Naples , Jan. 4.

E have Advice by a Veffel arrived from Malea, that they were working there on their Gallies, which the great Mafter intends shall rejoin the Venetian Fleet early in the Spring; And

were recruiting the Battalion which is to ferve at Land under the Command of the Comman-deur Mefharin. By the fame way we are informed, that the A'gierines had taken two Dutch Ships in those Seas; And that three great Turkish Vessels that were going with Provisions from. Barbary to Constantinople, had been Cast away in the Archipe-1400. The young Princes of Radziville are arrived here from Rome;

Venice, Jan. 11. On Wednefday last a Veffel arrived here from Napoli di Romania, from whence the departed on the 29th of November. The Mafter reports, that Captain-General Morofinz con-tinued there giving the necessary Orders for the Se-curity of that Place; That he had caused all the Gates but one to be filled up with Earth; That the Fortifications on the Hill Palamida, were carried on with great diligence, and would in a fhort time be brought to Perfection. That the Turks had made leveral Incurfions on the fide of Napoli di Romania, but had been eve-ry time beaten back with lofs. That the Serafqui-er of the Morea was with fome Troops in the Neighborhood of Lepanto, having a very jealous Eye upon the Greeks, who, he fuspected, waited only for an Opportunity to Revolt. That Count Comingsmarke was gone to Zant, where he inten-ded to flay till the opening of the Campagne. And that Signior Venier was preparing to Sail with 10 Men of War to cruife in the Archipelago, Ye-fterday arrived here the Ship Afra in 33 days from Constantinople, the Captain fays, that the Grand Signior was, when he came away, at Scutars; But intended to remove very fuddenly to Adrianople. That the Grand Vifier who had demanded a Reinforcement of 60000 Men for the next Campagne, was daily expected at Conftantinople; That Corn was very force there; And that he met the Captain Balla in the Arshipelago taking his Courfe towards Conftantinople. The Prince of Brunsivicke keeps his Quarantain in the Hland Lazaro. Three hundred Morlaques are arrived here from Dalmatia, who will be followed by 300 more. These will be formed into a Regiment

under an Officer of their own, to ferve in the

Morea the next Campagne. Madrid, Jan. 2. The Duke d'Escalona, who ferved the last Campagne in Hungary, is returned from thence; He is named by the King to be his Ambaffador to the Emperor. The Count de Villar Mayor, Ambaffador Extraordinary from the King of Portugal to the Elector Palatin, passed fome days ago through this place incognito on his Journey towards the Palatinat. We have an account from Cadiz, that the Duke de Mortemar failed fome days before out of that Bay with the Ships under his Command, after that the Chamber of the Contractation of Seville had entirely fatisfied the French Merchants in the matter of the 500 thousand Crowns, part whereof was paid down, and the reft in Af-fignations, which the Merchants accepted, accord-ing to the ancient value of money. The French Ambaffador at this Court having lately difpatched an Express to France, he was set upon and robbed within fix Miles of this place; The King, upon the Ambaffador's Complaint, has given Orders for the making a very strict Search, in order to discover the perfons concerned therein.

Lemberg , Jan. 1. The Conferences are continued with the Moscovite Ambaffadors, for the regulating divers matters relating to the execution of the Treaty of perpetual Peace and Alliance lately concluded at Mofcom. So foon as they are adjusted, the King will fend an Envoy to Mofcovy, to acquaint the Czars with his having ratified the League in the prefence of their Ambaffadors, and to affure them of his Refolution punctually to observe all that is thereby flipulated on his part: And the Ambaffadors will part from hence for *Vienna*: Some Proposals have been made to them by the King's Command, about joining a Body of *Mofcovite* Foot the next Campagne with the Forces of this Grown, and they have find a Conference theroupon with the Crown General, who shewed them the great advantages that may be obtained by such a Conjunction, which the Ambafladors feemed to be very fenfible of, but having no Orders in this matter, all they could do was, that they promifed to reprefent the fame to the Czars their Mafters, who they doubted not would readily concur in whatever should appear beneficial to the common Interests. The Envoy from the Cham of Tartary has had Audience of the King; The Buliness he pretends to be fent hither upon is very frivolous, being only to make fome Proposals about the exchange of Prisoners, though it's not doubted his real Etrand is, to try whether this Court will hearken to any Overtures of Peace ; but instead of returning to his Master with any good
