India Board, April 13, 1858.

THE following papers have been received at the East India House:

No. 1.

Captain Wroughton to the Major of Brigade, Benares.

*Camp, Burrul Ghat,
August 20, 1857.*

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report that the Goorka force, consisting of 4 regiments, was yesterday morning attacked by the rebels at a village, by name Gugrate. The rebels were under the orders of Mahomed Hussun, who it is stated has entered the district with a large body of men from Oude, with a view to collecting the revenue.

2. I am happy to say the Goorkas behaved with their usual well-known gallantry, and drove the enemy off in first-rate style, killing, as far as I could judge, between 130 and 150 men. The loss on our side was 2 killed and 7 wounded. It is impossible for me to state the numerical state of the enemy, as they were mostly concealed in tops of trees, jungle, and villages, but their number was very great; I should say 3000 men, as they completely surrounded our camp. An individual of rank, whose name has not yet transpired, was killed in attempting to make his escape, and numerous documents and letters were found in his palanquin.

3. I cannot praise too highly the conduct of the Nepaulese force. The enemy was no doubt a contemptible one, but the style in which the Goorkas went a-head promises much for the future, should their services ever be required to compete with a foe worthy of opposing them.

*The Officer Commanding Sumbulpore Field Force,
to the Station Staff Officer, Cuttack.*

Kulleebugah, November 5, 1857.

I HAVE the honour to state, for the information of the officer commanding Cuttack, that from reports brought in by the Senior Assistant Commissioner's spies and my own, I felt confident that the rebels were collecting in the direction of Kheenda and Kolaberah, and that a large body of them, under Kuma Ghustea, of Kolaberah, had taken possession of the Thur-Ghatty pass. I therefore determined to order out a detachment, for the purpose of dispersing them.

2. Lieutenant Hadow, of the Artillery, having joined me with two mountain-train howitzers yesterday, and the Senior Assistant Commissioner having placed under my command a jemadar and 30 men of the Ramghur Battalion, and 30 Sebundies, a detachment strength as per margin,* marched

3. We proceeded in the direction of Thur Ghatty, The jungle either side of the road, particularly as we approached the pass, was so dense that it was with difficulty our flanking parties could force their way through it; at the same time I considered it necessary to proceed with every precaution.

4. On arriving at Sausan we learnt that no news of our coming had preceded us. Consequently we advanced with the utmost dispatch towards Thur Ghatty, our object being to reach that place before the rebels should gain information of our approach. In this we were entirely successful.

5. About half a mile from the pass the road wound round under a hill to our right; advancing along this road for about 100 yards, we came to a large swamp, with high thickly-wooded hills to our left and left rear, the pass itself being directly in our front.

6. As soon as we arrived under the hill first mentioned, a tom-tom from the quarter was loudly beaten by the rebels, and some fire-arms were discharged at us, but no one was visible from my position, at the head of the two companies of the 40th Regiment of Madras Native Infantry.

7. At the same time, Lieutenant Hadow, who had ridden on a short distance in advance, came up to me, and reported that he could see about a dozen men under the trees at the foot of the hill to the left. As we continued advancing, he laid his guns and gave them two rounds of shell,—we halting in the meantime. We again advanced, and threw out skirmishers, when just at this moment the men of the Ramghur Battalion, getting excited, commenced firing from our right and right rear without order, and the firing becoming general I was forced to recall the skirmishers, and seeing people making off up the hill alluded to, to our left, and about 700 yards off, I directed Lieutenant Hadow to give them four rounds, which he did.

8. In the mean time the firing having ceased, I directed Lieutenant Hart to take a sub-division and scour the hill to the right. Ensign Nepean to take the same number of men and act in a like manner to the left, whilst I advanced along the swamp in the direction of the pass, with the main body, to support either party, should it appear necessary.

from Sumbulpore under my command this morning.

9. About a quarter of an hour elapsed, and hearing no more firing, I took a party of the 40th, and proceeded to scour the hill in my front, accompanied by Lieutenant Hadow.

10. All three parties returned in the course of half an hour, without having met with any of the enemy. Lieutenant Hart and Ensign Nepean came upon several of the encampments, in many of which the rice was still boiling; and the latter discovered what was evidently a depôt of supplies, consisting of rice and other grain, to the amount, he states, of 18 elephant loads. This he destroyed, as far as he was able.

11. We halted in the swamp for about three hours, and then advanced up the pass to Kutterbyah, as I did not consider Thur Ghatty, although for the present quite cleared of the rebels, a safe spot to encamp in.

12. We heard nothing more of the rebels, and arrived here about sunset.

13. Our loss in the engagement was 1 sepoy of the 40th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, wounded mortally, and another man of the same corps slightly, names and companies mentioned in the margin.*

14. The strength and loss of the enemy it is impossible to ascertain, owing to the density of the jungle in which they were concealed. All reports, however, go to prove that they were in great force, and we have reason to believe that from 5 to 12 of the rebels were killed, amongst whom was a near relation of the Ghurootea of Kolaberah.

No. 3.

The Officer Commanding Sumbulpore Field Force to the Station Staff Officer, Cuttack.

November 9, 1857.

IN continuation of my letter No. 1, from Kutterbayah, dated the 5th of November, 1857, I have the honour to report that the field force under my command marched on the 6th instant to Samisingah.

2. On the 7th to Kurrcapollie, passing through Kolaburah, which appeared totally deserted by the villagers. On arriving in front of the Guratee house I found it to be loop-holed for fire-arms and the gates closed. I therefore detached a party of skirmishers from the companies of the 40th under Ensign Nepean, to examine it. The gate was fastened from the inside, and an entrance was gained by one of the men climbing over the wall and opening it from the rear. There was no one in the house or grounds round it, but the walls were perforated for firing through, in all directions. I therefore directed Lieutenant Hadow to fire the building, and we marched on to our halting ground.

3. Private Narrainsawmy, whom I reported as mortally wounded on the 5th instant, expired to-day.

4. On the 8th, we marched to Salar, taking the town of Kunda in our route, and finding that, although the house of Simerdarsain and Codunt Sain was deserted, preparations had been made for defending it, I followed the same course with regard to burning it, as mentioned in paragraph 2.

5. Near Salar is a ghaut, which was, on the 5th instant in the possession of the rebels, and deserted by them on hearing the firing of our guns at Thur-Ghatty; we passed by several of their deserted encampments.

6. We returned to Sumbulpoore this day, and I have every reason to believe that the rebels are totally dispersed. The villagers, some of whom had been cruelly tortured by the rebels, crowded round as we passed, and loudly expressed their gratitude and joy.

7. It is my pleasing duty to report that all ranks composing the field force under my command performed their duties, both at Thur-Gatty, on the 5th instant, and during our subsequent harassing marches, to my entire satisfaction.

8. At Thurgatty parties composed of the men of the 40th Regiment, Madras Native Infantry, sent to scour the hills, dashed into the jungle with the greatest alacrity and spirit; and the loss of their comrade, who fell at an early period of the day, aroused within them a creditable desire to avenge his death.

9. In conclusion, I beg to bring especially to the notice of the commanding officer the conduct of Privates G. C., No. 1959, Shaik Cawder Grenadier Company, 40th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, whom I employed as spies, first in the direction of Khundah, and subsequently in that of Thur-Ghatty, and upon whose information I was mainly led, in selecting the latter place as the point of attack.

The Officer Commanding Nagpore Moveable Column, to the Adjutant-General of the Army, Fort Saint George.

FOR submission to his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, I have the honour to enclose copies of despatches from Major Sullivan, 4th Light Cavalry, commanding a detachment* at Sehora, reporting the affair at Moowarra on the 6th of November, and from Lieutenant Stewart, commanding a troop 4th Light Cavalry, reporting the affair of Ramkarra, when, I regret to say, Captain Tottenham, 4th Light Cavalry, received his death wound.

No. 5.

The Officer Commanding Detachment Kamptee Moveable Column, to the Assistant Quartermaster-General, Nagpore Force, Jubbulpore.

Camp Goosulpore, November 7, 1857.

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of the officer commanding the column, that, finding it impossible to push on the dawk further than Kylwanah, where we arrived on the evening of the 4th, it being reported that the rebels were in force on the road in the neighbourhood of Iskai, and that the 52nd mutineers were also in our immediate vicinity, I deemed it prudent to retire on the evening of the 5th to Moowarra.

On the morning of the 6th, the detachment had just resumed its march, and had only advanced about 400 yards, when we were surprised by a heavy fire upon us from two guns, ginjals, and matchlocks. As soon as the guns could be got into position we returned the fire with both our pieces, but unfortunately the axletree of one of our guns broke down at the second round. Some delay ensued of course in effecting the repairs which were accomplished, in the most admirable and cool manner, by Lieutenant Lane and his artillerymen under fire.

Seeing the enemy making attempts to surround us, I ordered the squadron of cavalry to attack the enemy by a flank movement from my left, and the infantry to accomplish a similar movement along the road to the right. This was done to my most perfect satisfaction. The cavalry previously on the right rear of the guns, passed in rear of them, crossed the road, and after getting through two most difficult ravines, at a given signal from Lieutenant Lane of two guns, in rapid succession charged and captured one of the enemy's guns which were turned on them, as soon as they perceived the flank movement, moving onwards they sabred about thirty of the rebels, three of which fell under Lieutenant Clerk's sword. The 33rd Native Infantry entering the village, bayoneted several, and came on the second gun, which had been disabled and withdrawn before the cavalry charge.

In this engagement we lost one gun lascar killed; 1 naique, and 2 privates, 4th Light Cavalry severely wounded; and one private 33rd Native Infantry, and one grass cutter 4th Light Cavalry also severely wounded. Lieutenant Clerk received a slight graze from a sword.

The enemy are reported to have numbered from 1,500 to 2,000 men, with a fair proportion of matchlock men; (sixty) 60 of them were counted dead upon the field, and it is impossible to calculate the number of the wounded.

I cannot extol too highly the cool and gallant manner in which Lieutenant Lane, and the artillery under him, worked their one gun and repaired the other under a heavy fire of both grape and round shot, the squadron of the 4th, with Lieutenant Clerk, also did their work most gallantly, and Lieutenant New, with the infantry, entered the village in the most spirited manner, and along with some of the gunners cleared the village most effectually. My thanks are also due to Lieutenant Dick, 52nd Bengal Native Infantry, attached to the infantry, and to Assistant-Surgeon Adam, for his great attention to the wounded men.

I beg to enclose a return of casualties. The guns captured are brass guns of small calibre.

No. 7.

Lieutenant Charles S. Stewart, 5th Troop, 4th Regiment Light Company, to the Brigade Major, Nagpore Moveable Column Jubbulpore.

Camp, Jubbulpore, November 11, 1857.

I HAVE the honour to state, for the information of the officer commanding Nagpore moveable column, that Captain Tottenham, having been ordered to take the 5th Troop 4th Madras Light Cavalry on special service to Ghousilpore, marched on the morning of the 7th instant. On getting news at Pownaghur (the first stage) that Ghousilpore was being looted, we galloped on, but arrived too late, as the lootees had all left and gone away to the right of the road, in which direction we fol-

lowed, and after some time caught sight of nearly 1,000 people running towards a village called Ram-karra (they were about one mile or so from the village, we were more than three) we went after them, but owing to the bad nature of the ground they reached the village before we got up to them. We followed them into the village but nobody was to be seen, at last a man pointed out the rajah's house as one likely to conceal men, we burst open the door and searched the house thoroughly, but could find nobody, at last Captain Tottenham (who was on foot) walked up to another door of the house to break it open, when four or five shots were fired through the door and from the balcony above at Captain Tottenham, who ran to his horse, mounted, and called to me to take the troop out of the village, which I did afterwards. We had to go back to fetch Captain Tottenham, who had fainted (on account of a wound which I then for the first time learnt he had received) in the middle of the village. I then posted the troop in small parties to watch the village all round, which they did till sunset, when I withdrew them as there were too few men with me to surround so large a village, so as to prevent any body getting away in the dark. I am unable to say whether there were many people concealed in the village Ram-karra, or whether they ran through it to the jungles on the other side. We killed seven or eight men, and took eighteen prisoners, one of whom died of wounds, the rest were hung.

No. 8.

G. U. Yule, Esq., Commissioner of the 12th or Bhaugulpore Division, to A. R. Young, Esq., Secretary to the Government of Bengal, Fort William.

Sir, *Date, 1, Camp Purneah, December 11, 1857.*

IN continuation of my letter of the 6th instant, I have the honour to state that, hearing, on the 8th instant, of the mutineers of the 11th Irregular Cavalry being within twenty-seven miles of Kishengunge, and feeling confident they would avoid us, I prepared for a start either north or south to intercept them, whichever road they might select. In the afternoon, information being brought to me that they had proceeded south towards the Dinagepore and Purneah road, I started at sunset with the soldiers and sailors on elephants, and the guns on carts drawn by four bullocks each, and fitted up for the purpose at Kishengunge, and agreeing with Captain Burbank and Lieutenant Chapman that it would be advisable to proceed first to Purneah, we marched straight for that station, which the soldiers reached soon after sunrise, but the sailors, detained by the guns, not till the afternoon. I found the residents in considerable alarm, the treasure and magazines removed to the jail, where some of the residents slept, &c. No correct news of the movements of the mutineers could be had that day, with the exception of its being ascertained they had extorted money and supplies at Raneegunge; the residence of a once wealthy family, six miles on the other side of the Mahunuddee, but it was reported they had crossed that river. Next morning (10th) they were seen coolly marching towards the bazaar, and only a short distance from it, evidently, it would seem, unaware of our return from Kishengunge. We immediately went out leaving 20 men for the protection of the jail, unfortunately we were just ten minutes too soon, or we should have caught them in a spot where escape to most would have been impossible, as it was, shots were exchanged by the advanced guards with a fatal result to a poor villager only, and the mutineers rapidly retreated

to the eastward by the road they came, and, after remaining near the town till we had made a wide exploration on horseback, to see that the scoundrels had not hidden in the extensive jungles in that direction, the soldiers and sailors returned to their barracks. At night scouts sent out by us returned, having ascertained where the mutineers had pitched for the night; and Captain Burbank, Lieutenant Chapman, and I immediately determined to try a night surprise as the only means of getting near them. We accordingly started at 2 A.M. on elephants, our party consisting of fifty sailors under Captain Burbank (the remainder and the guns being left to protect the station) forty-eight of Her Majesty's 5th Fusiliers, under Lieutenant Chapman, and nine volunteers, under the guidance of Mr. Burford, to whose thorough knowledge of the country the success of the expedition must be ascribed, we proceeded across country to a spot about a mile and a half south of the road where the mutineers were encamped; here we halted for some time, in the hope that Captain Burbank, who, remaining in the rear to push on stragglers, had lost his road, would come up, but the dawn beginning to break we could afford to wait no longer, and, the men having dismounted, the order to advance was given, the elephants being left in a bamboo jungle to await our return.

2. When within a half a mile of their camp, we sighted the irregulars, apparently upwards of a hundred in number, mounted and ready to be off. The 5th were ordered to advance at the double to take possession of a bund between the enemy and us which they immediately did, the sailors following close up. On topping the bund, the 5th formed in line and fired a volley. The irregulars hesitated a moment, and then influenced, I suppose, by the absence of our guns and our apparently small force came down at the charge, gallantly headed by a native officer who alone touched our bayonets. The 5th, who received the brunt of the charge, were just in time to form square, and their volley, fired at close quarters, turned the enemy, who passed by our left. They then scattered over the maidan in small bodies at the distance of 3, 4, and 500 yards, and now the Enfields came into play, man after man fell, and we had it our own way till a dense fog spread over us. Twice, under cover of this fog and some trees which lined the bund, they tried to come on us unawares, and twice they were sent back. For nearly an hour they hovered round us, occasionally creeping on and firing, but always ineffectually. The fog which hampered us proved, the saving of Captain Burbank and his three companions, men of the 5th, who, under its cover, came uninjured into our squares. About an hour after sunrise, the fog cleared off, and, after two or three more telling shots, the enemy moved off to the north, carrying with them their wounded, and I suspect some of the killed whom the fog had enabled them to remove unmolested. Six sowars were found dead close to the squares, and several wounded were believed to be hiding in the dhan fields, whom the villagers are now searching for; I was unwilling to delay, to look for them, being apprehensive that the mutineers might make a raid on the Purneah Bazar, so we returned quick. It would be presumption in me to praise the 5th; they behaved as the regiment to which they belong has always done, the rapidity with which they formed square, and the cool deliberate way in which they received the charge, excited our warmest admiration. The coolness and steadiness of the sailors was also wonderful, they formed square nearly as quick as the soldiers, and Captain Burbank deserves the greatest credit for the amount of training he has contrived to give them, in so short a time. I ought to mention that, dur-

ing Captain Burbank's absence at the commencement of the fight, the sailors were commanded by Serjeant Levers who managed them admirably.

3. I have just heard that seven dead bodies have been found, and that the mutineers were seen about 9 A.M. making their way rapidly to the north; I expect they will cross the Coosee about Nathpore, and I am afraid they will not let us near them again. Without cavalry, no effectual check can be given to the scoundrels. We captured eight of their horses and killed about as many more.

Captain the Honourable E. G. Curzon, Commanding a detachment of Europeans and Goorkhas, to the Station Staff Officer.

Sir,

Jelapigoree, December 12, 1857.

I HAVE the honour to report for the information of the officer commanding, that in obedience to order of yesterday's date, I left my camp at $\frac{1}{2}$ past 8 o'clock last night with 50 Europeans, 40 of the Sebundy Sappers, for the purpose of looking up, and if possible attacking the Dacca mutineers.

2. The information that I have received led me to believe that their position was 15 miles off, on the bank of a nullah, deep but not more than 200 yards in breadth. My intention therefore was to surprise them if possible by daylight, to keep up a heavy fire from my side, and if successful, and the result warranted it, to cross over the European part of the force (under cover of the Ghoorkas) and disperse them.

3. I arrived opposite the position of the mutineers a little before break of day, after a march of nearly 25 miles, and on reconnoitering the place, discovered the nullah to be $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile broad, with two separate streams, the opposite bank being at least 20 feet higher than the bed of the river, and perpendicular; their position a very strong one with only one flank open and heavy jungle close up to their rear. I also discovered a sand bank about 250 yards from the opposite bank which would afford shelter; and as, under the circumstance, to attack them on the flank was impossible, I determined to make a rush for this, and see if I could do them any damage with my fire. This we accomplished, but finding, after about 20 minutes firing, that very little could be done, and that close quarters was out of the question, I retired across the bed of the Nullah to my own side, and after halting some time, in the hope of their following, we marched back to this place, and arrived at 8 P.M., having accomplished a march of little short of 50 miles, in 24 hours.

4. I have the honour to enclose a return of wounded, and a rough sketch of the mutineers' position. Colonel Sherer will perceive how strongly they are posted, and with what great natural advantage in their favour. The jungle appears very heavy on their right and rear.

*Return of Wounded on the 12th of December, 1857.**Camp, Jelpigoree, December 12, 1857.*

Her Majesty's 10th Foot.—No. 2911, Jeremiah Haly, slight contusion of hip.

I HAVE the honour to report that yesterday morning the detachment of Her Majesty's 5th Fusiliers, under my command, together with 50 of the brigade of seamen under Captain Burham, attacked and defeated the mutineers of the 11th Irregular Cavalry, about 200 strong, under the direction of Mr. Yule, the Commissioner of Bhaugulpore.

On the evening of the 8th inst. we left Kissen-gunge, having received intelligence that the mutineers were at Nowabgunge, and marched into Purneah on elephants the same night, without a halt.

On the morning of the 10th their advanced guard was surprised, and shots exchanged immediately outside the Purneah bazaar, and we shortly after came upon their main body, who retired upon our advancing.

The same evening we received intelligence of their being encamped at a short distance from Purneah, and marched down accordingly at 2 A.M.

We came upon them at daybreak, just as they were leaving their camp.

They immediately charged us most gallantly, riding right up to the bayonets, but having lost seven men, they refused to renew their attack, and remained hovering round us in detached parties for about an hour.

A dense mist prevented the rifles doing as much execution as they otherwise would have done.

The enemy, however, had 7 killed left on the field, and about 20 or 30 more were wounded who, with one exception, made good their escape in the fog.

I am happy to say we have no casualties. The mutineers have gone in a north-westerly direction, and are making for Nathpore.

We start this morning after them on elephants. I beg to offer my thanks to those gentlemen who accompanied us as volunteers, who rendered essential service in pointing out the route, &c.

BEING the senior officer of the survivors of the Cawnpore garrison, and knowing of no other chan-

nel for bringing to the notice of Government the services of the officers and men who survived the massacre, I have the honour to address you direct on the subject, that his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief may have brought to his notice, the names of the officers and men now surviving, who formed part of the garrison under General Sir Hugh Wheeler.

The tale of the Cawnpore siege is too well known to render it necessary for me to dilate on the hardships suffered, or the gallantry displayed, and a detailed report on the subject has reached Government through other sources; but I trust I may be excused for bringing prominently to the notice of his Excellency, the gallantry of Lieutenant Delafosse, of the 53rd Native Infantry, who held command of one of the batteries in our intrenchments, and of Privates Sullivan and Murphy, the latter of the 84th Regiment, and the former an artilleryman, who sustained the whole hardships of the siege, and were, with myself, the sole survivors of the massacre.

Private Sullivan, a most intelligent person, was selected afterwards for special duty in the ordnance department. I regret to say he subsequently fell a victim to cholera, and died at Cawnpore.

Lieutenant Delafosse, and the two privates above mentioned, owed their lives to being detailed on the hazardous duty of driving from the banks of the river a party of rebels at least ten times their number in strength, and they were thus cut off from the refugee party, and fortunately at last reached the protection of a friendly Rajah.

Knowing of no other way of placing the services of these men on record, I have thus presumed to intrude on your valuable time by addressing you in their behalf.

"And copies of the said report, accompanied by a notice stating that written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in, or omitted from, the said report, or any amendment proposed to be made therein, have been duly published and deposited, as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed, and the statement which has been received by the said Board has been duly deposited as required by that Act;

"Now, therefore, the General Board of Health do hereby, under my hand, as President of the said Board, and under its seal of office, and in pursuance of the said Public Health Act, humbly report to your Majesty that it appears to us to be expedient that:

'The Public Health Act, 1848,' and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act printed by your Majesty's Printers, should be applied to, and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said hamlet of Brentwood, in the parish of South Weald, in the county of Essex, and that such area, places, and parts of places should be and constitute a district for the purposes of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

"2. The Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act should consist of twelve persons, and that the entire number should be elected for the whole of the said district.

"3. The first election of the said Local Board should take place on the fifteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

"4. One-third in number of the said Local Board of Health should go out of office on the twenty-fifth day of September in each year subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed should fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then that such one-third should go out of office on the day next following.

Every person at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, should be resident as in the said 'Public Health Act, 1848,' is required, and be seized or possessed of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or amount of not less than eight hundred pounds, or should be so resident, and rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or

place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than twenty pounds.

"6. At the first election of the said Local Board, Alfred Fielder, of Brentwood, Brewer, should have the powers and perform the duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting the first election; and in case the said Alfred Fielder, from illness, or from other sufficient cause, should be unable to discharge such duties, or should be absent, or should refuse to act, then William Richard Preston, of Brentwood, Solicitor, should perform such of those duties as then remain to be exercised or performed.

The light will be a *fixed white* light, elevated 152 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible in ordinary weather from the deck of a vessel at a distance of 20 miles.

The illuminating apparatus will be catadioptric, by a Fresnel lens of the first order.

The light on Bush Cay will be fitted with a catadioptric apparatus of the fourth order, and continued as a harbour light for the locality.
