HE Court arrived here the 6th In-flant from Zo kiem. The next day a great Council was held (at which Prince James, the King's eldeft Son, and thirty Senators were prefent) to deliberate upon the Affairs of the prefent Conjuncture, and articularly those relating to the League lately concluded at Moseum. The chief Articles of this Treaty being read and examined, feveral of the Senators were of opinion, that those by which the Palatinates of Kinzia and Smolensky, with all the Countries thereon depending, are yielded to the Czars, were of that weight and importance, that they deserved a more mature confideration than the prefent time would perthit, especially considering how backward the Mostovires had shewed themselves to perform what was stipulated on their part; by means whereof the great designs of the last Campagne had been frustrated, for that the Tartars, to whom the Czars had promised to give a great diversion, finding they had nothing to fear on that side, had joined all their Forces with those of the Tarks, to make head against the Army of this Crown, Others were of contrary Sentiments, and thought that the advantages which might be procured by this Alli-ance to this Crown and all Christendom were so considerable, that all other Considerations ought to be past over, and the Ambassadors sent home with the Ratification of the League, and with affurances of the King's stedfast Resolution to make good whatever is therein promifed on his part. The Reafons of the latter prevailed. Accordingly on the 10th Indant, the Ambaffadors had their Air dience of the King with the ultial Ceremonies, and were afterwards entertain'd with great magnificence; And it's faid the King will this day folemnly forean the faid League in the presence of the Ambassadors, and all the Senators, and principal Officers of the Crown. The King has named the Sigur Procki to go in Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Court at Vienna; He resided formerly with the same Character at Constantinople.
