the parish church of the said parish of Paddington, during the existing incumbency of such parish church, and that upon the first or next avoidance of such parish church the whole of the said fees should belong to the incumbent for the time being of the said church called Christ Church.

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the two before-mentioned Acts and sections, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."
