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Venice, December 4.

WE have Advice by a Vessel which arrived here yesterday from *Dalmatia*, that the Chevalier *Janco* being informed that a Party of *Turks* were on their march to *Ispo* with 30 Wagons laden with Provisions, he advanced towards them with the *Morlaques* under his Command, and falling upon the Enemy, put them to flight, and took all the Wagons. The new raised Men which lately arrived at the *Lido*, will embark the next week, to be transported to the *Morea*. The *Sieur de Lovelfeldt*, who has already raised a Regiment of 1000 Men for the Service of this Republick, has made an Agreement with the Senate to raise another, and has accordingly sent his Officers to make their Levies in *Germany*. There are now finished in the Arsenal ten new Gallies, and a Ship of above 60 Guns, which will be launched in few days. A great many Vessels are hired, by Order of the Senate, to carry Provisions and Ammunition to the *Morea*.

Stry in Poland, Nov. 18. The King's stay here was longer than he intended, by reason of his being taken ill with the Gout, which obliged him to keep his Bed eight days; but the 12th Instant his Majesty parted from hence with the whole Court for *Zolkien*, to be so much nearer to *Lembergh*, whither he had sent the Bishop of *Luceria*, and the great Chancellor of *Lithuania* to confer with the Ambassadors from the Czars of *Moscovy*, upon some Points which the *Moscovites* have started since the Conclusion of the late League at *Moscom*. These new difficulties do somewhat perplex this Court, who begin to have a great Jealousie that the Czars do not mean to enter into the War, in which they are confirmed by the Advices that come from several hands of the good Correspondence there is at present between the *Sieur Samulowitz*, General of the *Cossacks*, in the Service of the Czars, and the King of *Tartary*. Here is a discourse, that the King intends to send an Embassy to the *Sophy* of *Persia*, to invite him into the League against the *Turks*; And that the Pope will bear the Expence of it.

Buda, Nov. 28. A Party of 200 Janisaries on *Horseback*, of the Garison of *Alba Regalis*, being abroad the last week, were met by a Party of this Garison, of about the same number; They charged very bravely on both sides, and the Skirmish lasted above an Hour, but at last the *Turks* fled, leaving behind them 21 of their Company slain, and 15 Prisoners, who being brought thither, reported, that there is at present a very good Garison in *Alba Regalis*; And that the

Bassa is making several new Works to add to the Strength of the place. We have advice, that the Grand Visier is retired with 5000 Men to *Belgrade*, having before his departure from *Essecke*, reinforced that, and some other neighbouring Garisons. We are told from *Zolnock*; that the Fortresses of *Agria* and *Mongatz* are now so closely blockt up, that those Garisons cannot make any more Excursions. That General *Caraffa* had likewise resolved to block up *Great Waradin* this Winter, for which purpose Major-General *Heusser* had Orders to post himself in the Neighborhood of that place with 6 German Regiments, and 2500 *Hussars* and *Hoydukes* commanded by the Count *de Bargotzi*. The same Letters farther tell us, That the Count *de Veterani* was marching with four Regiments towards the Frontiers of *Transilvania*, to take their Winter-quarters in that Country. The Ramparts of this City, which were ruined during the late Siege, are as much repaired as the Season will permit. The Streets are all cleansed, and the number of Inhabitants encreases every day.

Vienna, Decemb. 5. They write from *Upper Hungary*, that General *Caraffa* was not yet agreed with Prince *Abafsi* concerning the Winter-quarters; That the greatest difficulty was about the Counties of *Zobolci*, *Bishovi*, *Czonograd* and *Ordantz*, which depended formerly on the Kingdom of *Hungary*; To free these from Winter-quarters Prince *Abafsi* offered a Sum of Money, but General *Caraffa* suspecting that his design was to amuse him with a Negotiation, till such time as the *Turks* had lodged themselves there, has sent Four Regiments, to possess themselves of the Passages and most considerable Posts in those Counties. We are told, that the Grand Visier intends to have his Head Quarter this Winter at *Temeswaer*; And that Sultan *Galga* is on his march with a considerable Body of *Tartars* towards the Frontiers of *Transilvania*; where he will take his Winter-quarters. A Letter has been intercepted from Count *Teckley* to the Princess *Ragotzi* his Wife, written the 26th of October at *Great Waradin*, in which, among other things, he acquaints her, that he was going to *Constantinople*, where his presence was very necessary, to negotiate several matters of great importance to him; And advises her to remove with her Plate, Jewels, and best Goods from *Mongatz*, to some secure place in *Transilvania*, for that he very much feared *Mongatz* would be attackt this Winter by the *Imperialists*. The last Letters from *Upper Hungary* said, That she was still at *Mongatz*, and that she had caused all the Villages thereabouts to be burnt, that the *Imperialists* might not lodge themselves in them. The Deputies that are

are here from the Republick of *Ragusa* to demand the Emperor's Protection, offer a yearly Tribute of 10000 Ducats, and to put their Militia under the Command of an Imperial Governor, whom they will likewise maintain at their own charge. The Grand Visier continues to solicit a Passport for an Envoy he would send hither.

Frankfort, Decemb. 5. The States of the Circle of the *Upper Rhine* being assembled at *Fridberg* in *Wetteravia*, the Magistrates of this City have sent Deputies to assist at this meeting, which, it's said, is chiefly intended for the regulating several matters relating to the Trade of the *Rhine*. An Officer is come hither, to raise Men for the Service of the Elector of *Brandenburgh*. The Prince of *Croy* arriv'd here the last week. The last Letters from *Vienna* tell us, that great Preparations are making for the next Campagne in *Hungary*.

Bonne, Decemb. 10. The States of this Archbishoprick, who had been some time assembled here, separated the 3d of this Month, having granted his Electoral Highness an Extraordinary Supply for the raising 3000 Foot in two Regiments, and 500 Horse, and 500 Dragoons. They have likewise settled a Fond for the maintaining the Troops his Electoral Highness has already on foot. The Cardinal of *Furstemberg*, Bishop of *Strasbourg*, parted from hence this morning for *France*, to receive the Cap from the Hands of his most Christian Majesty. The Magistrates of *Cologne* having received into their City between three and four hundred Men of the Forces of the Circle of *Westphalia*, our Elector pretends, as first Director of the said Circle, to send thither double that number, of his Troops; but those Magistrates have prayed his Electoral Highness to adjust this matter with the other Directors.

Postdam, Decemb. 11. The Elector of *Brandenburgh* and the Electoral Prince, who have been both very ill, are so well recovered, that it's hoped they will in few days appear abroad again. The *Brandenburgh* Forces that served in *Hungary*, are arriv'd at *Lignitz*.

Cologne, Decemb. 12. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners having finished their Commission, are preparing for their departure, which, it's believed, will not, however, be till after *Christmas*. The Duke of *Neuburg* has forbid all Foreign Levies within his Territories. We are told from *Strasbourg*, that the *French* work with great diligence on the new Fort they are building over against *Rastat*, where they intend, it's said, to lay a Bridge over the *Rhine*; In which 3000 Soldiers, besides the ordinary Workmen, are daily employ'd. The Count of *Oxenstern* pass'd some days ago through this place in his way to *Vienna*.

Hamburg, Decemb. 13. The last Letters from *Poland*, give an account, that their Majesties were come to *Zolkiew*; And that the Ambassadors of *Moscow* had refused to enter into Conference with the Commissioners the King had appointed to treat with them, till they had had their Audience of his Majesty. They write from *Moscow*, that there seems to be no great disposition in that Court to break with the *Turks*.

Hague, Decemb. 17. Yesterday the Council of State went in a Body to the Assembly of the *States General*, to give in the state of the War for the year ensuing, which will now be transmitted to the several Provinces, that they may give their consent to it. The Envoy of *Morocco* presented the last week a Memorial to the *States General*; And, the 13th Instant, had a Conference with the Deputies of the State upon the Subject of it. The States of *Holland* meet again to-morrow.

Hague, Decemb. 20. Her Royal Highness gave last night a very splendid Ball at her House in the *Bosch*. The Prince of *Friesland* is return'd to *Leeuwarden*. We have an account from *Flanders*; that the *French* Arms that were lately set up near *Namur*, have been taken down by Order from the Court of *France*. The Letters from *Vienna* tell us, that the Empress Dowager dyed there the 6th Instant in the 58th year of her Age, having been sick about three weeks.

Deale, Decemb. 14. Last Night came into the *Downes* His Majesties Ships, the *Bristol*, and *Crown*, from the *Streights*, with a hard Gale of Wind at S. S. W. which still continues.
