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Leghorne, Jan. 8.

OUR Great Duke has ordered a Levy to be made of 1000 Men, to recruit the Troops which he intends to send the next Campagne to the assistance of the Republick of Venice. We have advice that three *Algierine* Men of War are Cruising on these Coasts.

Vienna, Jan. 19. The Emperor has ordered a great Convoy of Provisions to be sent from *Stirra*, for the supplying the Garisons of *Five Churches*, *Copowar*, and the other conquered Places on the *Drave*. The *Turks* are at present very quiet on that side, but, it's said, they are making Preparations to relieve *Alba Regalis*, *Sigeth*, and *Canisa*. We have an account from *Upper Hungary*, that Lieutenant General *Caraffa*, after having given Orders to Colonel *Heussler*, to observe with the Troops under his Command, the Garison of *Great Waradin*, and to cover the Imperial Quarters on the other side of the *Ibousse* against their Attempts, was gone to *Espories* to give Orders about the Execution of the design upon *Agria*; The same Advices say, that the *Bassa* of *Great Waradin* had again sent to General *Caraffa*, to desire a Passport for an Ambassador from the *Ottoman Port*, who was charged with Proposals of Peace, but that General *Caraffa* had answered, as he had done before, That the Emperor would not receive any Overtures of this kind without the Participation of his Allies. The Chamber of the *Finances* has distributed the Moneys appointed for the Recruits, the Magazines, and the Train of Artillery; And 40 thousand Florins have been sent to *Buda*, to be employed in the repairing the Fortifications of that place, which, it's hoped, will be finished in three months. The States of *Austria* who are now Asssembled here, have granted 300 thousand Florins towards the Expences of the next Campagne.

Frankfurt, Jan. 20. The States of *Francia* are to meet the 25th of this month at *Nuremberg*, to deliberate about the preserving an Union among the Members of that Circle. Several Officers are come hither to raise Men for the Service of the Emperor; These assure us, that the Imperial Forces will be very early in the Field this Year; and that they will begin the Campagne with the Siege of *Alba Regalis*. The Letters from *Vienna* say; the Garisons of *Alba Regalis* and *Agria* desert extremely; and that Preparations were making for

the Bombarding the last of these places. We have of late had several reports about *Teckelej*; one while 'twas said he was gone to *Constantinople*, and another while that the *Turks* kept him under a Guard at *Waradin*; but the last Advices from *Hungary* tell us, that he was with a Body of *Turks* and *Tartars* at *Jemeswaer*, designing to make use of the opportunity which the Frost gave him of passing the Rivers, to fall upon the *Imperialists* in their Quarters; but that through the great vigilance of General *Caraffa*, our Troops were in that posture, that there was no danger of their being surprized.

Cologne, Jan. 24. The Marquis de *Boufflers*, Governor of *Luxemburg*, was the last week at *Trier*, where he staid two days, and then returned to his Government. The States of *Fuliers* are still asssembled at *Duseldorpe*, the chief matter they have before them, concerns the raising the extraordinary Subsidies demanded by their Prince. We have an account from *Ratinbonne*, that the Deputy of the Duke of *Mecklenburg Swerin* had presented a Memorial to the Dyet, complaining, that notwithstanding the several Colledges had declared that the Members of the Empire ought not to be burdened with Quarters for the Troops of any Neighbouring Prince; and that their Conclusion upon that Matter had been put into the hands of the Imperial Commissioners, that they might lay it before the Emperor, the Country of the said Duke of *Mecklenburg*, has been anew charged with Quarters for a Regiment of *Brandenburgh* Horse, and several Troops of Dragoons. The last Letters from *Vienna* inform us, that the *Hussars* of *Gnau* had defeated a Party belonging to the Garison of *Alba Regalis*, and taken several Letters, among which was one from the *Bassa* of that place to the Grand Visier, wherein he demands with great earnestness a supply of Money and Provisions, without which, he says, he

cannot promise to make the Defence that might be expected from him, in case the place should be attacked by the Christians.

Hamburg, Jan. 25. We have Letters from *Warsaw* of the 10th Instant, which tell us, that all matters were adjusted with the Ambassadors of *Moscow*; That several Conferences had been held between the chief Commanders of the Army, and some of the Senators, to order the Preparations for the Prosecution of the War; That the King had declared, that he would command his Forces in Person the next Campagne; That the Train of Artillery was preparing; That the Officers both of Horse and Foot were making their Levies; And that the Poles would have a greater Army in the Field the next Summer than they had the last, especially if the *Moscovites* can be prevailed with to join a Body of their Foot with the Forces of that Crown. The Magistrates, of this City have resolved to build a new Fort on the River *Ahster*.

Hague, Jan. 31. The Envoy of *Morocco* is gone to *Amsterdam*, but will return hither against the meeting of the States of *Holland*, to finish his Negotiation. The Conferences are continued between the *Brandenburgh* Ministers and the Deputies of the *West-India* Company, of these Countries; And, it's believed, the matters that are the Subject of them, will now very suddenly be adjusted. The *Beer Van Dyckvelt* is preparing for his departure for *England*.

Paris, Febr. 1. The 30th of the last month the King, accompanied by the Dauphin, the Dauphiness, and the Duke and Duchess of *Orleans*, came to *Nostre Dame*, to give Thanks to God for his Recovery, the Archbishop at the Head of the Chapter, receiving him at the great door of the Church. His Majesty, having heard Mass, went to the Town-House, where he dined; The Prevost of the Merchants had the Honour to serve the King, and the Eschevins, and the other Officers of the City served the Dauphin, the Dauphiness, the Duke and Duchess of *Orleans*, and the other Ladies that sat at the King's Table, which was thrice covered with 100 Dishes at each Service; There were four other Tables for the Nobility, and other Persons of Quality; In the Place before the Town-House five Fountains ran with Wine the whole Day, and the Shops were everywhere shut. After Dinner the King went to the *Place des Victoires* to see his Statue, set up there by the *Marschal de la Feuillade*; And in his return to *Versailles*, his Majesty was entertained with Illuminations and Fire-works prepared at certain distances along the River as far as *Seve*, by Order of the said *Marschal*. There was likewise in the Evening a great Fire-work before the Town-House, and Bonfires in all the Streets of this City. The King intends to go on Monday, next to *Marli*, and to stay there till Friday. The Duke de *Mortemar* is arrived here, from *Italy*. The *Marquis de Bernay*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoy*, had Audience of the King at *Versailles* the 28th of the last month.

Ripon, Jan. 26. Yesterday was brought hither His Majesties Royal Charter to this Corporation by Mr. *Cuthbert Chambers*, an Alderman of this Town, being met seven Miles from hence by many of the Neighbouring Gentlemen, the Members of this Corporation, and several other of the most considerable Inhabitants in and near this place, to the number of near 400 on Horse-

back. The whole Company came into the Town in good order, and (after the usual Oaths were administered to the Mayor, and the other Members of the Corporation) went to the Market Cross, and there drank their Majesties Healths; After that all the Company were entertained at Mr. Mayor's House, several Bonfires being made, the Musick playing, the Bells ringing, and the Inhabitants of this place and others concluding the Day with all the Testimonies of Joy, Duty, and Loyalty imaginable. In this Charter His Majesty hath been Graciously pleased to grant unto this Corporation two new Fairs for Horses, and all manner of Cattle (the old Horse-Fairs being of late held at uncertain times) these Fairs are to begin on Monday before the 20th day of *March*, and on Monday after *Lammass* Day yearly, and to continue each four days.
