

the Imperial Generals in the New Conquests; (with whom may join the Croats if there be occasion) will be sufficient to oppose the Enemies design. The same Advices say, That the Grand Visier having left *Belgrade* provided with all things necessary for its defence, was parted from thence for *Constantinople*. They write from *Upper Hungary*, that the *Turks* have reinforced the Garisons of *Temeswaer*, *Gyula*, *Lippa*, and other places on that side. The *Imperialists* have taken two Women of Quality that endeavoured to escape out of *Montgat*; It's not yet known who they are. The great Cross that was planted the 14th of *September* last upon the Steeple of the Cathedral Church of *St. Stephen*, was yesterday towards Evening, in a great Storm accompanied with Thunder and Lightning, blown down, the Iron Work upon which it stood, being made too slight, yielding to the violence of the Wind.

Vienna, Decemb. 19. On Sunday last arrived here an Express from *Croatia* with the News, that the *Croats* having received advice that 1200 *Turks* were on their march to conduct several Wagons laden with Provisions, Ammunition, Cloaths, and some Money to *Canisa*, they with great diligence marched towards the Enemy, and fell upon them with that Courage and Bravery, that though inferior to them in Number, they killed 500 upon the place, and putting the rest to flight, took the said Wagons and 180 Prisoners. It is not certain that the Grand Visier is parted from *Belgrade* for *Constantinople*, but that he has reinforced the Garisons of *Waradin*, *Temeswaer*, *Gyula* and *Lippa*, is confirmed. Count *Teckeley* was, according to our last advice, at *Temeswaer*.

Brussels, Decemb. 24. The Commissioners of the two Crowns have begun their Conference at *Philisville*, about the Limits on the side of *Namur*; And we are told, that the *French* Intendant has declared, That the King his Master will be content with an Equivalent, either in *Hainault* or *Flanders*; that so the City of *Namur* may not be incommoded by the straitness of their Limits; Upon which, the Council of State and War here, hath been several times assembled to consider of this Proposal. Yesterday our Governor General went to *Trovereun*, to pass the Holy-days there.

Brussels, Decemb. 31. Monsieur *Tirimont* is come hither from *Philisville*, to give his Excellency an account of the Progress he has made in his Conference with the Intendant of *Mabenge*. The Council of State was thereupon assembled yesterday, where it was resolved to accept the Offer made by the *French* Commissioner, and to give that Crown an Equivalent, for the Lands they pretend to near *Namur*, between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 19th past tell us, that the *Turkish* Troops were moving from *Belgrade* towards *Essecke* to supply *Sygeth*, *Alba Regalis*, and *Canisa*, with Provisions and Ammunition. That the *Croats* had defeated 1200 *Turks* that were marching with a Convoy to *Canisa*; 500 of the Enemy being killed, and many Prisoners taken with a considerable Booty. And that another Body of *Croats* had made a great Incur-sion into *Dalmatia*.

Hague, Decemb. 27. The Count de *Cannitz*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to His Majesty of Great Britain, arrived here the 21 Instant from *Vienna*; And parted again from hence this morning for *Flanders*, intending, after he has seen the Governor of the *Spanish Netherlands*, to embark at *Ostend* for *England*. The States of *Holland* are adjourned till the 8th of the next month. The last Letters from *Berlin* told us, that the Electoral Prince of *Brandenburgh* was very ill again.

Hague, Decemb. 31. The state of the War to the next Year has been sent to the several Provinces; It's said the City of *Amsterdam* desires to have some alteration made in it. The Deputies of the States General had yesterday another Conference with those of the Council of State, to consider what hath been proposed by the Envoy of *Morocco*. The Imperial Minister here has received the News the defeat of a *Turkish* Convoy that was going *Canisa*.

Paris, Decemb. 28. The 22d Instant, the King held Mass in his Chapel at Versailles, and dined Publickly. The same day the Earl of Arras, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, to make the Compliment upon the Birth of the Duke of Berry, had his Audience of Leave. And the Count de Lobcowitz, the Imperial Envoy, had Audience of the King, to acquaint him with the death of the Empress Dowager. The 24th, the Count de Rivera, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria, Compliment his Majesty upon the Birth of the Duke of Berry. Christmas day his Majesty, who had likewise assisted at a three Masses of Midnight, heard High Mass in his Chapel and a Sermon in the afternoon. The King has named the Marquis de Villars, Son of the Marquis of that Name, who was formerly Ambassador in Spain, to go and make the Compliments of Condolence at the Court at Vienna, upon the death of the Empress Dowager.

Paris, January 1. Te Deum has been sung in several Churches of this City, to give God Thanks for the King's Recovery. The same will in few days be performed at Notre Dame with very great solemnity, at which, it's said, His Majesty will be present.
