WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," as enlarged by the twelfth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual the Church Building Acts," and extended by the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of Ecclesiastical Districts to Churches or Chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the nineteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the district parish of Tunbridge Wells, in the county of Kent, and within the diocese of Canterbury, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church, called Christ Church, situate in the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' as enlarged by the twelfth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual the Church Building Acts,' and extended by the third section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of Ec-

clesiastical Districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be called 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Tunbridge Wells,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary line of the said district chapelry of Christ Church, Tunbridge Wells, commences at the eastern side of the garden and premises belonging to Arthur Thompson, Esquire, and proceeds southerly along the middle of Mount Pleasant-terrace to a point opposite to a fence dividing the property of Messrs. A. and N. Ward from the property of George Landgridge, Esquire, then proceeds along such fence easterly and southerly into Grove-hill-road, and along the middle of that road easterly into Camden-park-road, and then along the middle of the last-mentioned road as far as Hawkenbury-road, where it meets a stream dividing the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells from the parish of Frant, as likewise being the line of division between the county of Kent and the county of Sussex, and proceeds westerly along such stream until it reaches the boundary line separating the parish of Speldhurst from the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells, along which the boundary line of the said district chapelry of Christ Church, Tunbridge Wells, proceeds northerly and westerly as far as the road called Rose-hill, then along the middle of that road northerly until it reaches the fence of the garden and premises belonging to Arthur Thompson, Esquire, along which said fence it proceeds southeasterly, north-easterly, northerly, and easterly to the point where the boundary line commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, should be solemnized or performed in Christ Church aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be reserved for, on account of, and paid over to, the Reverend Edward Hoare, Master of Arts, Incumbent of the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells, during his incumbency thereof, and that upon his avoiding such incumbency the said fees should belong to the minister or incumbent of Christ Church aforesaid, for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend John Bird, Archbishop of the said diocese of Canterbury, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, and also the consent of the said Edward Hoare, as Incumbent of the said district parish of Tunbridge Wells, as required by the Act and section secondly hereinbefore mentioned, in order that the subdivision of such district parish by forming thereout a district chapelry as aforesaid, should take effect from the assignment of such district chapelry, in testimony whereof the said John Bird, Archbishop of Canterbury, and Edward Hoare, have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed,
