

## Exchequer Bills.

*Office of Her Majesty's Paymaster-General,  
Whitehall, February 24, 1857.*

The Exchequer Bills, dated in the month of March, 1856 (per Act 18 Vict., cap. 8, anno 1855), with the interest due thereon, will be paid off on the 16th March, 1857, when the interest will cease. Such bills will be received at this office daily, from half-past ten till three o'clock, until the 9th day of March, 1857, inclusive.

Printed forms, containing instructions for the preparation of the lists and the arrangement of the bills, may be obtained on application at this Office.

The bearers must endorse each bill with their usual signatures, and they must insert their names and addresses, in each list; and where the names of holders are inserted in the bills, the indorsements of such holders must also be obtained previously to their lists and bills being left for examination.

New bills, bearing interest at the rate of *two pence halfpenny* by the day, upon every one hundred pounds, and dated the said 16th day of March, 1857, may be obtained in payment of the principal of the whole, or part, of the Exchequer Bills issued under the Act above mentioned, on the claimants specifying, in their lists, the amount of new bills required by them.

The new bills, together with the interest on the bills left on or before the said 9th day of March for exchange, will be issued on the 17th day of March, 1857; the bearers must attend at this Office to sign receipts for the payment of principal and interest.

Payment in money, may be obtained at this Office for any of the said Exchequer Bills, previously to the said 16th day of March, 1857, upon the claimants leaving the bills for examination one day prior to that on which such payment is desired.

N. B. — All Exchequer Bills dated prior to March, 1856, have been previously advertised to be paid off.
