Venice, January 4.

E have Advice by a Felucca from Zant, that the Captain General continued at Napoli di Romania, to give the necel-

fary Orders about the Fort for Cittadel that's building with great diligence on the Hill Palamida, which will render that City inaccessible. The Letters from the Levant tell us, That the Grand Signior had, to fatisfie the People, declared that he will command in perfon his Army in Hungary the next Campagne. There are now 900 new raifed Men at the Lido, and more are daily expected, which will be transported to the Morea, so some as the Vessel's that are preparing for that purpole are ready.

Warfaw, Decemb 30. The last Letters from Lemberg tell us, that an Envoy was expected there in few days from the Charles Tertors and two Bath's with a delign to pais the of Tartary with Propofals of Peace. That the Molcovite Ambaffadors were preparing for their departure, having Orders to go to the Court at Vienne, and from thence to Venice, to affure the Emperor and the Republick, of the Czars their Mafters Refolgtion punctually to observe the League they are entred into against the Turks. The great Chancellor of Poland had, by order of the King, represented to these Ambalfadors, that the Forces of Molcovy had not given the Tartars that diversion the last Campagne, as they were obliged by this Alliance to have done; And that the Sieur Samuelowitz, General of the Coffacks subject to the Czars, had written very impertinently to the King; To which they answered, That the Forces of the Czars had done all they could, and had guarded very carefully the Passages of the Borifthenes; And that for what concerned the General Samuelowitz, they were confident if any just Complaints were made as gainst him, the Czars would cause him to be punished as he deferved.

Gran, Decemb. 30. We have an ac-

count from Upper Hungary, that the Im perial Troops quartered pn that fide, are lince the Agreement with the States of Transilvania, plentifully provided with all things necessary for their Sublistences And that the Imperial Cavalry do keep Agria and Mantgaiz very close blocked up. At"s cer-tain that the Tunks have reinforced the Garifons of Temefwaer, Jeno, Lippa, and Gyula; but General Caraffa has fo lodged his Troops, that it's believed the Enemy will hardly undertake any confiderable Enterprize. They have put fome Provisions into Alba Regalis.

Vienna, Jan. 5. The Letters from Five Charches of the 26th pait give an account, That Major General Dungen, Governor of that place, having received advice that the Enemy had repaired their Britigeoof Boats over the Drave near the Fortrels of Effectes for the focurity whereof they planted 40 pieces of Cannon on the other fide of that River; And that a Body of Turks and Tarrays was marching under the Continanti of the Son of the Cham of faid River, and to manage the Country, which the Impare lifts brought ander their fulzestion towards the cade of the last Campagn, as well as to put new Supplies of Provisions into the places that remain under the Octoman Obedience on that fide for which purpofe they had provided a great Magazine at Sigerly He marched the 19th Inftant with 500 Horfe and 300 Foot from Five Churches, and arriving the next, morning, before Break of day, near Sigeth, attacked and entred the Lower Town, before the Inhabitants had the leaft notice of his approach. There were about 400 Houfes, which in an hours time were all reduced to Ashes, with the Forage and Provisions that had been laid up there; Many of the Inhabitants, and all the Cattle, which the Christians had not leifure to drive away, perifhing likewife in the Flames. This Action put the Tinks in the Cafile into that Fear and Aftonitament, that they durit not shew themselves, but only fired upon the Christians with their Gannon, till they faw them retire, when they fallyed out with 100 Spani's to purfue them, but Major-General Thum-gen ordering fome of his Troops toy return and charge the Enemy, they immediately fled, and faved themfelves by the swiftness of their Horless except feven who were taken Piloners. The 20th; the Imperialists returned to Five Charles having loft but 8 Men, who were killed by the Enes mies Cannon; The next day a great many Rajciens came thither from Sigeth, and defired leave of the Governor to fettle there, The laft Advi-EĽS

ces from Poland Luid, That the Molecuite Anbaffadors would be the 2d of this Month on the Frontiers of Silefly, upon which, the Emperor has fent an Officer to receive and conduct them hither. The Baron de Berchem, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria, has had Audience of the Emperor.

Strusburgh, Jan. 6. Lieutenant Genetal Monclar, and the Sieur de Vauban, are ftill at Fort Louis, on which, belides the Soldiers, feveral thousand Peasants do conflantly work, and a great many Boats are employed in carrying Materials thither.

Cologne, Jan. 10. The Electoral Prince Palatin will part from Dufeldorp the next week for Vienna. The Imperial Sub-Commillioners continue still here, and have not yet fixed the time of their departure.

Hàmhurgh; Jan. 11. The Letters from Seockbolme, inform us, That the Queen of Sueden was brought to Bed of a Son, who was named Charles Gustaows. It's faid the Princes of Lunenburgh will meet together the next week at Bergerdorfe. There is likewile a diffcourse of a Conference to be held ab Altena, about the Affairl of the Duke of Hole (tern. They write from Dresden, That the Elector of Sayary giving. Audience of Leave to an Envoy that was at his Court from the Republick of Venite, had told him, That having himself Oceasion for his Troops, now in the Service of that State, he had lent them Orders to return home.

Bruffels, Jun. 17. Our Governor General has, we are told, difpatched an Extraordinary Courier to Spain, to give the King an account of what hath been agreed on between the Commissioners of the Two Crowns in the Conference at Philippille, concerning the Limits on the fide of Namur, the Papticulars whereof will not be made Publick, till the fame be- ratified by his Catholick Majefty. The Letter's from Vienne of the 5th Iuftant, confirmit the Action of Major General Thungen; They (ay, a Body of Turks and Tartars commanded by the Son of the Cham of Tarcary, and two Balla's, heing come to Effecke, and having laid a Bridge of Boats over the Drave, with a defign to make an Incursion into the Lower Hungary, as well to ravage the Country, as to conduct to Alba Regalis and Canifa a supply of Provisions, which they had for that purpole gathered together at Sigerb, Mafor General Thungen, upon Notice of it, marched from Five Churches the 19th of the last month in the Evening with 500 Horfe and 250 Foot towards Sigeth, and arriving before that place at Break of day, surprized the Lower Town, which they burnt with all the Forage and other Provisions that had been laid up there; The Turks made a Sally out of the Calte, but were repulsed, and the Impe-riality returned with the loss only of 3 or 4 men to Five Churches.

Hague, Jan. 14. The States of Holland have been every day affembled fince Wednefday laft, but we do not hear that they are yet come to a Refolution upon any of the matters they had before them at their laft meeting. The 11th Inftant arrived here the Duke of Croy from Germany, having ferved the laft Campagne as Lieutenant General in the Imperial Army in Hungary. The Commiffioners of this State continue their Conferences at Maeftricke with those of the States of Liege.

Paris, Jan. 15. The Dauphine's being indifpoled, the Solemnity of Chriftning the Children of France was not performed on Sunday last as was intended. The Ambaffadors of Syam had yesterday their Au-

dience of Leave of the King ; It's faid they will park from hence towards the end of the next, week for Breft. It's believed the Court will go on Tuefday next to Marli, to pais iome days there. The King has given the Government of the Pays d'Auny, to the Count de Grammont; And that of Chafteau Trompette, and the Lieutenancy of the Lower Guyenne, to the Sieur de la Hillere Governor of Re-Monfieur de Louvoy having a Humor fallen croy. in his Leg, is fo ill with it, that he has defired Leave to retire from Court till it be cured. Skelton, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majefty of Great Britain, is to have his Audience on Saturday next. We have an account from St. Malo, that three Ships were arrived there with four Millions and an half of Pieces of Fight from Cadiz; And that at the fame time these Veffels parted out of the Bay of Cadiz, the Dake of Mortemar likewise set Sail from thence with the Ships' under his Command for Tonlon. The Letters from Portugal, fay, there was no longer any doubt made of a double Mart riage between the King and the Princel's Palatin ; And between the Infanta and Prince Charles, third Son of the Elector Palatin. There is a Report of a Rencounter between a French Barque and a Corfair of Argiers, who would have vifited Her, but the French putting themselves into a posture of defence, obliged the Algrerine to retire, having loft 15 or 16 men. But another French Vellel, which was met by the Marquis de Flory, came not off to well, he having not only vifited Her, but likewife, taken out of her feveral Paffengers, and 80000 Crowns in mony; Upon which the King has given Orders to all his Men of War to feize the faid Marquis de Flory, and the Ships belonging to him (which he fatted out under psetence of Cruifung, agailt the Tugks) wherever they meet them.
