The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division, is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special session assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the divisions of counties and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of Members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county of Nottingham, in quarter sessions assembled, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the northern division of the said county, is insufficient, and praying that Worksop, Tuxford, Gringley-on-the-hill, Basford, and Beeston, may be polling places for the said northern division, within which such places are situate:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that Worksop, Tuxford, Gringley-on-the-hill, Basford, and Beeston, shall be polling places for the northern division of the county of

Nottingham; and that the Justices of the Peace for the said county, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State

for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Acting Consul at Bangkok, enclosing copy of a Siamese Notification, prohibiting captains and masters of ships, under a penalty of from 80 to 200 Ticals, from throwing over ballast, sand, stone, earth, &c., anywhere near the bar of the river Meinam, where the water does not exceed 7 fathoms in depth, or anywhere in the bed of the river. Captains and masters of vessels trading at the port of Bangkok, will be required to prohibit their crews from going on shore with knives and other weapons.

Besselsleigh Turnpike Road.

(Continuation of Term; Repeal or Amendment of Acts; Alteration and Reduction of Interest, and Payment of Principal.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament, in the ensuing session, for an Act to continue and extend the term, and to alter, amend, and enlarge some of the powers and provisions of four several Acts of Parliament—one passed in the eleventh year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for amending and widening the road from Besselsleigh, through Wantage, to Hungerford, in the county of Berks; and from Wantage to Marlborough, in the county of Wilts; and from the turnpike-road between Reading and Wallingford, through Halfpenny-lane, to the Old Red House upon Wantage Downs; and from thence to Lambourn, in the said county of Berks; another Act passed in the twelfth year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to explain and amend an Act of the eleventh year of the reign of His present Majesty for amending and widening the road from Besselsleigh, through Wantage to Hungerford, in the county of Berks; and from Wantage to Marlborough, in the county of Wilts; and from the turnpike-road between Reading and Wallingford, through Halfpenny-lane, to the Old Red House upon Wantage Downs, and from thence to Lambourn, in the said county of Berks;" another Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to enlarge the term and powers of two Acts, passed in the eleventh and twelfth years of His present Majesty, for amending and widening the road from Besselsleigh, through Wantage to Hungerford, in the county of Berks; and from Wantage to Marlborough, in the county of Wilts; and from the turnpike-road between Reading and Wallingford, through Halfpenny-lane to the Old Red House upon Wantage Downs; and from thence to Lambourn, in the said county of Berks; and for amending the road through Pidgeon-lane, instead of the said road through Halfpenny-lane;" and another Act passed in the fifty-fourth year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to continue the term, and alter and enlarge the powers of three Acts of His present Majesty for amending the road from Besselsleigh, through Wantage to Hungerford, in the county of Berks; and other roads in the said Acts mentioned in the said county, and in the county of Wilts;" or to repeal the said Acts, and to grant other and more effectual powers and provisions in lieu thereof.

And notice is hereby further given, that it is intended to apply for powers to levy and collect tolls, rates, or duties upon the said road; and to alter the existing tolls, rates, or duties; and to confer, vary, or extinguish exemptions from payment of tolls, rates, or duties, and to confer, vary, or extinguish other rights and privileges.

And it is intended by the said Act to alter or vary the application of the money arising from the tolls, rates, or duties collected upon the said road; and to alter or vary existing provisions relative to the payment of the interest, and principal of the debt due and owing on the credit of the tolls, rates, or duties collected upon the said road; and to provide for altering and reducing the present and fixing the future rate of interest payable in respect of such debt, or the proportion of tolls, rates, or duties to be applied in payment of interest and principal; and to make other provisions with respect to the ordering, arranging, and confirming the securities of the creditors upon the tolls, rates,

or duties authorized to be collected upon the said road, and with respect to such other matters as Parliament shall deem proper or necessary.

And notice is hereby also given, that printed copies of the proposed Act will be deposited on or before the 31st day of December next, in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons.
