The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of 'populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the prebend of Beechill and Knaresborough, in the cathedral and metropolitan church of York, and now vested in us.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rentcharges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rentcharges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property herein-after described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing duly executed according to law, with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein; and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements,

or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

"And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to the said prebend of Beechill and Knaresborough (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage), became vested in us on the passing of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof:

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and after due consideration it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said prebend of Beechill and Knaresborough, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London

Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation bearing date the sixth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following, viz.:-

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of East Moulsey, in the county of Surrey and diocese of Winchester, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate at Kent Town, in the said parish of East Moulsey, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and in the third section of an Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," and that such proposed district should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul Kent Town,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: Commencing at Hampton Court Bridge and running in a north-westerly direction up the towing-path and River Thames to the boundary of West Moulsey parish, then running in a south-westerly direction along the said boundary of West Moulsey parish to the middle of the road leading to Hershams and Esher, then running in an easterly direction along the road to the middle of Manor-road, then running in a north-easterly direction up Manor-road to the public footpath, then running in an easterly direction along the public footpath to the road from Claremont, then in a north-easterly direction along the last-mentioned road and the river Mole to Hampton Court Bridge aforesaid, where the boundary line of the said district chapelry of Saint Paul Kent Town com-

menced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Paul at Kent Town aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, at Kent Town, in the parish of East Moulsey, in the county of Surrey, to be called "THE DISTRICT CHAPELRY OF SAINT PAUL KENT TOWN," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, in the said church, and in respect of the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her

Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed as follows, viz.:

In the parish churchyard of ASHEY-DE-LA-ZOUCH, from the first of January to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard of the parish of BOCKING, Essex, from the first of December next to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the parish churchyard of CASTLEFORD, in the county of York, from the first of January to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the "New Burial-grounds," in the parish of FOLKESTONE, from the first of November instant, to the first of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard of the parish of FOWEY, from the first of December next to the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard of the parish of GODALMING, from the first of November instant, to the first of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the parish churchyard, GRANTHAM, in the county of Lincoln, in the Roman Catholic Burial-ground, Grantham, in the parish of Manthorpe-cum-Little Gonerby, and in Ebenezer Chapel Burial-ground, in the parish of Spittlegate, from the first of January to the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard of St. Michael, MERE, Wilts, from the twenty-fifth of December next, to the first of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the existing burial-grounds of the parishes of St. Thomas, St. Edmund, and St. Martin, SALISBURY, from the first of December next, to the first of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard, and in the burial-grounds of the Wesleyan and Baptist Chapels, TON-DINGTON, Beds, from the first of November instant, to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the parish churchyard of TWEEDMOUTH, from the first of January to the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard of St. Matthew, and in the parochial burial-ground in Bath-street, WAL-SALL, from the first of December next, to the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the churchyard, and in the Independent Chapel Burial-ground, WRAWBY, in the county of Lincoln, from the first of December next, to the first of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the eighth of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three burials were directed to be discontinued in the burial-ground of the parish of SAINT ANDREW, HOLBORN, situated in Gray's-inn-road, from

the time mentioned in such Order, and such time has been extended by an Order in Council of the thirteenth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, until the city burial-ground should be fit for use, and it seems fit that the said last-mentioned Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said burial-ground of the parish of Saint Andrew, Holborn, in Gray's-inn-road, be closed from and after the tenth of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the twenty-fourth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, burials were directed to be discontinued in St. Bartholomew's Churchyard, BIRMINGHAM (except in existing vaults and walled graves in which each coffin should be separately entombed in an air-tight manner), on and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, in lieu thereof, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the said churchyard, on and after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, except in now existing vaults and walled graves which can be opened without the disturbance of soil which has been buried in, and in which each coffin shall be imbedded in powdered charcoal, and separately entombed in an air-tight manner.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the eleventh of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued in the churchyard of OLD WINDSOR, from and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and such period has since been extended to the first of August last, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the use of the now existing vaults and brick graves in the said churchyard of Old Windsor be permitted, provided that the said vaults and brick graves, when required, be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in powdered charcoal four inches in thickness, and separately entombed in brick-work properly cemented.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the

public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications:

**BODVARI, DENBIGHSHIRE.**—In the *parish church* and within three yards thereof, and in the rest of the *churchyard*, except in graves not less than five feet deep; and that no grave previously buried in be reopened unless free from undecomposed remains, nor except to bury another of the same family.

**MOLD.**—In the *parish church*, and in *Pontblydden Chapel of Ease*, and also (except in now existing family vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be imbedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner) in the old part of the *churchyard*, and in the rest of *churchyard*, and in *Pontblydden Chapelyard*, except in vaults and walled graves used with the like precautions, and in other graves so far as is compatible with the following regulations, viz.: that one body only is to be buried in one grave; no grave to be reopened within fourteen years, except to bury another of the same family, in which case a layer of earth half a yard thick shall be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin; no coffin to be placed less than four feet below the surface; no new grave to be within half a yard of any other grave.

**BARNSELY, IN THE PARISH OF SILKSTONE.**—In the *Roman Catholic Chapel*, Barnsley, in the *Primitive Methodist Chapel, Westgate*, also in *St. George's Burial-ground*, within six yards of the National School and Playground, and (with the exception of now existing brick graves) in all parts of the ground which have already been buried in; and that, with the same exception, no grave be reopened: that from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight (with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves), burials be discontinued in the two churchyards of *St. Mary*, and in the burial-grounds of *Salem Chapel*, the *Roman Catholic Chapel*, the *Methodist New Connexion Chapel*, and the *Independent Chapel, Sheffield-road*. That the now existing vaults and brick graves in all the above burial-grounds, and also the brick graves in *St. George's Churchyard*, be used on the following conditions; viz.: that when required they be used without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and that each coffin be imbedded in powdered charcoal four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work, properly cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fourteenth day of January next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said fourteenth day of January.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in any of the under-mentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications:

**BASFORD, NOTTS.**—Forthwith in the *parish church*, and also (with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each coffin shall be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in an air-tight manner) in the *Old Churchyard*, in the burial-grounds of the *Methodist New Connexion Chapel*, of the *Wesleyan Methodist Chapel*, of the *Scotch Baptist Chapel, New Basford*, and of the *General Baptist Chapel, New Basford*. That in no burial-ground in this parish shall any burial take place within five yards of any dwelling-house or school, nor without a covering of four feet six inches of earth, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the general surface of the ground, and that, with the exception of family graves, only one body be buried in each grave.

**MANSFIELD.**—Forthwith in the *parish church*, in the *Independent Chapel*, the *Baptist Chapel*, the *Unitarian Chapel*, and in the *Friends' Burial-ground*, within three yards of all dwelling-houses; and from and after the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven (with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves), in the *parish churchyard*, and in the burial-grounds of the *Independent, Baptist, Unitarian, and Wesleyan Chapels*. That the above-named vaults and brick graves be used only on the following conditions, viz.: that, when required, they be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in; that each coffin be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone works properly cemented, and that the only bodies interred be those of husbands, wives, parents, unmarried children, and brothers, and sisters of those already buried therein.

**CAMPSALL, YORKSHIRE.**—In the *parish church* Campsall, and from and after the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the *churchyard*.

**ASKERN, YORKSHIRE.**—In the parish churchyard of Askern within three yards of the walls of the church, and that burials be conducted in accordance with the 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th Official Regulations for New Burial-grounds.

**WILLENHALL.**—In the parish churchyard from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, except in now existing vaults and walled graves which can be opened without the disturbance of soil that has been buried in, in which each coffin shall be imbedded in powdered charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fourteenth day of January next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said fourteenth day of January.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

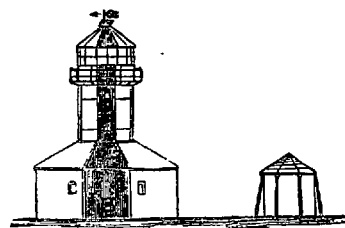
### *Cape Race Light, Newfoundland*

THE Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade give notice, that the Lighthouse recently erected upon Cape Race (Newfoundland) will be lighted, and will continue to exhibit a *fixed white light*, from sunset to sunrise, on and after the 15th of December, 1856.

The light will be visible to seaward from N.E. by E. round by the S.E. and South to West.

The light is elevated 180 feet above mean water level of the sea, and may be seen in clear weather

17 miles from a ship's deck. The tower appears as shown herewith, and is striped red and white vertically. It stands close to the old beacon, which has been cut down, as shown in the sketch.
