(No. 10.) PACIFIC OCEAN—CALIFORNIA.

Fixed Light at entrance of Humboldt Bay.

The United States Lighthouse Board has given notice, that on and after the 20th day of December, 1856, a light would be exhibited from the lighthouse recently erected on the North Sands, at the entrance of Humboldt Bay, California, on the Pacific.

The light is a fixed white light. The illuminating apparatus is a lens of the fourth order. The light is placed at a height of 56 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible from the deck of a ship in ordinary weather at a distance of 12 miles.

The lighthouse consists of a keeper's dwelling, a story and a half high, with a tower rising from the centre 21 feet above the roof; it is plastered and whitewashed, and surmounted by an iron lantern painted red. It stands on the North Sands, three quarters of a mile from the Inlet, and about midway between the bay and seashore, in lat. 40° 46' 4" N., long. 124° 12' 21" West from Greenwich, as determined by the United States Coast Survey.
