ORD PANMURE has received a Despatch, of which the following is a copy, addressed to his Lordship by General Sir William Codrington, K.C.B.

Sevastopol, June 7, 1856.

My Lord,

VISCOUNT GOUGH arrived at head-quarters on the 4th instant; and the investiture of the Order of the Bath took place here yesterday.

Marshal Pelissier and the other French officers attended at the English head-quarters at 11 A.M. The English officers who were to receive the insignia of the Order, the English and French Admirals, and many officers of both nations, fleets, and armies, were present.

The regiments remaining at Sevastopol, numbering about 16,000 men, were assembled on the garden side of this house; a sort of throne, decorated with flags, formed the place of investiture, and the troops were placed about the confined space in the manner best calculated for them to see and be seen.

Having proceeded to the French head-quarters with an escort, I accompanied Marshal Pelissier and a large number of French officers to the ground. The Marshal was received with a salute of artillery and of the other troops.

The warrants of Her Majesty having been read, all present joined in the royal salute which was given. An address was read by Lord Gough to the officers of the English and French armies who were to be invested. The investiture began with Marshal Pelissier, who was introduced by Admiral Sir Houston Stewart and myself, the rest of the officers of both armies in succession.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, Lord Gough and Marshal Pelissier rode down the front of the regiments, and, returning to the upper part of

the ground, Lord Gough received the salute of the whole army present, the troops giving three cheers to that distinguished officer.

The parade was then dismissed.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by the 333rd section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, subject to the provisions contained in the fifth part of the said Act, it shall be lawful for every pilotage authority, by Bye-Law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time, amongst other things, to determine the qualifications to be required from persons applying to be licensed as pilots, whether in respect of their age, skill, time of service, character, or otherwise; to make regulations as to the approval and licensing of pilot-boats and ships; to make regulations for the government of the pilots licensed by them, and for insuring their good conduct and their constant attendance to and effectual performance of their duty, either at sea or on shore; to fix the terms and conditions of granting licenses to pilots and apprentices, and to make regulations for punishing any breach of such regulations as aforesaid, committed by such pilots or apprentices by the withdrawal or suspension of their licenses, or by the infliction of certain penalties as in the said Act mentioned; to fix the rates and prices, or . other remuneration to be demanded and received, for the time being, by pilots licensed by such authority.

And whereas, the Liverpool Pilot Committee, being the pilotage authority for the port of Liverpool and the seas and channels leading and adjacent thereto, according to the meaning of the said recited Act, have submitted for the consent of Her Majesty in Council certain Bye-Laws (hereunto annexed) for the licensing and government of the pilots under their jurisdiction.

And whereas, it has been made to appear that the said Bye-Laws are proper and reasonable.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve and doth hereby approve of the said bye-laws so submitted as aforesaid, in lieu of the several bye-laws for the better regulation and management of the Liverpool pilot service now existing and in force.

BYE-LAWS FOR THE BETTER REGULATION AND MANAGEMENT OF THE LIVERPOOL PILOT SERVICE.

I .- Duties of the Committee Clerk.

The office of the Committee shall be open, and the Clerk shall reside on the premises, and constantly attend, for the purpose of receiving reports, and transacting such other business as may be required of him; he shall also summon all meetings of the Commissioners and of the Committee directed by the Act, as well as all persons whose attendance may be required by the Committee.

II.—Duties of the Superintendent.

The duties of the Superintendent shall be as follows:—To exercise a supervision and control, under the Pilots' Committee, over all the pilots, journeymen pilots, and apprentices, so as to see that the Pilot Act and these bye-laws are duly observed by all in their respective departments;—to exact from the master pilots a report of all occurrences affecting the service, on which he or the Committee may require information;—and it shall be his especial duty to see that the stations are effectively occupied day by day, and he shall have posted in the office, every day, the numbers of the boats on the several stations; and report to the Committee any cases of misconduct or breach of the bye-laws that may occur.

That the time of the Superintendent shall be devoted to the service of the Committee. That his office hours be from nine o'clock, a.m. to five o'clock, p.m., between the first of April and the first of October; and from nine o'clock, a.m. to four o'clock, p.m., between the first of October to the first of April.

III .- Duties of the Masters and Crews.

The first and second masters, also the third master, in case of necessity, are to take the command and proceed to sea in her by turns, so that one of them may always remain on shore to appoint pilots to outward-bound vessels, and to transact the other necessary business of the boat. Every master shall do his utmost to maintain due subordination, sobriety, and good order amongst the crew of his boat, both at sea and in port; and every pilot or other person, serving on board, or belonging to the boats, shall at all times submit to and execute all the lawful commands of the master; and, in particular, shall, whenever he is required, assist, as far as he is able, in performing the necessary repairs of the boat, her rigging, sails, and materials; and, in case of refusal or neglect, the master may employ another person in his stead, the expense whereof shall be deducted from his share of the earnings of the said boat.

The masters shall on no occasion leave the boats, except in cases of emergency. They shall keep exact journals of their proceedings when at sea, which shall contain, in particular, accounts of all vessels boarded or piloted inwards, and the times and places of boarding them; and, when not so employed, shall enter in their logs, every two hours, the position of their boats; copies of which journals, respectively, signed by the

master, shall be delivered to the Committee-clerk within two days after the arrival of the boat from each cruise.

IV.—Masters of Pilot Boats, Apprentices, and Crews.

Each pilot-boat must have three masters, to be called the first, second, and third master, and the masters or owners of each boat shall be entitled to take ten apprentices, but not to have a greater number at any time, which apprentices must be approved by the Committee, and must find satisfactory security for the faithful performance of their engagements; and all indentures of apprenticeship shall be inspected by the Committee before being executed; and the masters shall instruct their apprentices in the use of charts, and in all matters enumerated in the [fourth] bye-law, as to the knowledge required of apprentices on their applying to be licensed.

The journeymen pilots shall be appointed to their respective boats by the Committee, so, and in such manner, that each boat may carry an equal number, or as nearly so as is practicable; nor shall any pilot quit the boat to which he shall have been appointed by the Committee, in less than a year from the date of such appointment, and then he shall give three months' notice, in writing, of his intention so to do, to the masters thereof; and a copy of such notice shall be left with the Clerk of the Committee, who shall record the date when it is received. No pilot shall quit his boat whilst on service, under any pretence whatever.

V.—Duties of Individual Pilots.

All pilots shall repair to their respective boats, and proceed in them to their stations, whenever and as often as they are required by the masters.

It shall be the duty of every pilot, when not actually employed, to attend daily, at such time and place as may be fixed upon and appointed for that purpose by the master of the boat to which he belongs, to receive such orders and directions as may then and there be given by the said master; and in case of the owners, masters, and crew of any boat suffering any loss by reason of the non-attendance or neglect of any pilot, such loss shall be borne by the pilot so neglecting or refusing to attend.

Every pilot shall use his utmost care and diligence to conduct the ships and vessels under his charge without damage or doing injury to others; and shall behave himself with strict sobriety, and due respect towards the owners, masters, and officers thereof; and shall order the ensign to be hoisted on entering the port: and on his arrival from sea, either in charge of a vessel or otherwise, shall give notice thereof to the master of the boat to which he belongs as soon as possible. And shall not leave his vessel until she is safely anchored in the river; nor then leave her without a written permission from the commander, or on being relieved by a pilot of equal class by order of one of the masters of the boat. He shall always keep the sounding-lead going when in charge of any ship or vessel whilst she be under way; and shall report to the Committee all accidents which may happen to such vessel whilst under his direction, as early as possible, within six hours after his arrival; and no pilot shall lay any vessel aground without a written order from the owner or master.

Each pilot shall carry a good watch, and shall always have about him a tide-table, a copy of the Liverpool Dock Laws, and his license. And he shall obey and execute all orders received from the Committee, their clerk, or superintendent.

VI.—Apprentices.

Any person intended to be bound to the pilot service shall be not less than sixteen years of age, and shall have been previously at sea in a topsail vessel for not less than three years, and shall produce satisfactory testimonials from his previous service, and the testimonials and proposed indentures of the apprentice shall be submitted to the Committee for their approval; and when indentures have been executed, they shall not be cancelled by any agreement between the masters and the apprentice, without the order of the Committee. And a book of registry of apprentices to the service shall be kept by the secretary for the use of the Committee.

VII.—Qualifications of Persons requiring to be examined for Licenses.

No person shall be licensed to act as a pilot who has not served three years in a Liverpool pilotboat. Every candidate must be able to read and write, and have a competent knowledge of arithmetic; he must be acquainted with, and be able to give a nautical description of the harbours, docks, and piers of Liverpool, Beaumaris, Chester, Pile of Foudre, and the Isle of Man; he must learn the course and distance from any place within the limit prescribed by the Committee, under "The Act for the better Regulation and Encouragement of Pilots for the conducting of Ships and Vessels into and out of the Port of Liverpool," to any other place within the said limits; the flowing and setting of the tides, depth of water, the proper places for good anchorage, and where to stop a tide; the sand-banks, rocks, shoals, and other dangers; the landmarks, buoys, perches, and lights; he must also be able to set off a ship's situation, or actual place on the chart, and must be seaman enough to know the complete management of a vessel in bad weather and a narrow channel; how to bring her properly to anchor; to keep a clear anchor; to moor and unmoor, and to get under weigh in all situations; he must produce certificates to show that he has been frequently with other pilots as leadsman in and out of the Port of Liverpool; and he must also produce a certificate from his masters as to his good conduct; and no apprentice shall receive a full license without the production of a satisfactory certificate from his masters. Neither a second or a third class license shall be granted between the twenty-fifth September and twenty-fifth March.

VIII .- Pilot-Boats.

Every pilot-boat must be of the burthen of forty tons or upwards, and must be painted in uniform colours: from the upper part of the gunwale yellow; green and yellow streaks black bends; and white streak to copper or water line; and be kept in good repair, and well found with masts, rigging, sails, anchors, cables, and every other necessary material, together with an approved chart of the Bay of Liverpool, on which the boundary lines of the several stations hereafter mentioned shall be distinctly marked by the Superintendent; a good telescope, two lanterns, and a swivel, or other small gun, for the purpose of making and answering signals. She must have her number painted on each bow, in white, -in figures of nine inches in length, and the same number must be painted upon her main and foresails, in black figures four feet long. The number on the sails to be painted on the third and fourth cloths from the after leach, and at an equal distance between the upper reef and the gaff. Her name and number, together

with the name of the first master, and the port to which she belongs, shall also be painted in large letters and figures upon her stern, one inch broad and three inches long; and good and sufficient accommodations must be provided for the master and crew, at the expense of the owners.

IX.—Pilots deprived of their Licenses.

No master of a pilot-boat shall carry to sea on her station, or be in any way aiding or assisting in putting on board any ship or vessel, for the purpose of piloting or conducting her, any person whose license, as a pilot, shall have been suspended, or withdrawn, by an order of the Committee, or shall not have been renewed. If any person not duly licensed, or whose license shall have been recalled or suspended, shall be received on board a pilot-boat, the pilot or pilots receiving him on board shall for every offence forfeit and pay the sum of five pounds each, and for a second or subsequent offence the pilot or pilots shall be liable to suspension or forfeiture of his or their license or licenses, at the discretion of the Committee.

X .- Duty of Pilots on Boarding Ships.

Every pilot on taking charge of a vessel shall, if required, produce his licence; also, in the case of outward-bound vessels, shall repair on board in sufficient time before leaving the dock or basin to ascertain if the vessel he is about to take charge of is perfectly fit for sea, or to anchor in the river.

XI.—Division of Pilotage.

The earnings of each pilot-boat, including all compensations and rewards for assisting vessels in distress, shall be divided amongst the owners and crew in the following proportions, viz.:

The owners of the boat shall have two and a half shares in respect of the boat; two-thirds of a share for each licensed apprentice, and one and a half share for the unlicensed apprentices.

Masters and journeymen pilots of the first class, each one share; second and third class pilots, each two-thirds of a share; but the Committee shall have power to alter such apportionment from time to time, in such manner as they shall judge most conducive to the interests of the service; and if any pilot shall be disabled from doing his duty by sickness or bodily hurt, he shall be entitled to two-thirds of a share of the said earnings for the space of three months, provided such sickness or hurt has not been occasioned by lewdness, drunkenness, gaming, or other vice, the fact to be determined by the Committee, upon such evidence as may be brought before them; and provided also, that due notice be given to the Superintendent and masters of the boat at the commencement of his sickness.

Each pilot shall deliver all money received by him for pilotage, with an account and vouchers, to the master of the boat to which he belongs, on the day following that on which they are received; or in case of such vouchers and money being received at sea, then they shall be delivered to the said master as soon as he, the said pilot, returns to port, or joins his boat at sea; and all claims for extra days shall be inserted in the certificate for pilotage, and signed for by the master of the vessel.

XII.—Stations and Duties of the First and Second Boats.

The boats shall be stationed as follows, viz.:— The first and second boats shall cruise off the Point Linas, or to the northward and eastward of it, as wind and weather may permit or circumstances may require; but not further to the westward than the rock, called the Middle Mouse, or eastward than Priestholm Island, bearing S.S.W. by

compass.

The duty of the first boat shall be to offer the services of, and to furnish pilots to, all vessels inward bound; and for that purpose the master shall use his best endeavours to speak all such inward-bound vessels as may come within the limits of his station, without respect to their being from a foreign voyage, or otherwise. That if it become necessary for this boat to chase any vessel to the northward, or out of the fair-way track, the second boat shall remain on such station, and board all vessels wanting pilots, which vessels shall be exchanged on the finish of the cruise.

The duty of the second boat shall be to be near the first, and to see that the master of the first boat does his duty; and also to board and give pilots to any vessel, homeward bound, that may not have been boarded by the first boat; and, in case the master of the first boat shall wilfully neglect or refuse to put a pilot on board any such vessel requiring one, the master of the second boat shall furnish such vessel with a pilot, and shall note the circumstance, with all particulars of time, place, and weather, in his journal; and immediately on his return to Liverpool shall report the same to the Committee. And as soon as the first boat has left her station, the second boat shall succeed to it.

XIII .- Station and Duty of the Third Boat.

This boat shall cruise to the eastward of Point Linas, and to S.S.W. of the west end of the Great Ormshed, and board any vessels that may pass the first and second boats, and when the second boat has left her station, this boat shall succeed her.

XIV.—Station and Duty of the Fourth Boat.

This boat shall cruise as far west as the eastern limit of the third boat, and eastward until Barland

bears S.S.W. by compass.

The duty of this boat shall be to board and furnish pilots to all vessels requiring them within the limits of her station, whenever the second and third boats may be out of sight or refuse to board, or whenever such vessels shall have passed the limit of the third boat's station; and to see that the second and third boats perform their duty, in like manner as the second boat is to look after the first. And when the third boat has left her station this boat shall succeed her.

XV.—Station and Duty of the Fifth, or First Hoylake Boat.

The station of this boat shall be to the westward of the N.W. Light Ship, so far as to keep sight of it from the deck; and shall come to the Light Ship for the purpose of being relieved, when the boat which is to relieve her arrives at the Bell Buoy or N.W. Light Ship, and when relieved, she shall take the fourth westward station.

XVI.—Station and Duty of the Sixth Boat, or Second Hoylake Station.

The duty of this boat shall be to board all vessels that are to the eastward of a line drawn from the point of Ayr, and the N.W. Light Ship, and all vessels to the northward, when the first boat is not within a reasonable distance, and after high water, every day she shall stretch over towards the Bell Buoy, and be ready to take pilots out of any vessel going to sea.

XVII.—Station and Duty of the Seventh Boat.

The seventh boat shall follow and take the pilots out of vessels outward bound; for which purpose one of the masters, all the apprentices, and as many pilots belonging to the said boat as shall be required by the master, shall be on board; and as soon as all the pilots are taken on board her from vessels outward bound, she is to return with them to Liverpool. This duty shall be performed by the next boat that has the turn for the second Hoylake station.

Each pilot taken on board into a pilot-boat from an outward-bound ship, or otherwise, shall submit to the authority and direction of the master, whilst he remains on board, in all respects as if he formed part of the crew.

XVIII.—Boats not on Service.

The other boats shall be kept in constant readiness, to perform any extra service that may occur; the last boat upon turn for regular service to have the preference; but none of them shall leave the port, under any pretence whatever, except for the purpose of assisting vessels in distress or other pressing emergency, or for the purpose of surveying the banks for the instruction of the crews and apprentices, without an order given by the Superintendent; and in case of any boat being absent, except on survey, when required to go upon the regular service of the port, she shall forfeit her turn.

XIX.—Boats to take the Stations by turns.

All boats are to take their turn or rotation for service in the same order as they arrive from sea, and in case of more boats than one leaving Liverpool, by order of the Superintendent, to proceed to the stations at the same time, it shall be lawful for the first boat upon turn to commence boarding vessels, and furnishing them with pilots, as soon as she has got to the westward of the Hoylake Boat; but it is to be clearly understood that this privilege extends only to boats actually on their passage to the westward stations, and not after they have arrived there, and that in boarding vessels, when more than one boat is in sight, the first boat upon turn is, on all occasions, to take precedence.

XX.—Boarding Vessels out of turn.

The masters and crews of any boat convicted of boarding and piloting any ship or vessel out of her regular turn, shall forfeit every advantage gained thereby, in respect of pilotage inwards and outwards, to the masters and crew of the boat which may be declared by the Committee to be entitled thereto.

XXI.—Boats to carry Distinguishing Signals when on Service.

All pilot-boats, whilst upon their stations and in turn for boarding vessels, shall, during daylight, keep at the mast-head a red and white flag constantly flying, the upper horizontal half white and the lower half red, of large dimensions, and to be kept clean; and during the night, the boat on turn for boarding, shall exhibit lights in accordance with the Admiralty regulations.

XXII.-Pilots having Charge of Ships or Vessels to show Signals when chased by a Pilot-boat.

The pilot in charge of a ship inward bound, when he perceives any pilot-boat in chase, shall make the following signals for the purpose of | XXV.-Pilots to obey the Orders of the Harbour, showing that the vessel has a pilot on board :-

By day-the national flag to be hoisted on board the vessel, in such a situation as to be best seen by those on board the boat, which flag must be hauled down again and rehoisted every five minutes, until seen.

By night—a light to be hoisted and lowered in the same manner.

And all pilots having charge of ships or vessls as aforesaid, and being hailed by any pilot-boat, shall, on all occasions, give a true account of the time when they were boarded, and the number of pilots left on board the boat to which they belong.

All masters of pilot-boats, when on any of the westward stations, are also to give a true account of the number of pilots they have on board, whenever they are required so to do by the master of any other boat.

XXIII.—Lights of Vessels at Anchor.

That pilots in charge of vessels when at anchor at night, in river or channel, do order white lights to be hoisted, where they can be best seen, say—one on the "fore stay," not less than eight feet above the upper top-rail of the bulwarks, and the other at the "gaff end," or some such conspicuous place "aft," not to be less than eight feet above the upper top-rail of the bulwarks, so long as at anchor in pilot water, say in the channels or river.

XXIV .- Annual Survey.

Every pilot-boat in the service shall, once in each year, commencing on the first of April, in such rotations and at such times as may be fixed by the Committee, having due regard to the interest and convenience of the service, sail to and make an accurate examination and survey of the following ports and places; namely: Lancaster, Pile of Foudre, River Wyre, and all ports in the Isle of Man, Holyhead Harbour, Beaumaris, and Chester. The Committee-clerk or Superintendent shall give notice, in writing, to the master of every boat ordered on this survey, at least twentyfour hours before the time appointed for sailing; and shall go on board when the boat is ready for sea and muster the crew; when one of the masters, half of the journeymen, and all the apprentices, are hereby directed and required to be present, and to proceed upon and remain on board during the survey, unless reasonable cause of absence can be shown to the satisfaction of the Committee; and the masters and journeymen shall go upon the survey by turns, so that each individual shall go once in two years. The master shall keep an exact and accurate journal of their proceedings, which shall contain all such remarks and information as he shall make or obtain relative to the lighthouses, landmarks, buoys, perches, and other sea-marks, as well as all rocks, sand-banks, and other dangers, and the depth of water within the limits of the survey. He shall obtain a certificate from some principal officer of the revenue, at each of the ports above mentioned, that he has visited the port, which journal and certificate shall be delivered to the Committee-clerk or Superintendent within twenty-four hours after his return to

No more time shall be spent on the survey than is necessary for the purposes above mentioned; nor must any ship or vessel be boarded by or furnished with a pilot from any boat whilst on the survey, except such ship or vessel shall be in distress, in which case the particulars of her situation shall be accurately noted in the journal.

Dock, and Pierhead Masters.

All pilots shall obey the by-laws (for the time being) of the trustees for the better regulation of the Liverpool Docks, as well as all orders and directions that may be given to them by the Harbour, Dock, and Pierhead Masters, relative to the docking, towing, or transporting vessels under their charge.

XXVI.-No more to be charged for Pilotage than is allowed by the Rates.

No pilot shall make any agreement for or receive any greater sum of money as pilotage of any ship or vessel than is allowed by the Commissioners under the Act of Parliament.

XXVII.-Rates of Chester Pilotage, and for docking and transporting Vessels.

The pilotage to be paid for conducting a ship or vessel, inward bound, into any part of the Port of Chester, north of Hilbrec Island, shall be the same as if the vessel had been brought into the Port of Liverpool; but if such vessel shall be piloted into any part of the Port of Chester, south of Hilbree Island, then the pilotage shall be the same as if she had been piloted into the Port of Liverpool, and half as much more. And if the pilot be not discharged within two hours after coming to anchor, he is to be paid ten shillings and sixpence a day for every day or part of a day he may be detained afterwards. The pilotage for docking or for transporting vessels from one dock to another, shall be twenty shillings; to or from Birkenhead, one pound ten shillings; to or from Garston, forty shillings, for each vessel.

XXVIII.—Pilotage to Luncaster, Wyre Water, and Pile of Foudre.

The pilotage to be paid for conducting ships or vessels bound to the Port of Lancaster, River Wyre, or Pile of Foudre, into the limits of pilotage of any of those places, is to be the same as the Liverpool pilotage, together with travelling expenses to Liverpool, to be in all cases settled by the Committee; and if the pilot is not discharged, and the pilotage paid, within two hours after the vessel is brought to anchor, or given into the charge of a pilot of the place she is bound to, he is to be paid ten shillings and sixpence a day for every day or part of a day he may be detained afterwards. But no pilot, having conducted a vessel into any of those ports or places, shall be allowed to join his boat again, for the purpose of piloting any other vessel, during the cruise on which he left her.

The pilotage of vessels from foreign parts, inward bound, taking a pilot to Beaumaris, to be nine shillings per foot, and for outward-bound vessels, putting into Beaumaris, six shillings per foot, together with two guineas travelling expenses.

XXIX.—Pilots may go to fetch Vessels from other Ports.

Any pilot may, upon leave given in writing, by the Superintendent, proceed to any port or place in Great Britain or Ireland, for the purpose of taking charge of and conducting any ship or vessel to the port of Liverpool. And no vessel having a pilot on board, under this regulation, shall be obliged to take another pilot, or shall be subject to any higher or other rate of pilotage than is established by law, save and except such moderate remuneration for loss of time, and travelling expenses, as may be agreed upon between the owners of such vessel and the pilot. And in case no agreement shall be made, then such remuneration shall be settled by the Committee.

XXX.—Pilotage of Steam Vessels.

The masters of steam vessels, trading from this port to Ireland or Scotland, requiring pilots, must apply to the Superintendent who shall thereupon cause to be appointed pilots to such vessels out of the crew of the pilot-boat then last-but-one upon turn for service, which pilots so appointed shall be at liberty, if required, to proceed and remain in such vessels during the whole of the voyage upon which they shall then respectively sail, and shall pilot them outwards and inwards, for which the usual and regular rates shall be paid, together with ten shillings and six pence per day for every day of the pilot's absence from Liverpool, except the day of sailing from, and the day of arriving in, Liverpool.

Every pilot, on his return from such voyage, not finding his own boat in port, shall be carried out in the next boat sailing for the station, and put on board his said boat. But in case she shall have returned to Liverpool before he arrives on the station, he shall then be boarded as pilot on the first vessel that is fallen in with requiring a

pilot.

XXXI.—Third Class Pilots.

All second-class pilots are limited to pilot vessels not exceeding 500 tons register, and 15 feet water, and third-class not exceeding 200 tons register, except in cases of necessity, and every vessel, in such case, having on board a second or third-class pilot may exchange him out of any boat she may meet, and it is the duty of that boat to board him again; and any pilot so licensed neglecting to inform the master of any vessel he may be put in charge of, of his true position in the service, shall be fined in the full penalty.

XXXII.

That any master of the pilot-boats sending a pilot to take charge of vessels beyond his license limit, except in cases of necessity, be fined in a sum not exceeding five pounds.

XXXIII.

That a book or books be provided, and left open in the office, and that each master be required, within one hour after arrival (if in the day time), or if in the night, by nine o'clock the next morning, to enter the arrival of his boat, from what station, the time, and where laying, to which he shall sign his name.

XXXIV.

That a book shall be provided, and left open in the office, in which the number of the boat and men, the time when, and the place from which she has sailed, and to what station, shall be entered by the master remaining on shore belonging to said boat within one hour thereafter, if in the day, or if in the night, by nine o'clock the following morning.

XXXV.

That in the event of the first boat on turn not proceeding to its destination at the proper time, each master shall be fined in a sum not exceeding five pounds, and it shall then be the duty of the second boat to proceed to the station; and in case the master of the second boat neglects his duty, he shall be fined in a sum not exceeding five pounds.

XXXVI.

That the boat following boat shall bring any hands down to their own boat; but if she has boarded all her hands and left her station, then the boat bringing them down shall board them on the first vessels wanting pilots.

XXXVII.

That on the renewal of any license in place of one lost, a fine not exceeding three guineas be levied according to the circumstances of the case.

XXXVIII.

That all unattached pilots be summoned to appear before the Committee, to account for their not being attached to a boat.

XXXIX.

That all cases of complaint for neglect of duty shall be brought before the Committee; and that no master shall charge a pilot with pilotage for neglect, or otherwise compromise any offence of a pilot, and in default the master to be fined, not exceeding the sum of five pounds.

XL.

That a ball be hoisted at the mast head of each boat after boarding all hands at the westward station, until answered by telegraph, and again when abreast of the N.W. Lightship, until answered by a ball at Bidston, as a signal for the next boat on turn to proceed; and also when the boat or boats on the Hoylake station have boarded all hands, the said ball to be hoisted at the gaff end.

XLI.

That the first boat on the western station, when she shall have boarded all hands except two, in order that she may return to Liverpool, shall transfer them to the second boat, which boat shall be compelled to receive and board them on the first vessels requiring pilots.

XLII.

That the boat sailing for the second Hoylake station take (when required) any hands belonging to the boat next on turn for the fourth western or first Hoylake station.

XLIII.

That if a pilot be boarded on any vessel at Hoylake or the westward stations, and the vessel be subject to quarantine, or the pilot be detained otherwise with such vessel under his charge, until the boat to which he belongs has finished the cruise, that such pilot shall be considered as though he had actually performed the cruise; but if such pilot's boat shall be out on the western station, then such pilot be sent to his boat according to bye-law.

XLIV.—Complaints, how to be made.

All complaints of offences against the Act of Parliament for the better government and regulation of pilots, or the foregoing orders, rules, and bye-laws, or any of them, must be made in writing, signed by the party aggrieved, and delivered to the Committee-clerk, or left at the office, at least two days before the next meeting of the Committee; and the clerk shall thereupon summon the party complained of, the party aggrieved, and all such persons as they, or either of them, may desire to be examined as evidences, to attend the next meeting of the Committee for that purpose.
