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From Monday January 24. to Thursday Isnuary 27. 168*6*:

Naples , Jan. 4.

E have Advice by a Vessel arrived from Malta, that they were working there on their Gallies, which the great Master intends shall rejoin the Venetian Fleet early in the Spring; And were recruiting the Battalion which is to serve at Land under the Command of the Commandeur Mesharin. By the same way we are informed, that the Algierines had taken two Dutch Ships in those Seas; And that three great Turkish Vessels that were going with Provisions from. Barbary to Constantinople, had been Cast away in the Archipe-The young Princes of Radziville are arrived here from Rome;

Venice, Jan. 11. On Wednesday last a Vessel arrived here from Napoli di Romania, from whence the departed on the 29th of November. The Master reports, that Captain-General Morofusi continued there giving the necessary Orders for the Security of that Place; That he had caused all the Gates but one to be filled up with Earth; That the Fortifications on the Hill Palamida, were carried on with great diligence, and would in a short time be brought to Perfection. That the Turks had made several Incursions on the fide of Napoli di Romania, but had been every time beaten back with loss. That the Serasquier of the Morea was with some Troops in the Neighborhood of Lepanto, having a very jealous Eye upon the Greeks, who, he suspected, waited only for an Opportunity to Revolt. That Count Coningsmarke was gone to Zant, where he intended to stay till the opening of the Campagne. And that Signior Venier was preparing to Sail with 10 Men of War to cruise in the Archipelago: Yefterday arrived here the Ship Afra in 33 days from Constantinople, the Captain says, that the Grand Signior was, when he came away, at Scutars; But intended to remove very suddenly to Adrianople. That the Grand Visier who had demanded a Reinforcement of 60000 Men for the next Campagne, was daily expected at Constantinople; That Corn was very scarce there; And that he met the Captain Basa in the Archipelago taking his Course towards Constantinople. The Prince of Brunswicke keeps his Quarantain in the Hland Lazaro. Three hundred Morlaques are arrived here from Dalmatia, who will be followed by 300 more. These will be formed into a Regiment

under an Officer of their own, to serve in the

Morea the next Campagne.

Madrid, Jan. 2. The Duke d'Escalona, who ferved the last Campagne in Hungary, is returned from thence; He is named by the King to be his Ambassador to the Emperor. The Count de Villar Mayor, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Portugal to the Elector Palatin, passed some days ago through this place incognito on his Journey towards the Palatinat. We have an account from Cadiz, that the Duke de Mortemar failed some days before out of that Bay with the Ships under his Command, after that the Chamber of the Contractation of Seville had entirely fatisfied the French Merchants in the matter of the 500 thousand Crowns, part whereof was paid down, and the rest in Assignations, which the Merchants accepted, according to the ancient value of money. The French Ambassador at this Court having lately dispatched an Express to France, he was set upon and robbed within fix Miles of this place; The King, upon the Ambassador's Complaint, has given Orders for the making a very strict Search, in order to discover the persons concerned therein.

Lemberg, Jan. 1. The Conferences are continued with the Moscovite Ambassadors, for the regulating divers matters relating to the execution of the Treaty of perpetual Peace and Alliance lately concluded at Moscow. So soon as they are adjusted, the King will fend an Envoy to Moscowy, to acquaint the Czars with his having ratified the League in the presence of their Ambassadors, and to assure them of his Resolution punctually to observe all that is thereby stipulated on his part: And the Ambassadors will part from hence for Vienna: Some Proposals have been made to them by the King's Command, about joining a Body of Moscoviee Foot the next Campagne with the Forces of this Crown, and they have find a Conference thereupon with the Crown General, who shewed them the great advantages that may be obtained by such a Conjunction, which the Ambaffadors feemed to be very fenfible of, but having no Orders in this matter, all they could do was, that they promifed to represent the same to the Czars their Masters, who they doubted not would readily concur in whatever should appear beneficial to the common Interests. The Envoy from the Cham of Tartary has had Audience of the King; The Buliness he presends to be fent hither upon is very frivolous, being only to make some Proposals about the exchange of Prisoners, though it's not doubted his real Etrand is, to try whether this Court will hearken to any Overtures of Peace; but instead of returning to his Master with any

the unwelcome News to carry him, of the Ratification of the League with the Moscovines, and the other Measures that are taking between the two Nations, for a vigorous Profestion of the War. We have Advice, that the Cossacks commanded by General Mobila, have defeated a Turkish Convoy that was going to Caminies. The King has resolved not to call a Dyet this Winter.

Dantzick, Jan. 10. The Letterfort Righthe (Capital City of Livonia, tell us, that they were informed by feveral persons come lately from Moscov, that great Preparations were making there for the War against the Turks and Tairnes; And that the Czars had taken a great many German Officers into their Service, and endeavoured to get more. It's said they will have 150 thousand men in the Field the next Summer.

C Buda, Jan. 11. The Enemies Troops quartered about Effecke are very quiet; And we hear at prefent no more of their defign to succon Alba Regais, and the other places they remain possessed of on this fide the Drave. They fortific Effecke and Belgrade, to put them into a condition to refift the Imperial Arms the next Campagne: And have cast up some Works, and planted 30 pieces of Cannon on the other fide of the Drave, to secure their Bridge over that River. The Parties of this Garifon have not of late had any Rencounter with the Enemy; but some Hussar's of Gran advancing the haft week towards Alba Regalia, laid themselves in Ambush near that place, and by that means surprized a Party of 50 Men, who were going towards Effecke, with Letters for the Grand Visier, which being taken, have been fent to Vienna: Most of the Turks of this Party were killed or taken Prifoners; These report that there is in Alba Regalis a Garison of 4000 Men commanded by three Basfa's; That the Inhabitants, as well as the Soldiers, are daily employed in the repairing the Fortifications, and in making some new Works, which will and very much to the ilrength of the Place. We are told from Zolnocke, that General Caraffa is making Preparations to bombard Agria.

Vienna, Jan. 16. The last Letters from Poland

told us, that in the Conferences with the Ambassadors of Moscovy, it had, among other things, been agreed, that the Armies on both sides shall begin to act so soon as the Cavalry can subsist in the Field. The faid Ambassadors are, it's not doubted, by this time on their way hither; And the Emperor's Officers are gone to receive them on the Frontiers of Silefia. They write from Upper Hungary, that the Turks of Agria defert daily, and that some of these Deserters, who were come to Zolnocke, reported, that there was a great Consternation as well among the Garison as the Inhabitants of Agria, who had now hardly any hopes of Relief, being Blocked up on all fides by the Imperial Garisons. The Governors of Five Churches and Siclos, demand a Supply of Provisions and Ammunition, of which, it feems, they begin to be in some want. The Rebels in Mongatz continue their Incursions into the Neighbouring Countries.

Cologne, Jan. 20. The Cardinal of Furstemberg is expected at Bonne in 8 or 10 days from the Court of France. His Nephew Count Emanuel de Furstemberg, being returned from Hungary, is made Serjeant Major of Battalia of the Forces in the Service of our Elector. We are told that the French are providing a great Magazine of Corn at Liege.

Hamburgh, Jan. 21: Lieutenant-General Arenfdorf who commands the Danish Forces in Holsein, is come to Altena. It is said, that the King of Denmarke will veturn towards these Parts about the middle of March; and have his Residence at Gottorp, but without any certainty. We are told, that the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel is Treating with the Republick of Venice, about 4000 Men which he offers to put into their Service against the fext Campagne. The Electors of Brandenburgh and Saxons are making Levies to recruit their Troops which served in Hungary the last Summer. There are Letters from Poland, which say the Moscovite, Ambassadors were on their Journey to Vienna; They are to go from thence to Vinice.

Hague, Jan. 28. The States of Holland who are Adjourned to the 12th of the next month, having before they seperated taken into Consideration the Report of the Deputies of the Admiralties, about fitting out some Ships to be employed against the Algierines; They, after some debare, consented to it; And the said Deputies are thereupon gone home to hasten this Equipage, which is so necessary for the security of our Commerce and Navigation in the Mediterianian. The Count de Clermont Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Spain; is gone to Bruffels for a few days. The Prince of Waldecke is expected here the next week from Germany,
