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Venice, January 4.

WE have Advice by a Felucca from Zant, that the Captain General continued at *Napoli di Romania*, to give the necessary Orders about the Fort or Cittadel that's building with great diligence on the Hill *Palamida*, which will render that City inaccessible. The Letters from the *Levant* tell us, That the Grand Signior had, to satisfy the People, declared that he will command in person his Army in *Hungary* the next Campaigne. There are now 900 new raised Men at the *Lido*, and more are daily expected, which will be transported to the *Morea*, so soon as the Vessels that are preparing for that purpose are ready.

Warsaw, Decemb. 30. The last Letters from *Lemberg* tell us, that an Envoy was expected there in few days from the *Chari of Tartary* with Proposals of Peace. That the *Moscovite* Ambassadors were preparing for their departure, having Orders to go to the Court at *Vienna*, and from thence to *Venice*, to assure the Emperor and the Republick, of the Czars their Masters Resolution punctually to observe the League they are entred into against the *Turks*. The great Chancellor of *Poland* had, by order of the King, represented to these Ambassadors, that the Forces of *Moscovy* had not given the *Tartars* that diversion the last Campaigne, as they were obliged by this Alliance to have done; And that the *Sieur Samuelowitz*, General of the *Cossacks* subject to the Czars, had written very impertinently to the King; To which they answered, That the Forces of the Czars had done all they could, and had guarded very carefully the Passages of the *Boristhenes*; And that for what concerned the General *Samuelowitz*, they were confident if any just Complaints were made against him, the Czars would cause him to be punished as he deserved.

Gran, Decemb. 30. We have an ac-

count from *Upper Hungary*, that the Imperial Troops quartered on that side, are since the Agreement with the States of *Transilvania*, plentifully provided with all things necessary for their Subsistence; And that the Imperial Cavalry do keep *Agria* and *Montgat* very close blocked up. It's certain that the *Turks* have reinforced the Garisons of *Temeswaer*, *Jeno*, *Lippa*, and *Gyula*; but General *Caraffa* has so lodged his Troops, that it's believed the Enemy will hardly undertake any considerable Enterprize. They have put some Provisions into *Alba Regalis*.

Vienna, Jan. 5. The Letters from *Five Churches* of the 26th past give an account, That Major General *Thungen*, Governor of that place, having received advice that the Enemy had repaired their Bridge of Boats over the *Drava* near the Fortrefs of *Essecke*; for the security whereof they planted 40 pieces of Cannon on the other side of that River; And that a Body of *Turks* and *Tartars* was marching under the Command of the Son of the *Cham of Tartary* and two *Bassas*, with a design to pass the said River, and to ravage the Country, which the *Imperialists* brought under their subjection towards the end of the last Campaigne, as well as to put new Supplies of Provisions into the places that remain under the *Ottoman* Obedience on that side, for which purpose they had provided a great Magazine at *Siget*; He marched the 19th Instant with 500 Horse and 300 Foot from *Five Churches*, and arriving the next morning, before Break of day, near *Siget*, attacked and entred the Lower Town, before the Inhabitants had the least notice of his approach. There were about 400 Houses, which in an hours time were all reduced to Ashes, with the Forage and Provisions that had been laid up there; Many of the Inhabitants, and all the Cattle, which the Christians had not leisure to drive away, perishing likewise in the Flames. This Action put the *Turks* in the Cattle into that Fear and Astonishment, that they durst not shew themselves, but only fired upon the Christians with their Cannon, till they saw them retire, when they sallied out with 100 Spaniards to pursue them, but Major-General *Thungen* ordering some of his Troops to return and charge the Enemy, they immediately fled, and saved themselves by the swiftness of their Horses except seven who were taken Prisoners. The 20th, the *Imperialists* returned to *Five Churches*; having lost but 8 Men, who were killed by the Enemies Cannon; The next day a great many *Rescues* came thither from *Siget*, and desired leave of the Governor to settle there. The last Advices

ces from Poland said, That the *Moscovite* Ambassadors would be the 2d of this Month on the Frontiers of *Silesia*, upon which, the Emperor has sent an Officer to receive and conduct them hither. The Baron de *Berchem*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Bavaria*, has had Audience of the Emperor.

Strasbourg, Jan. 6. Lieutenant General *Monclar*, and the *Sieur de Vauban*, are still at *Fort Louis*, on which, besides the Soldiers, several thousand Peasants do constantly work, and a great many Boats are employed in carrying Materials thither.

Cologne, Jan. 10. The Electoral Prince Palatin will part from *Dusseldorf* the next week for *Vienna*. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners continue still here, and have not yet fixed the time of their departure.

Hamburg, Jan. 11. The Letters from *Stockholm*, inform us, That the Queen of *Sweden* was brought to Bed of a Son, who was named *Charles Gustavus*. It's said the Princes of *Lunenburg* will meet together the next week at *Bergerdorff*. There is likewise a discourse of a Conference to be held at *Alema*, about the Affairs of the Duke of *Holstein*. They write from *Dresden*, That the Elector of *Saxony* giving Audience of Leave to an Envoy that was at his Court from the Republick of *Venice*, had told him, That having himself Occasion for his Troops, now in the Service of that State, he had sent them Orders to return home.

Brussels, Jan. 17. Our Governor General has, we are told, dispatched an Extraordinary Courier to *Spain*, to give the King an account of what hath been agreed on between the Commissioners of the Two Crowns in the Conference at *Philipville*, concerning the Limits on the side of *Namur*, the Particulars whereof will not be made Publick, till the same be ratified by his Catholick Majesty. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 5th Instant, confirm the Action of Major General *Thungen*; They say, a Body of *Turks* and *Tartars* commanded by the Son of the Cham of *Tartary*, and two Bassas, being come to *Essecke*, and having laid a Bridge of Boats over the *Drava*, with a design to make an Incurſion into the *Lower Hungary*, as well to ravage the Country, as to conduct to *Alba Regalis* and *Canisa* a supply of Provisions, which they had for that purpose gathered together at *Sigeb*, Major General *Thungen*, upon Notice of it, marched from *Fras Charches* the 19th of the last month in the Evening with 500 Horse and 250 Foot towards *Sigeb*, and arriving before that place at Break of day, surprized the Lower Town, which they burnt with all the Forage and other Provisions that had been laid up there; The *Turks* made a Sally out of the Castle, but were repulsed, and the *Imperialists* returned with the loss only of 3 or 4 men to *Five Churches*.

Hague, Jan. 14. The States of *Holland* have been every day assembled since Wednesday last, but we do not hear that they are yet come to a Resolution upon any of the matters they had before them at their last meeting. The 11th Instant arrived here the Duke of *Croy* from *Germany*, having served the last Campaign as Lieutenant General in the Imperial Army in *Hungary*. The Commissioners of this State continue their Conferences at *Maeſtricht* with those of the States of *Liege*.

Paris, Jan. 15. The Dauphiness being indisposed, the Solemnity of Christning the Children of *France* was not performed on Sunday last as was intended. The Ambassadors of *Siam* had yesterday their Au-

dience of Leave of the King; It's said they will part from hence towards the end of the next week for *Brest*. It's believed the Court will go on Tuesday next to *Marli*, to pass some days there. The King has given the Government of the *Pays d'Auvergne*, to the Count de *Grammont*; And that of *Chasteau Trompette*, and the Lieutenantancy of the *Lower Guyenne*, to the *Sieur de la Hiera* Governor of *Ro-croy*. Monsieur de *Louvois* having a Humor fallen in his Leg, is so ill with it, that he has desired Leave to retire from Court till it be cured. Mr. *Skelton*, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain*, is to have his Audience on Saturday next. We have an account from *St. Malo*, that three Ships were arrived there with four Millions and an half of Pieces of Eight from *Cadix*; And that at the same time these Vessels parted out of the Bay of *Cadix*, the Duke of *Montemar* likewise set Sail from thence with the Ships under his Command for *Toulon*. The Letters from *Portugal* say, there was no longer any doubt made of a double Marriage between the King and the Princess Palatin; And between the Infanta and Prince *Charles*, third Son of the Elector Palatin. There is a Report of a Rencontre between a *French* Barque and a *Corsair* of *Argiers*, who would have visited Her, but the *French* putting themselves into a posture of defence, obliged the *Argerine* to retire, having lost 15 or 16 men. But another *French* Vessel, which was met by the *Marquis de Flory*, came not off so well, he having not only visited Her, but likewise taken out of her several Passengers, and 80000 Crowns in money; Upon which the King has given Orders to all his Men of War to seize the said *Marquis de Flory*, and the Ships belonging to him (which he fitted out under pretence of Cruising, againt the *Turks*) wherever they meet them.
