The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventh day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the prebend of Tachbrooke, in the cathedral church of Lichfield, and now vested in us.

"And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to the said prebend of Tachbrooke (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage), became vested in us on the passing of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and after due consideration, it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said prebend of Tachbrooke, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Ma-

jesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

PORT REGULATIONS-MARSEILLES.

Notice to Shipowners and Masters.

Board of Trade, June 5, 1857.

THE Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received a Despatch from Her Majesty's Acting Consul at Marseilles, inclosing a letter from the Préfet of that Department, notifying that, in consequence of the Chamber of Commerce having called his attention to the abuses which exist in the settlement of average expenses, from the false statements often made by masters of merchant vessels, he (the Préfet) has, in virtue of a law, passed on the 2nd July, 1836, decided that in future the regulation shall be enforced compelling masters of all vessels, and of whatever flag, if called upon, to submit their log books to an officer of the Customs, immediately on arriving at the Port of Marseilles, in order that such officer may sign the page where the writing ends, and thus prevent the master from making any further addition thereto after his arrival in port.

Shipmasters trading to the port of Marseilles are accordingly hereby cautioned to have their log books properly written up before their arrival in port, and to produce them when asked for, as, in case of damage to ship or cargo, serious difficulty may otherwise be experienced in the settlement of average.

- 4. Opposition at the hearing can only be made by the Creditor in person, or by Counsel appearing for him.
