

# The London Gazette.

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Rome, Novemb. 23.

**T**HE Pope is indisposed with the Gout, which is the reason he has not for several days given any Audience. His Holiness has resolved to send the Emperor, and the King of Poland very considerable Supplies of Money, to be employed in the preparations for the next Campaign. Three hundred Men are daily at work, to repair the Bastion of the Castle of *St. Angelo*, which was thrown down by the late overflowing of the *Tiber*.

*Genova*, Dec. 3. Yesterday the Duke of *Mantua* parted from hence for *Milan*. The last Letters from thence said, the Marquis *de los Balbaces* was daily expected there from *Spain*. The Gally that carried the new Governor to *Corfica*, is come back.

*Venice*, Dec. 6: The Saïque which arrived here the last week from *Dalmatia*, with the news, that the Bassa of *Erzegovina* was on his march with 12000 Men towards *Sign*, has been sent back with Orders from the Senate to the Proveditore-General *Corinaro*, and with a considerable sum of Money for the payment of the Troops that are under his Command. We have since received advice, that the said Bassa, having contented himself with advancing to the Neighborhood of *Sign*, and setting fire to some Villages, was retired towards *Clin*, to put a Convoy of Provisions into that place. At the same time the Proveditore-General had taken his March towards *Zebenico* and *Scardona*, to cover those places. We are informed by a Vessel arrived from the *Levant*, That the Seraskier of the *Morea* had his Head-quarter at *Corinth*, from whence he sent out strong Parties to raise Contributions; one of these appearing within sight of *Napoli di Romania*, was attacked by some Troops of that Garrison, who had laid themselves in Ambush; The *Turks* for some time defended themselves very well, but were at last forced to retire with the loss of 200 Men killed or taken prisoners. By these Incurfions of

the Infidels, the *Greeks* are kept in continual Alarm, and hindered from openly declaring for the Republick. The Seraskier has caused divers of the most considerable of them to be imprisoned, to serve as Hostages for the rest, and exercises great Cruelties on all those he suspects of having any correspondence with the Christians. The Senate have resolved to raise 2000 *Morlaques*, in four Regiments, which will be Commanded by the Chevalier *Fanco*. They have likewise ordered a new Levy of 600 Horse. A great many Vessels laden with Soldiers, Provisions, and Ammunition, lye ready to Sail for the *Morea*.

*Warsaw*, Nov. 22. The last Letters from *Lemberg* told us, that the King and Queen were come to *Wilkes*, where they intended to stay a week or ten days. We are told that the Dyet will meet this time at *Grodno* in *Lithuania*. The *Turks* have put a Convoy of Provisions into *Caminiec*.

*Stockholme*, Nov. 27. The Dyet of this Kingdom separated the 15th Instant, after having consented to all that had been proposed to them by the King's Command: They went the same day in a Body to take their leave of their Majesties, and of the Prince. And the Queen having desired them to be Godfathers to the Child of which She expects every day to lie in, They returned her Majesty their humble Thanks for the Honor She did them, and appointed a Deputation to appear at this Solemnity on their behalf. It's said the King has offered to assist the Emperor with a considerable Body of Men the next Campaign.

*Vienna*, Dec. 5. The Grand Visier being sensible that the Affairs of the *Ottoman* Empire are at present in such a condition, that nothing but a speedy Peace can restore them, has made several Efforts to dispose this Court to agree to a Conference for that purpose. We have already given you an account of the Overtures he had made to General *Carrassa*, who Commands the Emperor's Forces in *Upper Hungary*, and can now further inform you, That Prince *Herman* of *Baden*, President of the Emperor's Coun-

cil of War, has lately received a Letter from *Maurò Cordato*, the Grand Signiors chief Droggerman, or Interpreter, wherein he tells him, How desirous the Port is of a Peace, and with what advantage to the Emperor it may be concluded in this Conjunction; and then proposes the naming of a Place for the meeting of Plenipotentiaries on both sides, and that Passports may be dispatched for those of the Grand Signior. This Letter having been read in the Council of War, it's said the Emperor ordered this Answer to be returned to it; That he will not hearken to any Proposals of Peace without the Participation and Consent of his Allies. The Council of War meets every day, and is chiefly busied with forming the state of the War for the next year. The Colonels of Foot who have received Money to make their Recruits, are obliged to have their Regiments compleat against the end of *March*: These Recruits will amount to 18000 Men. The Count *de Thurne*, and several other Persons of quality returned hither this week from *Hungary*.

*Hamburgh, Dec. 12.* The Senators *Afe'man* and *Langermonde* parted from hence the last week, the First being sent to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the other to the Dukes of *Zell*, *Hanouer*, and *Wolsembuttell*, to thank these Princes for their late assistance to this City. The Senate have resolved to keep on foot all the Troops that are at present in *Garison* here. We are told from *Pestdam* that the Elector of *Brandenburg* has given to Prince *Frederick* of *Cotirland* the Regiment lately Commanded by Prince *Alexander* his Brother, who dyed of the wound he received in the Siege of *Buda*. Several Officers are come hither to raise Recruits for the *Brandenburg* Troops that served this last Campaigne in *Hungary*.

*Amsterdam, Dec. 20.* We have an account of 22 Ships belonging to the Subjects of this State, that have been taken by the *Algerines* since this last Rupture.

*Paris, Dec. 21.* The King is so well, that he has walked these three last days after Dinner in his Gallery: Publick Prayers have been made in all the Churches of this City, for the perfect re-establishment of his Majesties Health. The Duke *d' Annoni* First Gentleman of his Majesties Bed-Chamber, has been to Compliment in his Majesties Name the Duke *d' Enghien*, who is now called *Monfieur le Prince*, and his Son the Duke *de Bourbon*, who is called *Monfieur le Duc*; as likewise the Prince of *Conti*, upon the death of the late Prince of *Conde*. The like Compliments have been performed by the Count *de Tonnerre*, on the part of the Duke of *Orleans*; and by all the Princes of the Blood. The Heart of the Deceased Prince will be deposited in the Church of the *Professed House* of the *Jesuits* in this City, near that of the Prince of *Conde* his Father; And his Body will be carried to *Valery*, the Burying-place of the Princes his Ancestors. The

Letters from *Italy* speak of a new Victory obtained by the *Venecian Fleet* against the *Turks*, of which we hope our next will bring a Confirmation. The Ambassadors of *Syam* are preparing for their return home: It's said they will embark some time the next Month.

*Plimouth, Dec. 14.* Last night a Vessel of *Jersey* laden with Wine, Cider, and Linen, was cast away near this place; but the Men were all saved.

*Portsmouth, Dec. 16.* On Tuesday last towards Evening, a small Dutch Vessel laden with Salt, was forced upon the Sands not far from *South-Sea* Castle: The Men were saved, but the Ship and Goods lost. Yesterday abundance of Timber drove on this Shore. It has blown extreme hard here for these four or five days.

*Whitehall, Dec. 18.* His Majesty has been Graciously pleased to Constitute Dr. *Richard Raines* (Judge of the Prerogative Court) Judge of His Majesties High Court of Admiralty. And at the same time to Confer upon him the Honor of Knighthood.
