THE Queen has been pleased to appoint Miss Louisa Gordon to be one of the Maids of Honour in Ordinary to Her Majesty, in the room of the Honourable Mary Seymour, resigned.

Downing-Street, November 6, 1856.

The Queen has been pleased to appoint Robert William Keate, Esq., to be Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Trinidad and its Dependencies.

Whitehall, November 3, 1856.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Henry Blagrove (heretofore Henry Bradshaw), sometime of Abshott, in the county of Hants, but now of Lifton-park, in the county of Devon, Esquire, second but eldest surviving son and heir of James Bradshaw, Esquire, a Captain in the Royal Navy, deceased, by Elizabeth, his wife, one of the daughters and coheirs of the late John Blagrove, of Ankerwyke House, in the county of Bucks, Esquire, and grandson of Robert-Haldane Bradshaw, of Woodmans, in the parish of Kings Langley, in the county of Herts, Esquire, also deceased, Her Majesty's royal licence and authority that he and his issue may resume and henceforth use the surname of Bradshaw and bear the arms of Bradshaw only, in compliance with a proviso contained in the last will and testament of his late grandfather, the said Robert-Haldane Bradshaw, deceased, such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise the said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

Cape Race Light, Newfoundland

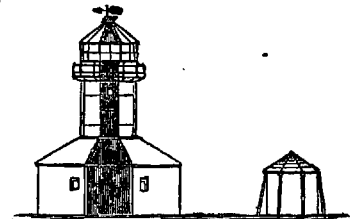
THE Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade give notice, that the Lighthouse recently erected upon Cape Race (Newfoundland)

will be lighted, and will continue to exhibit a *fixed white light*, from sunset to sunrise, on and after the 15th of December, 1856.

The light will be visible to seaward from N.E. by E. round by the S.E. and South to West.

The light is elevated 180 feet above mean water level of the sea, and may be seen in clear weather 17 miles from a

ship's deck. The tower appears as shown herewith, and is striped red and white vertically. It stands close to the old beacon, which has been cut down, as shown in the sketch.

The lighthouse is in lat. $46^{\circ} 39' 12''$ N., long. $53^{\circ} 2' 38''$ W.

[All bearings are magnetic. Var. 24° W.]
