A PROCLAMATION For further Proroguing of the PAR-LIAMENT.

JAMES R.

Hereas We did late'y Proregue Our Parliament until the Fifteenth Day of February next, We, for many Weighty Reafons, have thought fit to Prorogue the fame until the Eight and imenticith Day of April next enfuing the Date bereof: And therefore do by this Our Proclamation Publifh and Declare, That the Parliament fhall be Prorogued upon and from the faid Fifteenth Day of February, until the Eight and twentieth Day of April next; Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgeffes, and all others whom it may Concern, may hereby take Notice, and Order their Affairs accordingk : We letting them know, That We will not at the Jaid Fifteenth Diy of February expect the Attendance of any, but only fuch, as being in or about the Cities of London and Weftminfter, may Attend the making the faid Prorogation; as heretofore in like Cafes hath been accuftomed.

Given at Our Court at Whiteball the Seventh Day of January, 168%. In the Second Year of Our Reign.

Venice, Decemb. 28. We have Advice by a Vessel arrived from Cyprus, that the Inhabitants of feveral places in that Island had revolted, and taken up Arms against the Turks and had made choice of a Perfon to command them. That the Inhabitants of fome Neighboring places refusing to follow their example, they had fallen upon them, and cut most of them in pieces; And being encouraged, and their Number encreased by this Success withey manched to the Town of Atro, and pollefled themselves of it, the Tanks who had the Guard of it, abandoning it so soon as they heard of their approach. The Advices from the Morea give an account of the return of the Captain General with the Fleet to Napoli di Romania.

Gensua, Decemb. 28. This morning

arrived here from Cadiz the Dutch Convoy, confifting of Nine Sail of great Ships, whereof two were Men of War, under the Command of the Count de Stirum; They have not brought much Goods for this place but about a Million and half of pieces of Eight. The Duke de Monieleon, the new Viceroy of Sardinia, is expected at Cagliari towards the end of this month.

Carelftadi, Decemb. 18. We have advice from Dalmatia, that a Body of Turks, commanded by a Baffa, had made a great Incursion into the Venetian Territories, and having plundered and burnt several Villages inhabited by the Morlaques, had afterwards taken and demolissed the Castle of Oftrovic; but that the Morlaques were preparing to take a Revenge.

Vienna, Decemb. 29, The Emperor has appointed Commillioners to treat with the Turks about the exchange of Prifoners. The Kiay Bey or Aga of the Janizaries, who was taken at Buda, offers 6000 Ducats for his Ranfom, but a much greater Sum is demanded. The Governor of Novigrad, who was likewise taken at Buda, has been several times examined, and, it's faid, he has discovered several confiderable matters, he having had a very close Correspondence with Ickeley, and by that means the knowledge of all the fecret Practices that were made use of to foment the Rebellion in Hungary, and of the chief perfons that were employed therein! The Letters from Upper Hungary tell us; that I Lieutenant General Garaffa was agreed with the States of Transilvania for 10000 Rations a day of Hay, Wheat, and Oars, to be furnished one half in kind, and the other half in money at a fetled Rate, for the subfiftence of the Imperial Troops. quartered on that fide; which will be of great advantage to the Imperialist, because of the difficulty they had to carry Provifions to places to far distant from the Da-We have advice that fome Turkif nube. Troops are moving towards the Drave.

Tienne, Jan. 2. This week arrived here the Count de Berkam Envoy Extraordinary from the Flector of Bavaria, to confer with the Ministers of th s Court about the Preparations for the next Campa gne. The Count of Oxen/terne is expected here with the fame Character from the King of Su den; An I the Sieur Proski from Poland; The laft of thefe, after having finished his Commission at this Court, will go in the fame Quality to Venice and Rome. We have advice from Buda, That the Turks have put fome Provisions and Ammunition into Alba Rezalis, which they had drawn out of their Maga-zine at S geth. The fame Letters fay, that a Party of the Garifon of Agrit having advanced as far as Onotz, and carried fome Cattle from thence, they were purfued by the Huffars quartered near that place, who killed 36 of the Enemy, took 15 Prifoners, and recovered the whole Booty. General Caraffa having notice that the Inhabitants of Debrezen began to make fome difficulty to pay their Contributions, has fent thither three Regiments of Foot and 900 Huffars to keep them in their duty. They write from Poland, that the Moscovite Amballadors intended to part from Lemberg the 20th of the last month on their Journey hither: From hence they will go to Venice. Just now arrives an Express with the News that Major General Thungent having marched with 1000 Men from Five Churches, had taken and burnt the Lower Town of Sigerb, of which we expect the Particulars in our next.

Cologne, Jan. 5. The Imperial Sub-Commiffioners demand of these Magistrates 14000 Crowns for the Expences they have been at in the execution of their Commission, which seems now to be the only thing that retards their departure. Several Officers are come hither to raise men for the Emperor's Service. They write from Strasburgh, of the 2d Instant, that Lieutenant-General Monduar, and the Sieur & Vauban first Ingenier of France, were returned to the New Fort that's building on the Rbine, to give the necessary Orders, as well as to hasten the work with their prefence.

Hamburgh, Jan. 5. The Deputies which the Magilitates of this City fent to the Princes of Lumenburgh to thank them for their late affittance, are come back very well fatisfied with their Reception at those Courts. The Heer Guldenftolpe the Suedifh Envoy, is arrived here from Holland. There are Letters from Stockbolme which fay that the King of Sueden has written to General Coningsmarke, who commanded the Venetian Forces in the Morea the last Campagne, to return home with all the speed he conveniently can. We have no Letters from Poland fince those written the 12th of the last month at Lemberg, which gave an account of the Audience of the Moscowite Ambassa dors- and that the King had reloved in a great Council, composed of 24 Senators, to ratific the League with the Czars.

Braffels, Jan. 10. Our Governor-General returned hither yesterday from Malines, where he had made fome Reform among the Officers of the Artillery belonging to that Garilon. Monfieur Tirimont is come back from Philipville, which occafoned this morning an extraordinary meeting of the Council of State. The Letters from Vienna of the 29th past tell us, That Prince Charles of Neuburg was gone from thence for Hydelburg; to accompany his Sister, the Queen of Portugal, to Lisbon.⁷ And that the Prince and States of Transfilvania had agreed to the Contributions demanded by General Cavaffa, for the fublishence of the Impe-

rial Troops quartered in *Upper Humgary*, where there is to great want of Provisions, that they are forced to bring them from other Countries with great Trouble and Expence.

Bruffels, Jan. 14. The Refolution that has been faken upon the report of Monfieur Tirimont, who returned hither the 9th Iuftant from the Conference at Philipville, is not yet made publick, but in the mean time the general Difcourie here is, that the difference about the Limits on the fide of Namar will be accommodated. Our Governor-General intends, it's faid, to take a Journey the next week to Namer, not having been to vifit that place fince he came to the Government of these Countries. The laft Letters from Vienna are of the 2d Inftant; They fay, the Council of War meets every day, to direct and haften the Preparations for the next Campagne. They write from Hungary, That the City of Debrezen had fent to Lieutenant General Caraffa, to let him know that the Baffa of Great Waradin had threatned them with Fire and Sword, in cafe they paid any Contributions to the Imperialis; And that General Caraffa had thereupon fent them 6000 Men for their fecurity. The fame Advices add, That Major-General Thingen, who commands at Five Churches, marching from thence with 500 Horfe and 250 Foot, had attacked and taken the Lower Town of Sygeth, which was full of Forage, Provisions and Cattle, greatest part whereof they carried away, and burnt the reft with the Town.

Hague, Jan. 10. The States of Holland met again the 8th Inftant, and have now before them the ftate of the War for this prefent year, in order to give their confent to it. The Deputies of the faid States had this day a Conference with those of the Admiralties, about fitting out forme Ships againft the Algierines. The Heer Golon, Colonel of the Artillery in the Service of this State, is returned from Hungary, whither he went towards the end of the laft Campagne, to ferve as chief Ingenier in the Emperor's Army. They write from Gromingen, that the Water was very much fallen, even in the Low Lands, and that they had repaired most of the Dykes.

Paris, January 11. Te Deym has been fung with great Solemnity in moft of the Churches of this City for the King's Recovery. The 4th Inftant the Ambaffadors of Syam, who were in Mourning for this occasion, went to make their Compliments of Condoleance to the Prince and Princes of Conde, upon the death of the Prince of Conde their Father. The 7th, Meffire' H)4chinthe Serreni, Archbishop of Alby, died in this. City in the 7oth year of his age. Orders have, it's faid, been fent to Toalon, for the fitting out feveral Men of War against the Spring.
