HEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act "to amend and render more effectual an Act "passed in the last session of Parliament for "building and promoting the building of additional "churches in populous parishes," and of the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to make further "provision and to amend and render more effectual three Acts passed in the fifty-eighth and "fifty-ninth years of His late Majesty, and in the "third year of His present Majesty, for building "and promoting the building of additional "churches in populous parishes," and in pursuance of all other powers or authorities in the Church Building Acts, have duly made and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Swansea, in the county of Glamorgan, and in the diocese of Saint David's, it appears to them to be expedient that a par-ticular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate in the said parish of Swansea (which said church was built by subscription under the provisions of the Act secondly hereinafter mentioned), under and by virtue of the power and authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of addi-'tional churches in populous parishes,' and also under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to make further provision and to amend and render more effectual three Acts passed in the fifty-eighth and fifty-ninth years of His late Majesty, and in the third year of His present Majesty, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and of all other powers or authorities in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, 'Swansea,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary line commences at the southern end of High-street, opposite to College-street, and proceeds northerly along the middle of High-street, as far as Ebenezer-street; then turns westerly and proceeds along the middle of Ebenezer-street and Craig-street as far as Evan-place; then turns southernly and proceeds along the middle of Evan-place, passing the western end of Quarry-street to a footpath running at the foot of the hill called Craig-footpath, and then along the middle of that footpath south-westerly to a road now forming and running north-westerly into Craig-place; then turns southerly and proceeds along the middle of Craig-place, Mount Pleasant, and Dynevor-place, into Gower-street; then turns easterly and proceeds along the middle of Gower-street and College-street to the southern end of High-street, to the point where the boundary line commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that baptisms and churchings should be performed in the said church of the Holy Trinity, at Swansea aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Connop, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, and also the consents of the Reverend Charles Bridges, late of Weymouth, but now of Hinton Martell, in the county of Dorset, Clerk, the Reverend Edmund Hollond, of Benhall, in the county of Suffolk, Clerk, William Long, of Sturts Hall, in the county of Suffolk, Esquire, and James Morgan Strachan, of Teddington, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, Patrons of the

Parish Church of the said parish of Swansea; of the Reverend Edward Burnard Squire, Vicar and Incumbent of the same Parish Church, and of Rebecca Yerbury, of Cheltenham, in the county of Gloucester, Spinster, Mary Jane Kinnaird, of Pall-Mall East, in the county of Middlesex, Wife of the Honourable Arthur Fitzgerald Kinnaird, of the same place, Elizabeth Blisset, of Clifton, in the county of Gloucester, the said Charles Bridges Edmund Hollond and James Morgan Strachan, as the majority of the Subscribers intitled to elect the Trustees of Trinity Church, at Swansea aforesaid, have been respectively obtained thereto as required by the Act and section secondly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a particular district to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, in the parish of Swansea, to be named "THE DISTRICT CHAPELRY OF THE HOLY TRINITY, SWANSEA," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the solemnization of baptisms and churchings, in the said church, and in respect of the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty by and with the like advice is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Saint David's.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Bisham, and of the District Chapelry of Cookham Dean, in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford, it appears to

them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parish of Bisham, and of the said District Chapelry of Cookham Dean, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of Saint James, situate at Stubbings, in the said parish of Bisham, under the powers for this purpose, contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the 'Church Building Acts,' as enlarged by the nineteenth and twentieth sections of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to ' amend the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry, should be named 'THE CONSOLIDATED CHAPELRY OF STUBBINGS,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"On or towards the north, by the remaining part of the said parish of Bisham, from which the said Consolidated Chapelry of Stubbings is separated by a line, commencing at the north-west where the road to Henley crosses the boundary line, separating the said parish of Bisham from the parish of Hurley, and proceeding from such point in a southerly direction along the eastern side of such road, as far as the northern fence of enclosure No. 334 on the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Bisham, then turning easterly along the northern fence of such enclosure, and southerly along the eastern fence thereof, as also of Nos. 335, 336, 337, 342, and 343 to 344, then south-easterly along the north-eastern fences of the said No. 344 and No. 351, until it reaches the western enclosure of the parsonage house and grounds, and following such line of enclosure northerly, easterly, south-easterly and southwesterly, until it again reaches the enclosure No. 351, then proceeding south-easterly along such enclosure, until it reaches the boundary line in the said parish of Bisham, then proceeding in a northeasterly direction along such boundary line, as far as the road to Marlow from Maidenhead, the con-solidated chapelry is then bounded on or towards the east, by proceeding in a north-easterly direction along the middle of the said road to Marlow as far as the north-western fence of enclosure No. 1172 on the Tithe Commutation Map of the parish of Cookham, and proceeding southerly along the western fences of enclosures Nos. 1172, 1171, 1170 to the southern fence of enclosure No. 1264, then turning westerly along the southern fences of enclosures Nos. 1264 and 1263 to the northern fence of enclosure No. 1265, and continuing westerly along such fence, and also of No. 1266 to the western fence thereof, then turning southerly along such western fence to the northern fence of No. 1269, then westerly along the northern fence thereof, and southerly along the western fence thereof to the northern fence of No. 1281, then westerly along the northern fence, and southerly along the western fence thereof to the northern fence of No. 1287, then following the line of fence of No. 1287, first southerly then westerly and again southerly to No. 1291, continuing southerly along the western fences of Nos. 1291 and 1295 down to the boundary line of the parish of Bray, the said Consolidated Chapelry of Stubbings is then bounded on or towards the south, partly by the said parish of Bray, and partly by the parish of White Waltham, and on or towards the west, by the parish of Henley, as such consolidated chapelry is more particularly shewn by the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink and yellow.

"That the consents of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, of George Henry Vansittart, of Bisham Abbey, in the said county of Berks, Esquire, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Bisham, and of the Reverend Joseph Thomas Brown, Master of Arts, Vicar and Incumbent of the parish of Cookham, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and (as such Vicar and Incumbent) patron of the church of the said district chapelry of Cookham Dean, have been obtained to the formation of the said Consolidated Chapelry of Stubbings, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said George Henry Vansittart and Joseph Thomas Brown as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid, and Henry Duncan Skrine, of Stubbings aforesaid, and of Warleigh, in the parish of Bathford, in the county of Somerset, Esquire (in whom his heirs and assigns the right of presentation and appointment of a minister to serve the said church of Saint James, at Stubbings aforesaid, is now vested under the powers contained in the twenty-third section of the Act of Parliament firstly hereinbefore mentioned, as amended by the fourth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the law relative to the assignment of Ecclesiastical Districts,') testified by his signing and sealing this representation (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and of the said Samuel, Bishop of Oxford, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Saint James, at Stubbings aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the said Henry Duncan Skrine, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of Saint James, at Stubbings, in the parish of Bisham, to be named "THE CONSOLIDATED CHAPELRY OF STUBBINGS," be accordingly formed; and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and that the right of presentation and nomination to the said church shall belong to, be vested in, and whenever occa-sion may require, be exercised by Henry Duncan Skrine, Esquire, his heirs and assigns for ever, they being the persons mentioned in such agreement; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Oxford.

THEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the fourth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act concerning banns and marriages in cer-"tain district churches or chapels," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six,

in the words following, viz.:
"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, beg leave humbly to represent that on or about the twenty-ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, your Majesty's said Commissioners with the consent of the Right Reverend John Bird (then Bishop of the diocese of Chester), made a representation to your Majesty in Council, that it appeared to them to be expedient, and therefore humbly prayed, that a particular district should be assigned to (amongst others) the consecrated church of Saint George, situate at Hyde, in the parish of Stockport, in the county and diocese of Chester, under and by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render 'more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the 'building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The Chapelry District or SAINT GEORGE, HYDE,' and that the boundaries thereof should be such as were described in the said representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners also represented, that it appeared to them to be expedient, that baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed in Saint George's Church, at Hyde aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom, should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time

being.
"That by an Order of your Majesty in Council,
"That by an Order of your Majesty in Council, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, your Majesty was graciously pleased, by and with the advice of your Privy Council, to approve of the assignment of the said district, and to order that the same should be accordingly made, and also that the recommendations of your Majesty's said Commissioners in respect of the solemnization of baptisms, churchings and burials, and of the fees arising therefrom, should be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that having taken into consideration the present circumstances of the said chapelry district of Saint George, Hyde, it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient that banns of marriage should hereafter be published, and that marriages should hereafter be solemnized in such church, and that the fee, to arise therefrom, should be equally divided between the present rector or incumbent of the said parish of Stockport (the Reverend Charles Kenrick Prescot) and the incumbent for the time being of the said church of St. George, at Hyde aforesaid, during such time as the said Charles Kenrick

Prescot shall so remain rector or incumbent of Stockport as aforesaid, and that, upon his avoidance thereof, all the said fees should belong to the incumbent for the time being of Saint George's Church aforesaid, and that a Supplemental Order for such purpose should be made pursuant to the provisions of the fourth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the seventh and eighth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act concern-'ing banns and marriages in certain district 'churches or chapels.'

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof, he has signed and sealed this representa-

tion.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation into consideration was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is by this Supplemental Order in Council ordered, that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages in the said consecrated church of SAINT GEORGE, HYDE, in the parish of Stockport, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Supplemental Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.

ORDINANCE ABOVE REFERRED TO.

We, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act passed in the 17th and 18th years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make further provision for "the good government and extension of the Uni-"versity of Oxford, of the Colleges therein, and of the College of Saint Mary, Winchester," do, in execution of the powers given to us by the said Act, hereby ordain as follows:

It shall be lawful for the Master and Fellows of

commonly called University College, in Oxford, if they shall think it expedient so to do, but not otherwise, to suspend the election of one Fellowship within the said College (which shall be either the first or the second that shall become vacant after the approval of this Ordinance by Her Majesty in Council) for any period not exceeding ten years from the day on which such Fellowship shall have become actually vacant; and the emoluments of such Fellowship during such suspension shall be appropriated and applied as hereinafter directed.

The stipend and all other emoluments which the Fellow on the foundation of such Fellowship would have been entitled to receive, had the same been filled up, shall, during the period of suspension, be set apart and carried to a separate account in the College books, and the funds accruing therefrom shall be wholly applied in or towards the foundation of new Scholarships (or Exhibi-tions, either limited or not limited,) within the College, or in or towards augmenting the emoluments of any existing Scholarships or Exhibitions, or to all, or any, or either of those purposes, but in such manner in all respects, and subject to such regulations and provisions, as to the accumulation and investment of such funds, or any part thereof, and the number and constitution of the said Scholarships or Exhibitions, and otherwise, as we, the said Commissioners, or other the Commissioners exercising the powers of the said Act, for the time being, shall, by any ordinance or ordinances to be made in execution of those powers, direct, and in default of, and subject to, any such ordinance, as the Master and Fellows of the College shall from time to time determine.

The expediency of exercising or not exercising the power of suspension hereby given, the choice of the Fellowship to be suspended, the period of suspension, and the manner in which the stipend and other emoluments of such suspended Fellowship are to be applied, and all other matters (if any) which under this Ordinance are left to the discretion of the Master and Fellows of the College, shall, subject to the foregoing provisions, be determined by the Master and Fellows present at any College meeting or meetings, held in manner prescribed by the statutes and regulations of the College for the time being, as if such matters had formed part of the ordinary business of such meeting or meetings.

against the approbation of the said Ordinance, or of any part thereof.

ORDINANCE ABOVE REFERRED TO.

We, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act passed in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make fur" ther provision for the good government and "extension of the University of Oxford, of the "Colleges therein, and of the College of Saint "Mary, Winchester," do, in execution of the powers given to us by the said Act, ordain as follows:

1. No present or future Fellow of Balliol College, in Oxford, shall be bound as a condition of qualification for the retention of his Fellowship to enter into Holy Orders, and every or any statute, or clause or provision of a statute, of the said College requiring or adjoining all or any of the Fellows thereof to enter into Holy Orders, shall henceforth, so far as regards such requirement or injunction, be absolutely void.

If at the time when any vacant Fellowship within the said College ought, according to the Statutes and Regulations of the said College, to be filled up, there shall not be four Fellows of the said College in Holy Orders, no person shall be capable of being elected to such Fellowship who shall not then be a Priest or Deacon of the United Church of England and Ireland, provided that if, in any such case, the vacancy shall have occurred within three calendar months before the usual day of election, it shall be lawful for the Master and Fellows, if they shall think fit, to postpone the election for any period not longer than one year.

2. The Scholarships, now ten in number, of the original foundation within Balliol College, and the two Scholarships of Dame Elizabeth Periams foundation shall be consolidated into four Scholarships, in manner hereinafter directed.

The said twelve existing Scholarships shall, as vacancies occur therein, not be filled up, but the corporate revenues of the College shall be charged with the maintenance (instead of the said twelve Scholarships) of four Scholarships, to each of which a yearly stipend of not less than fifty-six pounds shall be attached, payable out of such corporate revenues, before any division thereof among the Fellows of the College.

The time at which the first election shall be held to each of the said four Scholarships (from which time, and not before, the stipend attached to such Scholarship shall become payable) shall be in the discretion of the Master and Fellows; provided that all the said four Scholarships shall be filled up as quickly as the occurrence of vacancies in the existing twelve Scholarships shall make it practicable to do so conveniently.

The Exhibition of John Blagdon's foundation, the two Scholarships of John Edgcombe's foundation, the two Scholarships of Richard Ellsworth's foundation, the two Scholarships of Charles Harris's foundation, the Exhibition of Mary Headlam's foundation, and the Exhibitions of Roger Mander's foundation, shall be consolidated into four Scholarships within the said College, in manner following, that is to say: the same several Exhibitions and Scholarships shall, as vacancies occur therein, not be filled up, but all the emoluments of, and appertaining to, the same, which would have been payable to the persons elected into the same, and their successors, had the same been filled up, shall be applied as the same shall become available in maintaining four Scholars within the said College, each of whom shall receive

yearly one-fourth part of the total amount of such emoluments.

The time at which the first election shall be held to each of the last-mentioned four Scholarships, shall be in the discretion of the Master and Fellows, provided that a separate account shall be opened and kept in the books of the College of the emoluments which shall become available from the source last hereinbefore mentioned, and the said emoluments shall, as the saine shall become available, be applied in the first place, if the Master and Fellows shall think fit, in repaying to the domus fund of the College any monies which the Master and Fellows may, before the whole of such emoluments shall have become available, have voluntarily advanced out of the divisible corporate revenues of the College, for the purpose of accelerating the establishment of the last-mentioned four Scholarships, and, subject thereto, in establishing and maintaining the same four Scholarships, and to no other purpose whatsover.

In elections to the eight Scholarships to be established, pursuant to this Ordinance, and in elections to the two Scholarships of Dr. Bell's foundation, no preference shall be given to any person on account of his place of birth or parentage, or of his being of the name, lineage, kindred, or consanguinity of any person named in any deed or will, charter, or other instrument whatever, or of his being, or having been, a Scholar of any school.

The holders of the eight Scholarships to be established pursuant to this ordinance, and the two Scholars on Dr. Bell's foundation, shall be entitled, in addition to their respective stipends or emoluments, to receive tuition free from all charges, and shall be elected on the same days, by the same persons, and in the same manner, and shall be liable to deprivation by the same authority, for the same causes, and in the same manner, as the Scholars of the original foundation are now elected and liable, and shall be subject to such regulations as to their instruction, discipline, and attendance on divine worship, as the Master and Fellows may, from time to time, prescribe.

No person who shall have attained the age of nineteen years shall be eligible to any of the eight Scholarships to be established pursuant to this Ordinance, or to either of the two Scholarships of Dr. Bell's foundation.

Every Scholar of the said College shall, on admission to his Scholarship, be admonished by the Master of the College to observe the statutes and bye-laws of the College so far as they may concern such Scholar.

The several oaths prescribed by the statutes of the College to be taken on election to a Fellowship before the admission of a Probationer to an actual Fellowship, and before admission to a Scholarship respectively, the oath prescribed by the ordinance of John Feckenham and William Wright, dated the fourteenth day of March, one thousand five hundred and fifty-eight, and the oath prescribed or referred to in an indenture, dated the eleventh day of November, one thousand six hundred and fifteen, and made between the surviving executors of the will of Peter Blundell, of the first part, the Master and Scholars of Balliol College of the second part, and the surviving Feoffees of the lands of the said Peter Blundell, named in his will, of the third part, shall not hereafter be administered or taken.

Art. 1. The provisions of Articles one and two of the Law of 3rd July of the present year, are applicable to biscuit and the several maccaronis for soup, which may be introduced by the frontier and sea-port towns of the kingdom, on payment of the duties established for flour and baked bread.

Art. 2. The importation of foreign Indian corn is permitted through the sea-ports to the south of the kingdom, from Figuiera, inclusive, to Villa

Real de Santo Antonio, according to the terms of the first and second Articles of the above-mentioned Law.

Art. 3. All legislation to the contrary is hereby revoked.

The President of the Council of Ministers, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and Minister and Secretary of State for Public Works, Commerce, and Industry, and the Minister and Secretary of State for the Finance Department,—witness this and execute it.

Specification given of the position and appearance of the Lights, by Mr. Halpin, Superintendent of Lighthouses.

The Lighthouse Tower is built on the northeast point of Rathlin Island, situate in Lat. 55° 18′ 10″ N., and Long. 6° 10′ 45″ W., bearing

From Rhins of Islay Light, S., distant 28 nautic miles.

From Mull of Cantire Light, W.N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., distant 13 nautic miles.

The lower light will be fixed, of the natural appearance; and being placed 61 feet below the level of the upper, will be seen as a separate light within the distance of 10 miles, and from seaward between the bearings of S.E. b S. and N.N.E. & E.
