The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the "Church Building Acts," have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eleventh day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Swanscombe and Stone, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Rochester, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Greenhithe, in the said parish of Swanscombe, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Greenhithe,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary line of the said consolidated chapelry of Greenhithe commences at the wharf marked A in the map hereunto annexed, and known by the name of Hunt's Wharf, and proceeds in a southerly direction along the eastern side of the tramway which adjoins the fields numbered 124, 125, 126, respectively, on the title commutation map of the said parish of Swanscombe; then proceeds along the hedge, up the cliff which adjoins and overhangs the fields, numbered 130, 131, on the same map; then crosses the London turnpike-road, and proceeds in a south-westerly direction along the middle of the road called Knockholt-lane, and adjoining the fields numbered 135, 136, 164, in the same map; then proceeds along the hedge which separates the property called Knock-

holt Lodge and Cottages from the fields numbered 164, 137, 157; then proceeds again along the middle of Knockholt-lane in a south-westerly and southerly direction till it reaches the Roman-road at the south-east corner of the field numbered 168; then proceeds in a north-westerly direction along the middle of the Roman-road till it reaches the lane called Bean-lane; then proceeds in a northerly direction along the middle of Bean-lane till it reaches the London-road, which it crosses, and enters the field numbered 19 in the said tithe commutation map, and proceeds in a northerly direction along the line which marks the division between the parishes of Swanscombe and Stone till it reaches the railway; then proceeds in a north-westerly direction along the southern fence of the railway to the first archway under the said railway; then proceeds about fifty yards in a south-westerly direction at the back of four cottages belonging to Mr. Tilden; then proceeds in a due westerly direction till it meets the tramway, then turns to the north-east and proceeds in a straight line till it reaches the river Thames at a point twenty yards to the west of the tramway, and marked B in the plan or map hereunto annexed; then proceeds along the bank of the river in an easterly direction till it reaches the point A, where the boundary-line of the said consolidated chapelry commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured green and blue:

"That the consents of the Right Reverend George, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, and also patron in right of his see of the parish church of the said parish of Stone, and of the Master and Fellows of Sidney Sussex College, in the University of Cambridge, patrons of the parish church of the said parish of Swanscombe, have been obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Greenhithe, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof the said George, Bishop of Rochester, has signed and sealed this representation, and the said Master and Fellows have hereto affixed their common or corporate seal:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said George, Bishop of Rochester, and the said Master and Fellows, as such respective patrons as aforesaid (testified as aforesaid), with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinbefore mentioned, and of the said George, Bishop of Rochester (testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation

and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Saint Mary, at Greenhithe aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the said Master and Fellows of Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge aforesaid :

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned, for the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Greenhithe, in the parish of Swanscombe, and diocese of Rochester, to be called "THE CONSOLIDATED CHAPELRY OF GREENHITHE," be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation, in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act, and that the right of presentation and appointment of such incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church shall be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the Master and Fellows of Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge, they being the persons mentioned in such agreement; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Rochester.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches in pursuance of the seventeenth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Church Building Acts," have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eleventh day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the words following, viz. :

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that in the month of February, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, your Majesty's said Commissioners, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend William, late Bishop of the diocese of London, made a representation to your Majesty in Council, that it appeared to them to be expedient, and therefore humbly prayed, that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Thomas, situate at Stamford-hill, in the parish of Hackney, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, under and by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act

' passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and that such proposed district should be named or called 'Stamford-hill District,' and that the boundaries thereof should be such as were mentioned or described in the said representation.

"That by an Order of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, in Council, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, His Majesty was graciously pleased, by and with the advice of his Privy Council to approve of the assignment of the said district, and to order that the same should be accordingly made and effected agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

"That on the seventeenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, your Majesty's said Commissioners, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, late Bishop of the diocese of London, made a representation to your Majesty in Council that it appeared to them to be expedient, and they therefore humbly prayed, that a Supplemental Order in Council should be issued authorizing the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages at the said church of Saint Thomas, at Stamford-hill aforesaid, and for the assignment of the fees to the minister thereof, pursuant to the provisions contained in the fourth section of an Act passed in the seventh and eighth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act concerning banns and marriages in certain district churches or chapels.'

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that having taken into consideration the present circumstances of the said Stamford-hill District, it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient that baptisms, and churchings should hereafter be solemnized in the said church of Saint Thomas, at Stamford-hill aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being, and that a Supplemental Order for such purpose should be made pursuant to the provisions of the seventeenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the Church Building Acts.'

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve

thereof, and and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the solemnization of baptisms and churchings in the church of Saint Thomas, at Stamford-hill, in the parish of Hackney, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, and in respect of the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Holy Cross and Saint Giles, Shrewsbury, in the county of Salop, and in the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Giles, situate in the parish of Holy Cross and Saint Giles, Shrewsbury, under the powers for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Giles Shrewsbury,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The district chapelry of Saint Giles Shrewsbury is bounded on the east by the river Severn, on the south-east and south by the parishes of Atcham and Sutton, on the west by the lower or western course of the Meole Brook, as far as the fence separating fields, numbers 131 and 168 on the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Holy Cross Shrewsbury, and on the north by a line proceeding along such fence between fields

numbers 131 and 168, and crosses the upper course of the said Meole Brook to the fences between fields numbers 165 and 166 on the said tithe commutation map, and proceeding along such fence as far as Abbey Foregate-street (passing between two houses occupied by Miss Tunstall on the west and Miss Burton on the east), and crossing over that street proceeds between two houses (occupied by Mr. Dyas on the west and Mr. Randall on the east), and enters the yard of the Bell Inn, and then proceeds along the western and northern fences of fields numbers 354 and 353 on the said tithe commutation map, until the boundary line of the said district chapelry reaches Belvidere-lane, along the middle of which lane it proceeds north-easterly as far as the northern fences of fields numbers 311 and 312 on the said tithe commutation map, and proceeds along such fences to the river Severn on the east, as the said district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured yellow.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at Saint Giles's Church aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Cheswardine, Chetwynd, and Edgmond, in the county of Salop, and in the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, for the consecrated church of St. Luke, situate at Sambrook, in the said parish of Cheswardine, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry, should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of St. Luke, Sambrook,' and that the boundaries thereof, should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: from the point marked A, on the plan hereto annexed, being on the north side of the River Meese, the boundary follows the north bank of that river to point B, crossing Showell Brook, and there entering the township of Pickstock, in the parish of Edgmond, follows the bank of that river to point C, where it crosses the road leading from Chetwynd Heath to Pickstock, after which it takes the course of the river to point D, where it follows the boundary fences between the said parishes of Chetwynd and Edgmond, till it arrives at point E, the cross roads leading from Pickstock to Adbaston, and from Forton to Ellerton, it then runs along the north side of the said road leading to Ellerton (but does not include any portion of Adbaston parish), to point F, where it enters the parish of Cheswardine, near a watercourse at the west-end of Links Common, following this watercourse to point G, where it turns to the west, along fences belonging to Robert Masfield, Esq., till it reaches point H, on a road leading from Knighton to Hinstock, the north side of which road it follows, by Ellerton Mill, to point I, where it takes the boundaries between the parishes of Hinstock, Cheswardine, and Chetwynd, to point L, a road leading from Sambrook to Longpool, it crosses this road and proceeds a short distance on the north side thereof, to point M, another road leading from Sambrook to Howle, which it follows till it arrives at the Cross Hills, and the turnpike road leading from Chester to Newport, at point N, where it crosses this road and proceeds along the road leading from Sambrook to Howle, to point O, the boundary of Childs Ercall parish (but no part of which is included in the said consolidated chapelry), and proceeds to point P, called Hill Wicket, whence it takes the road leading from Childs Ercall to Caynton, to point Q, the junction of roads near where it meets the River Meese, and following the north bank of this river, it reaches point R, called Stanford Bridge, from this point it follows the boundary of Edgmond parish, along the said turnpike road leading to Newport, as far as point S, where it meets an occupation-road leading to Deepdale, and passing the farm house of that name, reaches the south side of the River Meese, opposite the first named

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."
