WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for providing a house of residence for the rectory of the parish of Saint Margaret, in the city of Westminster.

"Whereas it was by the said Act enacted, inter alia, that immediately from and after the passing thereof, the said rectory of the parish of Saint Margaret, in the city of Westminster, should become and be permanently annexed and united to the canonry in the collegiate church of Saint Peter, Westminster, then held by Henry Hart Milman, Clerk, Master of Arts, and that the said Henry Hart Milman and his successors in the said canonry should, as canons of the said church, become ipso facto rectors of the said parish and the parish church thereof to all intents and purposes.

"And whereas it was by the said Act further enacted, that such one of the prebendal houses belonging to the chapter of the said collegiate church as should be determined on by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us and a duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), should be, as soon as conveniently might be, exempted from the rule of option subsisting in the chapter thereof and be permanently annexed to the said canonry then held by the said Henry Hart Milman, and should thenceforth be the house of residence for the rector of the said parish of Saint Margaret, Westminster, for the time being.

"And whereas the prebendal house belonging to the said chapter now occupied by the Right Reverend James Henry, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, as a canon of the said collegiate church, appears to be well adapted for permanent annexation to the canonry so referred to in the said recited Act, and to become the house of residence for the rector for the time being of the said parish of Saint Margaret, Westminster.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that immediately from and after the next avoidance of the canonry now held by the said James Henry, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol (or in case the said bishop shall, from any other cause, sooner vacate and resign the house of residence now occupied by him as such canon, then immediately from and after such vacation and resignation), the house of residence now occupied by the said bishop as canon of the said collegiate church, situate on the south side of Dean's-yard, Westminster, and numbered 13, shall be exempted from the rule of option subsisting in the chapter of the said church, and shall thereupon become and be permanently annexed to the canonry in the same church so annexed and united as aforesaid to the said rectory of Saint Margaret, Westminster, and now held by the Reverend William Cureton, Master of Arts, and shall thenceforth be the house of residence for the rector for the time being of the said parish of Saint Margaret, Westminster.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas notice of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, been given to the dean and chapter of the collegiate church of Saint Peter, Westminster, being a corporation aggregate affected by the said scheme, and certain observations and objections offered by the said chapter have been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding such observations and objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board, a Report from the General Board of Health, dated the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

"The General Board of Health, appointed for the purposes of 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' has, in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon the petition of not less than one-tenth of the inhabitants rated to the relief of the poor of and within the hamlet of Smethwick, in the parish of Harborne, in the county of Stafford,

the same being a place having a known und defined boundary (the number of the said petitioners exceeding thirty in the whole), directed Robert Rawlinson, a Superintending Inspector, appointed for the purposes of the said Public Health Act, to visit the said hamlet, and to make inquiry and to examine witnesses as to the sewerage, drainage, and supply of water, the state of the burial-grounds, the number and sanitary condition of the inhabitants, and as to any local Acts of Parliament in force within such hamlet, for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving the said hamlet, or having relation to the purposes of the said Public Health Act; also as to the natural drainage areas, and the existing municipal, parochial, and other local boundaries, and the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of that Act;

"And the said Superintending Inspector, having previously given the notices directed by the said Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said inquiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath reported in writing to the said Board upon the said several matters with respect to which he was directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters with respect to which he deemed it expedient to report for the purposes of that Act;

"And copies of the said report, accompanied by a notice, stating that written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in or omitted from the said report, or any amendment proposed to be made therein, have been duly published and deposited as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed;

"And it appears by the said report, that there is no local Act of Parliament in force within the said hamlet, for paving, lighting (otherwise than for the profit of proprietors or shareholders), cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving such hamlet, or any part thereof, or in anywise relating to the purposes of the said Public Health Act;

"Now, therefore, the General Board of Health does hereby, in pursuance of the said Public Health Act, humbly report to your Majesty, that it appears expedient that:

"1. 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act, printed by your Majesty's printers, should be applied to, and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said hamlet of Smethwick, in the parish of Harborne, in the county of Stafford, and that such area, places, and parts of places should be and constitute a district for the purposes of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

"2. The Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act, should consist of twelve persons, and that the entire number should be elected for the whole of the said district.

"3. The first election of the said Local Board should take place on the fifth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

"4. One-third in number of the said Local Board of Health should go out of office on the twenty-fifth day of March in each year subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed should fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then that such one-third should go out of office on the day next following.

"5. Every person at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, should be resident, as in the said 'Public Health Act, 1848,' is required, and be seized or possessed of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or amount of not less than seven hundred pounds, or should be so resident and rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than twenty-five pounds.

"6. At the first election of the said Local Board, George Downing, Esq., of Selly Oak House, Northfield, within the said hamlet, shall have the powers and perform the duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting the first election; and in case the said George Downing, from illness, or from other sufficient cause, shall be unable to discharge such duties, or shall be absent, or shall refuse to act, then the Reverend Thomas Green Simcox, of the Vicarage, Smethwick, shall perform such of those duties as then remain to be exercised or performed.

"7. The fourteen days' notice of qualification, required by 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' to be given by owners of property, in order to entitle them to vote at the said first election, shall be given to the said George Downing, at the office of Ralph Docker, Esq., Attorney, in Rolfe-street, Smethwick; or in case he shall refuse, or be unable to receive the same, then to the said Thomas Green Simcox, at the office of the aforesaid Ralph Docker, Rolfe-street, Smethwick.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said Report into consideration, is pleased to approve thereof, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby, under and in pursuance of the "Public Health Act, 1848," order and direct that:

1. From and after the date of this Order, "The Public Health Act, 1848," and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act, printed by Her Majesty's printers, shall be applied to and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said hamlet of Smethwick, in the parish of Harborne, in the county of Stafford, and that such area, places, and parts of places, shall be and constitute a district for the purposes of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

2. The Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act, shall consist of twelve persons, and that the entire number shall be elected for the whole of the said district.

3. The first election of the said Local Board shall take place on the fifth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

4. One-third in number of the said Local Board of Health shall go out of office on the twenty-fifth day of March, in each year, subsequently to that in which the said first election of

that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed shall fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then that such one-third shall go out of office on the day next following.

5. Every person at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, shall be resident, as in the said "Public Health Act, 1848," is required, and be seized or possessed of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or amount of not less than seven hundred pounds, or shall be so resident and rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than twenty-five pounds.

6. At the first election of the said Local Board, George Downing, Esq., of Selly Oak House, Northfield, within the said hamlet, shall perform the duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting the said first election; and, in case the said George Downing, from illness, or other sufficient cause, shall be unable to discharge such duties, or shall be absent, or shall refuse to act, then the Reverend Thomas Green Simcox, of the Vicarage, Smethwick, shall perform such of the said duties as remain to be performed.

7. The fourteen days' notice of qualification required by "The Public Health Act, 1848," to be given by owners of property, in order to entitle them to vote at the said first election, shall be given to the said George Downing, at the office of the said Ralph Docker, Rolfe-street, Smethwick; or in case he shall refuse, or be unable to receive the same, then to the said Thomas Green Simcox, also at the office of the aforesaid Ralph Docker, Rolfe-street, Smethwick.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is

hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed as follows, viz.:

In the parish churchyard, in the Liten Burial-ground, in the burial-grounds of the Independent and Countess of Huntingdon's Chapels, and in the burial-ground adjoining the Friends' Chapel, all in BASINGSTOKE, from the first of June next to the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In Trinity Churchyard, St. Paul's Churchyard, and St. John's Churchyard, in the township of BLACKBURN, in the burial-grounds of the Independent Chapel, of the Wesleyan Methodist Association, and of the Baptist Chapel (Town's Moor), in the Quakers' Burial-ground, and in the burial-ground of St. Alban's Roman Catholic Chapel, all in the said township, from the first of May next to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard of the parish of BOCKING, from the first of April to the first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the churchyard of the parish of FLINT, from the first of April to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the churchyards of St. Mary, St. Nicholas, and the Holy Trinity, GUILDFORD, and in the Baptist Chapel Burial-ground, in Trinity parish in that town, from the first of May to the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the burial-ground of the parish of St. Mary in the Castle, from the first of April instant, and in the burial-ground of the parish of St. Clement, both in HASTINGS, from the first of July last, to the first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the burial-grounds of the parish of St. Botolph, St. Peter at Gowts, St. Mark, St. Mary-le-Wigford, St. Peter-at-Arches, St. Benedict, St. Martin, St. Paul, and St. Michael on the Mount, all in the city of LINCOLN, from the first of May to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the eighth of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, burials were directed to be discontinued in the churchyard of the parish of HYTHE, Kent, from and after the first of November last, which time has since been extended to the first of May next, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be permitted to take place in existing vaults and brick graves in the said churchyard, provided that, when required, they be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and that each coffin be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the eighth of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be wholly discontinued in the burial-grounds of the Roman Catholic Chapels of St. Patrick, Livesey-street, and of St. Wilfred, Bedford-street, both in *Hulme*, in the city of MANCHESTER, from the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and the first of March last respectively, and the

time for closing the former burial-ground has since been extended to the said first of March last, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, in lieu thereof, that burials be discontinued in the said two burials-grounds, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be imbedded in powdered charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner, and in graves never previously opened, one body only being buried in each grave.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the eighth of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued from and after the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the Quakers' Burial-ground, ROCHDALE, and such time has since been extended to the eleventh of June last, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, in lieu thereof, that interment in the said burial-ground be discontinued, except in graves never previously opened, and that one body only be buried in each of such graves.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the twenty-sixth of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, burials were directed to be discontinued as therein mentioned, in part of the parish churchyard of ROYSTON, in the counties of Hertford and Cambridge, and in part of the Kneesworth Chapel Burial-ground, and of the Friends' Burial-ground, in that parish, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered, in lieu thereof, that burials be forthwith discontinued in all vaults beneath or communicating with the interior of the parish church of Royston, and beneath the Kneesworth Chapel; that burials be forthwith discontinued within five yards of all houses in the churchyard, in the Kneesworth Chapel Burial-ground, and in the Friends' Burial-ground, except in existing vaults and walled graves which can be opened without disturbing soil which has been buried in, and in which each coffin shall be imbedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner; and that (with the like exceptions) burials be discontinued in the ancient portion of the said churchyard on and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the thirtieth of January last, burials were directed to be discontinued, from and after the days mentioned in such Order, in the churchyards of St. Mary the Virgin, St. Peter, and St. Thomas, STOCKPORT, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered, in lieu thereof, that interment be discontinued in the said churchyards on and after the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except in now existing vaults and walled graves which can be opened without the disturbance of soil that has been buried in, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches at the least in thickness, and separately entombed in brick or stone work, cemented in an air-tight manner, and that in the churchyards of St. Mary the Virgin and St. Thomas, the conditions contained in the said Order in Council of the thirtieth of January last, be also in the meantime observed.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the eleventh of December, one thousand eight hundred

and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued in the churchyard of the parish of STROOD, Kent, from and after the first of September last, which time has since been extended to the first of July in this year, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, in lieu thereof, that, with the exception of existing vaults and brick graves, which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner, burials be discontinued, on and after the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the south and west portions of the Old Churchyard of Strood, Kent, and that on and after the said first of July, in the remaining portions of the Old Churchyard, with the like exception of existing vaults and brick graves, only one body be buried in each grave, that no grave be reopened within fourteen years of a former interment, that no interment take place in any grave without a covering of earth four feet at the least in thickness, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the ordinary level of the ground, and that burials be forthwith discontinued in the said churchyard within five yards of dwelling-houses.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in any of the under-mentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications:

DATCHET, BUCKS.—From and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the ancient part of the *churchyard* of the parish of Datchet, except in family vaults and walled graves, which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work, properly cemented, and except also in such of the old footpaths therein as may no longer be required, provided that no ground which has been already buried in be opened for interments.

DUKINFIELD, and that part of the town of STALEYBRIDGE which is in Dukinfield Township, Cheshire.—That in no burial-ground (with the exception of family vaults and graves) shall more than one body be buried in each grave, and that no grave be opened within five yards of any dwelling-house or school. That burials be forthwith discontinued beneath *Grosvenor-street Chapel*, Staleybridge, also in the *Roman Catholic Burial-ground*, Dukinfield; in *Providence Chapel Old Burial-ground*, Dukinfield; in the *Wesleyan Chapel Burial-ground*, *Caroline-street*, Staleybridge; and in *Holy Trinity Churchyard*, Staleybridge. That from and after the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, burials be wholly discontinued in the burial-grounds of the following chapels and churches, viz., the *Methodist New Connexion Chapel*, Dukinfield; *Providence Chapel New Burial-ground*, Dukinfield; the *Primitive Methodist Chapel*, Dukinfield; the *Wesleyan Methodist Chapel*, Dukinfield; *St. John's Church*, Dukinfield; the *Independent Chapel*, Staleybridge; the *Roman Catholic Chapel*, Staleybridge; the *Particular Baptist Chapel*, the *Primitive Methodist Chapel*, *Cross Leach-street*, Staleybridge; and *Grosvenor-street Chapel*, Staleybridge. That in the burial-grounds of the *Moravian Chapel*, the *Presbyterian Chapel*, and the *Unitarian Old Chapel*, Dukinfield, in the case of family graves, a layer of earth, eighteen inches in thickness at least, shall be left between each of the coffins interred therein; and that no interment shall take place in any grave without a covering of earth four feet in thickness at the least, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the ordinary level of the ground.

ABINGDON.—Forthwith beneath *St. Helens Church*, beneath the *Independent Chapel* and *Vestry*, and in the *burial-grounds* of the same in St. Helen's parish; beneath *St. Nicholas Church*, and (with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves, which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been buried in, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work, properly cemented) in the *ancient part of St. Helen's Churchyard*, and in the *new part* within three yards of all buildings; in the *Baptist Burial-ground*, St. Helens, within three yards of all buildings; and in *St. Nicholas Churchyard*: and that from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, burials be wholly discontinued in *St. Helen's Churchyard* and the *Baptist Burial-ground*, with the exception of existing vaults and brick graves, which shall be used on the conditions above specified.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fifth day of June next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said fifth day of June.

WHEREAS the population of the parish of Saint Paul Covent Garden, in the county of Middlesex, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons:

And whereas, at a meeting of the Vestry of the said parish, held in the Vestry Room, after public notice in that behalf, on Friday the first day of February last, it was resolved,—

"That this Vestry are of opinion, that it is expedient forthwith to put in force in this parish that part of the Act of 13th and 14th Vic., cap. 57, which relates to the appointment of Vestry Clerk; and they request the Churchwardens to make such an application as is directed by the Statute to obtain an Order from the Poor Law Board for that purpose."

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution.

Now, therefore, we, the said Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, do hereby order and direct:—

ART. 1.—That so much of the said Act, passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk, shall forthwith be applied to, and be put in force within, the said parish of Saint Paul Covent Garden.

ART. 2.—That a salary of one hundred and fifty pounds a year shall be paid to the Vestry Clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority of the Statutes in such behalf and this Order, by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish.

ART. 3.—That the salary of such Vestry Clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at the usual feast days in the year, namely, Midsummer-day, Michaelmas-day, Christmas-day, and Lady-day, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators, in case he shall die while holding such office.

ART. 4.—That every person appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk in the said parish shall give to the Guardians of the Poor of the Strand Union, in the county of Middlesex, a bond, in the penal sum of five hundred pounds, in the names of himself and two sufficient sureties, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and every such officer shall give immediate notice to the said Guardians of the death, insolvency, or bankruptcy of either of such sureties, and shall, when required by the said Guardians, produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his sureties are alive and believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any such surety who may die, or become bankrupt or insolvent; provided that the Guar-

dians may, if they think fit, take the security of any society or company expressly authorized by statute to guarantee or secure the faithful discharge of the duties of any Poor Law Officer.

ART. 5.—That the Auditor of the District comprising the said Union shall, in the statement required by the General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the seventeenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to be transmitted to the Poor Law Board, of the securities of the officers of the said Union, include the name of the Vestry Clerk for the time being appointed under the authority hereof, to-

gether with the particulars in the said General Order required, and shall report thereon to the Board of Guardians of the said Union, in like manner as therein set forth with reference to the securities of other officers.

ART. 6.—That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
