## A P R O C L A M A T I O N For further Proroguing of the P A R L I A M E N T.

**W** Hereas We did lately Prorogue Our Parliament until the Fifteenth Day of February next, We, for many Weighy Reasons, have thought fit to Prorogue the same until the Eight and twentieth Day of April next ensuing the Date hereof: And therefore do by this Our Proclamation Publish and Declare, That the Parliament shall be Prorogued upon and from the said Fifteenth Day of February, until the Eight and twentieth Day of April next; Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgeses, and all others whom it may Concern, may hereby take Notice, and Order their Affairs accordingly: We letting them know, That We will not at the said Fifteenth Day of February expect the Attendance of any, but only such, as being in or about the Cities of London and Westminster, may Attend the making the said Prorogation; as heretofore in like Cases hath been accustomed.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Seventh Day of January, 1686. In the Second Year of Our Reign.

Venice, Decemb. 28. We have Advice by a Vessel arrived from Cyprus, that the Inhabitants of several places in that Island had revolted, and taken up Arms against the Turks, and had made choice of a Person to command them. That the Inhabitants of some Neighboring places refusing to follow their example, they had fallen upon them, and cut most of them in pieces; And being encouraged, and their Number encreased by this Success, they marched to the Town of Atro, and possessed themselves of it, the Turks who had the Guard of it, abandoning it so soon as they heard of their approach. The Advices from the Morea give an account of the return of the Captain General with the Fleet to Napoli di Romania.

Genova, Decemb. 28. This morning

arrived here from Cadix the Dutch Convoy, consisting of Nine Sail of great Ships, whereof two were Men of War, under the Command of the Count de Stirum; They have not brought much Goods for this place but about a Million and half of pieces of Eight. The Duke de Monteleon, the new Viceroy of Sardinia, is expected at Cagliari towards the end of this month.

Carelstadt, Decemb. 18. We have advice from Dalmatia, that a Body of Turks, commanded by a Bassa, had made a great Incursion into the Venetian Territories, and having plundered and burnt several Villages inhabited by the Morlaques, had afterwards taken and demolished the Castle of Ostrovic; but that the Morlaques were preparing to take a Revenge.

Vienna, Decemb. 29. The Emperor has appointed Commissioners to treat with the Turks about the exchange of Prisoners. The Kiay Bey or Aga of the Janizaries, who was taken at Buda, offers 6000 Ducats for his Ransom, but a much greater Sum is demanded. The Governor of Novigrad, who was likewise taken at Buda, has been several times examined, and, it's said, he has discovered several considerable matters, he having had a very close Correspondence with Tackley, and by that means the knowledge of all the secret Practices that were made use of to foment the Rebellion in Hungary, and of the chief persons that were employed therein. The Letters from Upper Hungary tell us, that Lieutenant-General Garassa was agreed with the States of Transylvania for 10000 Rations a day of Hay, Wheat, and Oats, to be furnished one half in kind, and the other half in money at a settled Rate, for the subsistence of the Imperial Troops quartered on that side; which will be of great advantage to the Imperialists, because of the difficulty they had to carry Provisions to places so far distant from the Danube. We have advice that some Turkish Troops are moving towards the Drave.

*Vienne*, Jan. 2. This week arrived here the Count de *Berkm* Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Bavaria*, to confer with the Ministers of this Court about the Preparations for the next Campaign. The Count of *Oxenstjerne* is expected here with the same Character from the King of *Sueden*; And the Sieur *Proski* from *Poland*; The last of these, after having finished his Commission at this Court, will go in the same Quality to *Venice* and *Rome*. We have advice from *Buda*, That the *Turks* have put some Provisions and Ammunition into *Alba Rezs*, which they had drawn out of their Magazine at *Sge*. The same Letters say, that a Party of the Garrison of *Agri* having advanced as far as *Onoz*, and carried some Cattle from thence, they were pursued by the *Hussars* quartered near that place, who killed 36 of the Enemy, took 15 Prisoners, and recovered the whole Booty. General *Caraffa* having notice that the Inhabitants of *Debrezen* began to make some difficulty to pay their Contributions, has sent thither three Regiments of Foot and 900 *Hussars* to keep them in their duty. They write from *Poland*, that the *Moscovite* Ambassadors intended to part from *Lemberg* the 20th of the last month on their Journey hither: From hence they will go to *Venice*. Just now arrives an Express with the News that Major General *Thungen* having marched with 1000 Men from *Five Churches*, had taken and burnt the Lower Town of *Siger*, of which we expect the Particulars in our next.

*Cologne*, Jan. 5. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners demand of these Magistrates 14000 Crowns for the Expences they have been at in the execution of their Commission, which seems now to be the only thing that retards their departure. Several Officers are come hither to raise men for the Emperor's Service. They write from *Serasburgh*, of the 2d Instant, that Lieutenant-General *Monelar*, and the Sieur de *Vauban* first Ingenier of *France*, were returned to the New Fort that's building on the *Rhine*, to give the necessary Orders, as well as to hasten the work with their presence.

*Hamburg*, Jan. 5. The Deputies which the Magistrates of this City sent to the Princes of *Lunenburgh* to thank them for their late assistance, are come back very well satisfied with their Reception at those Courts. The Heer *Guldenstolpe* the *Suedish* Envoy, is arrived here from *Holland*. There are Letters from *Stockholme* which say that the King of *Sueden* has written to General *Corningsmarke*, who commanded the *Venetian* Forces in the *Morea* the last Campaign, to return home with all the speed he conveniently can. We have no Letters from *Poland* since those written the 12th of the last month at *Lemberg*, which gave an account of the Audience of the *Moscovite* Ambassadors; and that the King had resolved in a great Council, composed of 24 Senators, to ratify the League with the *Czars*.

*Brussels*, Jan. 10. Our Governor-General returned hither yesterday from *Malines*, where he had made some Reform among the Officers of the Artillery belonging to that Garrison. Monsieur *Tirimon* is come back from *Philippville*, which occasioned this morning an extraordinary meeting of the Council of State. The Letters from *Vienne* of the 29th past tell us, That Prince *Charles* of *Neuburg* was gone from thence for *Hydelburg*, to accompany his Sister, the Queen of *Portugal*, to *Lisbon*. And that the Prince and States of *Transylvania* had agreed to the Contributions demanded by General *Caraffa*, for the subsistence of the Impe-

rial Troops quartered in *Upper Hungary*, where there is so great want of Provisions, that they are forced to bring them from other Countries with great Trouble and Expence.

*Brussels*, Jan. 14. The Resolution that has been taken upon the report of Monsieur *Tirimon*, who returned hither the 9th Instant from the Conference at *Philippville*, is not yet made publick, but in the mean time the general Discourse here is, that the difference about the Limits on the side of *Namur* will be accommodated. Our Governor-General intends, it's said, to take a Journey the next week to *Namur*, not having been to visit that place since he came to the Government of these Countries. The last Letters from *Vienne* are of the 2d Instant; They say, the Council of War meets every day, to direct and hasten the Preparations for the next Campaign. They write from *Hungary*, That the City of *Debrezen* had sent to Lieutenant General *Caraffa*, to let him know that the *Bassa* of *Great Waradin* had threatened them with Fire and Sword, in case they paid any Contributions to the *Imperialists*; And that General *Caraffa* had thereupon sent them 6000 Men for their security. The same Advices add, That Major-General *Thungen*, who commands at *Five Churches*, marching from thence with 500 Horse and 250 Foot, had attacked and taken the Lower Town of *Syger*, which was full of Forage, Provisions and Cattle, greatest part whereof they carried away, and burnt the rest with the Town.

*Hague*, Jan. 10. The States of *Holland* met again the 8th Instant, and have now before them the state of the War for this present year, in order to give their consent to it. The Deputies of the said States had this day a Conference with those of the Admiralties, about fitting out some Ships against the *Algerines*. The Heer *Golon*, Colonel of the Artillery in the Service of this State, is returned from *Hungary*, whither he went towards the end of the last Campaign, to serve as chief Ingenier in the Emperor's Army. They write from *Groningen*, that the Water was very much fallen, even in the Low Lands, and that they had repaired most of the Dykes.

*Paris*, January 11. *Te Deum* has been sung with great Solemnity in most of the Churches of this City for the King's Recovery. The 4th Instant the Ambassadors of *Siam*, who were in Mourning for this occasion, went to make their Compliments of Condolence to the Prince and Princess of *Conde*, upon the death of the Prince of *Conde* their Father. The 7th, *Messire Etienne Serroni*, Archbishop of *Alby*, died in this City in the 70th year of his age. Orders have, it's said, been sent to *Toalon*, for the fitting out several Men of War against the Spring.
