PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An "Act further to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed as follows, viz.:

- In the parish churchyard, and in the burialgrounds of the Independent and Wesleyan Chapels, Alton, Hants, from the first of June to the first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;
- In the burial-ground of the Baptist Chapel, Ashford, Kent, from the first of September next to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, provided that only one body be buried in each grave, that no grave be re-opened, and that every grave be made six feet deep at the least;
- In the parish churchyard of AYLSHAM, from the first of June to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

- In the parish churchyard of St. Peter, Bengworth, from the first of June to the twenty-ninth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;
- In the churchyard of the parish of BERKELEY, from the fifth of May to the fifth of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;
- In the parish churchyard of Berwick-upon-Tweed, from the thirtieth of June to the thirty-first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;
- In the parish churchyard of Bolton, in the county of Lancaster, and in the churchyards of St. George, the Holy Trinity, All Saints, Christ Church, and Emmanuel Church, and in the burial-grounds of the following chapels, namely the Baptist Chapel Moor-lane, the Wesleyan Chapel Bridge-street, the Wesleyan Chapel Bridge-street, the Roman Catholic Chapel St. Peter and St. Paul Pilkington-street, the Independent Chapel Mawdsley-street, Albert-place Chapel, the Independent Methodist Chapel Fold's-road, the Primitive Methodist Chapel Higher Bridge-street, the Unitarian Chapel Deansgate, and the Refugee Chapel Hauoverstreet, in the Ridgway Gates Wesleyan Burial-ground, and in the Quakers' Burial-ground, all in the said borough of Bolton, from the first of July next to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;
- In the churchyard of the parish of Bownesson-Windermere, from the first of May to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;
- In the parish churchyard of Bradford, in the county of Wilts, and in the burial-grounds of the Baptist Chapel, Zion Chapel, the Wesleyan Chapel, Lady Huntingdon's Chapel Bearfield, and of the Independent or Congregational Chapel, all in that town, from the first of July to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;
- In the churchyard, and in the burial-grounds of the Wesleyan and Baptist Chapels, in the parish of Braintree, Essex, from the first of June to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;
- In the churchyard of Cherstow, from the twenty-fifth of March last to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the parish churchyard of Chorley, and in the burial-grounds of George-street Independent Chapel, of the Wesleyan Chapel, Park-road, and of Hollinshead-street Chapel, in that parish, from the first of July next to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the parish churchyard, and in the burialgrounds of the Baptist and Independent Chapels, and of the Friends' Meeting-house, COGGESHALL, Essex, from the first of June to the first of September, one thousand eight

hundred and fifty-six;

In the churchyard of St. Colomb Major, from the first of July to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, provided that burials be confined to the new portion of the churchyard, and that only one body be buried in each grave;

In the churchyard of the parish of CULLOMPTON, from the first of July to the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the Upper Churchyard of Dartford, Kent, from the twenty-fourth of June to the twenty-ninth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the churchyard of the parish of St. Thomas the Apostle, EXETER, from the first of July to the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the churchyard of the parish of Fower, from the first of June to the first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

In the burial-ground of GREENWICH HOSPITAL, from the first of July next to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the parish churchyard, and in the Wesleyan Chapel Burial-ground, HACKFORD-NEXT-REEPHAM, from the first of June to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and

fifty-six;

In the parish churchyard, and in the burialgrounds of the Independent, Baptist, and Primitive Methodist Chapels, HADLEIGH, Suffolk, from the first of June to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fiftysix:

In St. Luke's Churchyard, Herwood, and in the burial-grounds of the Wesleyan Chapel, Market-street, of the Wesleyan Methodist Association, of the Baptist Chapel, of the New Jerusalem Chapel, and of the Independent Chapel, all in Heywood, in the parish of Bury, Lancashire, from the first of June to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the churchyard of the parish of HITCHIN, Herts, from the first of June to the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and

fifty-six:

In the old burial-ground of HYTHE, Kent, from the first of June to the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In the parish churchyard and new burial-ground of Leigh, Lancashire, in the burial-grounds of the Wesleyan and Roman Catholic Chapels, in the township of Bedford, and in the burial-grounds of the Primitive Methodist, Bethesda, and Wesleyan Chapels, in the township of Pennington, all in the parish of Leigh, from the first of July to the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six;

In All Saints Churchyard, and in the burialgrounds of the General Baptist Chapel, Woodgate, of the Roman Catholic Chapel, of the Baptist Chapel Sparrow-hill, and of the Independent Chapel, all in LOUGHBOROUGH, from the first of October next to the first of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard of St. Michael, Mere, Wilts, from the first of June to the twenty-fifth of December, one thousand eight hundred and

fifty-six;

In the churchyard of MIDSOMER NORTON, from the first of July to the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, provided that (except in vaults and walled graves) burials be confined to the portion of the ground, which has hitherto been unused;

In the churchyards of All Saints and St. Catherine, Wigan, and in the burial-grounds attached to the Independent Chapel, Standishgate, to the Presbyterian Chapel, to St. Mary's Roman Catholic Chapel, Standishgate, to Lord-street Chapel, and to St. John's Roman Catholic Chapel, Standishgate, in the said borough, from the first of June to the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.
