MY LORD,

I REGRET extremely to have to inform your Lordship of the death of Major Ranken, of the Royal Engineers.

He had the superintendence of the operations necessary for the destruction of the large White Barracks, in the Karabelnaia, where part of the mines were fired yesterday afternoon, but several of them did not explode.

Major Ranken, in the energetic performance of his duty, seems to have proceeded to light the fuze again, in several places where the connection had failed. It appears the powder hose, as well as the fuze, ignited—the explosion took place, and buried him under the ruins of part of the wall.

Energetic efforts were made at once to discover the body, and the removal of the ruins began and continued throughout the night. This morning the body was found. Death must have been immediate; and thus this excellent and gallant Officer, who had done good duty in the siege and at the assault of the Redan, lost his life from eagerness to complete the work entrusted to him.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Tamworth, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, and of the parish of Polesworth, in the county of Warwick, and in the diocese of Worcester, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Wilnecote, in the said parish of Tamworth, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Wilnecote,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary line commences at the junction of Kettlebrook with the river Tame, and proceeds in a south-easterly direction along the middle of that brook as far as the watercourse which separates the township of Bolehall and Glascote from the township of Amington and Stonydelph; then proceeds north-easterly up the middle of such watercourse as far as the turnpike-road leading from Tamworth to Polesworth, and proceeds along the middle of such road, until it reaches the parish of Polesworth; then proceeds southerly along the boundary line, separating the parish of Tamworth from the said parish of Polesworth as far as Watling-street-road, then crosses that road and proceeds south-westerly along a watercourse until it reaches the boundary-line of the said parish of Tamworth, then proceeds southerly and westerly along the boundary-line separating the said parish of Tamworth from the parish of Kingsbury until it reaches the River Tame, and then proceeds northerly along the middle of that river as far as

Kettlebrook, to the point where the boundary-line of the said consolidated chapelry of Wilnecote commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink and green.

"That the consents of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, of Charles Ashe A'Court Repington, of Amington Hall, in the said parish of Tamworth, a General in the Army, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Tamworth, of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester, and of the Right Honourable Robert Monsey, Baron Cranworth, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, patron in right of the Crown of the parish church of the said parish of Polesworth, have been severally obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Wilnecote, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have severally signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Charles Ashe A'Court Repington and Robert Monsey, Baron Cranworth, as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and of the said John, Bishop of Lichfield, and Henry, Bishop of Worcester, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate, to serve the said church of the Holy Trinity, at Wilnecote aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the parish church of the said parish of Tamworth.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that having taken into further consideration the circumstances of the said parish of Tamworth, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Leonard, situate at Wigginton, in the said parish of Tamworth, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' as enlarged by the third section of an Act of Parliament made and passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of Ecclesiastical Districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Wigginton,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary line commences at the junction of the turnpike-road leading from Tamworth to Burton-upon-Trent and Ashby-de-la-Zouch, and proceeds in a north-easterly direction along the middle of the latter road as far as the boundary line of the parish of Tamworth, and then proceeds northerly along the boundary line separating that parish from Statfold Liberty as far as Haunton; then proceeds westerly and northerly along the boundary line, separating the said parish of Tamworth from Haunton and Harlaston Lordship, until it reaches the parish of Elford; then westerly,

southerly, and south-westerly along the boundary line, separating the said parish of Tamworth from the said parish of Elford as far as the River Tame; then proceeds south-westerly along the middle of that river to the point where the Trent Valley Railway crosses the same, and then proceeds south-easterly along the middle of that railway as far as Windmill-lane; then north-easterly along the middle of Windmill-lane into the turnpike-road leading from Tamworth to Burton-upon-Trent, and proceeds south-easterly along the middle of such turnpike-road to the junction of the same with the road leading to Ashby-de-la-Zouch, at the point where the boundary line of the said district chapelry of Wigginton commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed and is thereon coloured yellow.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should continue to be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should continue to be solemnized or performed in Saint Leonard's Church at Wigginton aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, has been obtained thereto, as required by the two Acts and sections lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Otley, in the West Riding of the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Burley, in the said parish of Otley, under the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and also in the third section of an Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should comprise the townships of Burley in Wharfedale and Menston, and should be called 'The District Chapelry of Burley,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:

"The boundary-line of the district chapelry of Burley commences at a boundary-stone, known as Ashlar Chair, situated at White Cragg, on Rumbles Moor, and the western extremity of the said district chapelry, a point at which three parishes meet, videlicet, the parish of Otley, the parish of Ilkley, and the parish of Bingley; from this point the boundary of the district chapelry proceeds in a north-easterly direction along the boundary-line dividing the township of Burley in Wharfedale from the township and parish of Ilkley to a boundary-stone known by the name of the Lanshaw Lad, thence by another stone, called Lanshaw Lass, and by other stones across Pancake Ridge to the enclosed lands, where it passes a short distance from and on the south side of Gib Field, and on the north side of and near to the Mount; thence follows the course of the stream to and through Rowley Wood to a point near to and on the south side of the Skipton and Otley Turnpike-road, and then proceeds from the last-named point along the boundary-line dividing the

township of Burley in Wharfedale from the township of Denton, in the parish of Otley, along which boundary it proceeds in an easterly direction, and passes for a short distance along the south side of the before-mentioned turnpike-road, when crossing the same to the centre of the River Wharfe, it follows the downward course thereof to a point where the boundary line of the before-mentioned townships of Denton leaves that of Burley in Wharfedale, and joins the boundary of the township of Askwith, in the parish of Weston; leaving the course of the river at this point the boundary of the said district chapelry proceeds along the line of division between the township of Burley in Wharfedale and the township of Askwith, in the parish of Weston, to an enclosure called Jerry Gill, where it again takes the centre of the said river and follows its course to the junction of the boundary between the before-mentioned township of Askwith and the township and parish of Weston, to a point opposite to the new mills at Greenholme; from this point the boundary of the said district chapelry follows the course south-easterly of the boundary line dividing the township of Burley in Wharfedale from the township of Weston, in the parish of Weston, to a point therein opposite the eastern end of Burley Holme, where the boundary dividing the township and parish of Weston and the township and parish of Otley, form a junction with that of Burley in Wharfedale; from this point the boundary of the said district chapelry proceeds in a southerly direction along the boundary line dividing the township of Burley in Wharfedale and the township of Otley, passing near to and west of Laund House, thence through and to the south side of Miller Wood, where the boundary of the township of Burley in Wharfedale and the boundary of the township of Menston meet, then follows the course of the boundary line dividing the townships of Menston and Otley to a point on Gill Beck, near to the new mill, and thence up the said Gill Beck to its junction with a stream called Slack Dikes, and then proceeds from the junction of the last-named streams in a southerly direction along the course of Mire Beck, which stream forms the boundary between the township of Menston and the township and parish of Guiseley, to a point on the east side of and near to where the said stream crosses the Kirkstall, Otley, and Shipley Turnpike-road, where the townships of Menston and Hawksworth, in the parish of Otley, and the township of Guiseley, in the parish of Guiseley, meet; from this last-mentioned point the boundary of the said district chapelry proceeds first in a westerly and then a north-westerly direction along the boundary line dividing the township of Menston from the township of Hawksworth, in the parish of Otley, and which said boundary line follows the north side of the first enclosure, on the west side of the said road at the point last-named, and again joins the course of the Mire Beck at the west end thereof, and follows this stream to its junction with Matthew Dike, along the course of which last-mentioned stream it proceeds north-westerly to a point near to a quarry on the south-west side thereof, and thence up the Slack, and to a boundary stone known by the name of the Bee Stone, where it leaves the enclosed lands and where the boundary between the townships of Menston and Burley in Wharfedale joins that of the said district chapelry; from the last-named point the boundary of the said district chapelry continues along the boundary line which divides the townships of Burley in Wharfedale, and Hawksworth, and proceeds therefrom in

"That the consent of the Right Reverend James Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore-mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."
