THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople, reporting that the following quarantine regulations have been issued by the Russian authorities at Theodosia:

All vessels destined for the Sea of Azoff will be required to submit to a term of observation at Theodosia.

On the expiration of this term the vessels will receive bills of health, and be allowed to continue

their voyage.

Before vessels arriving at their ports of destination in the Black Sea are admitted to free pratique, their masters will be required to produce at the Customs of the ports written declarations, to the effect that during the voyage from Theodosia no communication has been held with suspected places or objects.
