The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to the Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to the Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

### ADDRESSES.

**GENERAL ORDERS BY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF INDIA.**

*Camp Allahabad, February 12, 1858.*

THE Right Honourable the Governor-General of India is pleased to publish for general information, the following Despatch from Lieutenant-Colonel P. V. Maxwell, C.B., 88th Regiment, dated the 4th of February, 1858.

*Lieutenant-Colonel P. V. Maxwell, C.B., 88th Regiment, Commanding Detachment, to Brigadier J. E. W. Inglis, Commanding at Cawnpore.*

*Camp Bhogneepore,*

*February 4, 1858.*

SIR, I HAVE the honor to report that the enemy from Calpee attacked our position at 5 o'clock this morning. From the nature of the ground, which is much broken, and from the cover afforded by the crops, which are high, it is impossible to compute their numbers; but, from the extent of ground which they occupied, they must have been in considerable force.

I advanced with 5 companies of the 88th Regiment, 2 guns of Royal Artillery (9-pounders) under Captain Talbot, and 50 sowars under Lieutenant Thompson. We defeated the enemy, and had a running fight of four hours. They disputed every inch of the ground, making a stand at Chowra, a village three miles from this place. We pursued them as long as possible, and they retreated across the river, keeping up the fire of their skirmishers to the very last.

I am happy to say my casualties are but few. Lieutenant Thompson, commanding the sowars, was severely wounded in the leg, and his horse was twice wounded; 3 sowars are wounded (slightly); 1 private, 88th Regiment, dangerously wounded; 1 private, 88th Regiment, slightly wounded.

About 80 dead bodies of the enemy were counted by my officers—all sepoys.

Where all behaved well it is difficult to particularise; but I think it due to Major the Honorable J. J. Bourke, to bear testimony to the gallant and able manner in which he led on the skirmishers, and drove the enemy out of the village of Chowra.

SIR, *January 29, 1858.*

I HAVE the honor, by desire of the Commander-in-Chief, to forward, in original, a letter from Major-General N. Penny, C.B., commanding the Delhi Field Force, No. 1729, of the 22nd ultimo, (which, owing to the direct dawki communications being closed, was sent by a circuitous route, and has only now reached Head Quarters) enclosing copies of two reports, dated the 15th and 18th idem, from Lieutenant-Colonel T. Seaton, C.B., commanding a moveable column, of two actions fought by the troops under his orders, in both of which his force achieved decisive successes.

2. His Excellency is desirous of expressing his unqualified approbation of the manner in which these affairs were conducted, and of the behaviour of the officers and troops engaged; but he deeply laments the loss of three brave officers of the Carabineers—Captain Wardlaw, Lieutenants Hudson and Vyse—in the brilliant and successful charge made by the detachment of this regiment under Captain Wardlaw's command, and a party of the 9th Lancers under Captain Head, who was dangerously wounded.

SIR, *Camp Khasgunge, December 15, 1857.*

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of Major-General Penny, C.B., commanding Delhi Field Force, that I reached Gungeree, with the column under my command, on the 15th instant, where I found Lieutenant-Colonel Farquhar with his detachment as per margin.†

Immediately after encamping, I sent a party of horse, under Captain Hodson, to reconnoitre the road in the direction of Khasgunge, as far as Bilram, a village within four miles of that town. Shortly after the party set out, Captain Light, my orderly officer, returned with information that the party had discovered the enemy's horse advancing at some distance towards our flanks, and presently Captain Hodson himself brought intelligence that the enemy was approaching in force.

I had kept the Dragoon Horses saddled, so the troop speedily mounted and moved out in support of the reconnoitring party that was showing front to the enemy. In the meantime, the line turned out. The Troop Horse Artillery, under Captain Bishop, came to the front, speedily followed by 2 guns under Lieutenant Griffin.

As the enemy's infantry and artillery were now plainly visible, I directed Lieutenant Colonel Kinleside to move forward with the artillery and engage the enemy, in order to check their advance, and give time for the infantry to disengage itself from the mass of ravines in front and form up.

The artillery engaged in the most gallant style; but, as the enemy's horse continued to advance, taking ground to the left, apparently with the intention of cutting off the Troop Horse Artillery, I called up the Dragoons in support, and directed Captain Wardlaw, commanding, to charge the enemy if a favourable opportunity offered.

In the meantime the whole force moved out and were formed up by Lieutenant-Colonel Farquhar, of the Belooch Battalion; and Captain Hodson, serving the enemy's horse, advancing still against our left, anticipated the order I sent him, and moved up with his whole regiment. The enemy's fire now began to slacken, and Captain Wardlaw, seeing his opportunity, charged with the Cara-

bineers and Lancers, and captured 2 guns; whilst, Captain Hodson advancing immediately against the enemy's right, they were driven in utter confusion from the field, hotly pursued by our cavalry and artillery.

The enemy were completely and utterly routed; they abandoned their last gun and 2 ammunition waggons, and numbers of their infantry threw away their arms, and hid themselves in the fields, or continued their headlong flight over the country. Numbers were shot in the fields, and many, rendered desperate by their situation, defended themselves fiercely and were killed.

The enemy had evidently not expected to meet any force, except the small detachment under Colonel Farquhar; they were therefore astounded by the fire of so many guns, and by the appearance, on their right, of the large body of horse under Captain Hodson, so that, when charged by Captain Wardlaw, they were instantly routed, and I was unable consequently to bring the infantry into action; but their presence near at hand enabled me with confidence to order the cavalry and artillery to continue the pursuit of the enemy for several miles, and with great effect.

From my own observation, and the report of others, I estimate the loss of the enemy as over 200 killed, and, as we subsequently learnt, numbers crept away wounded, and died.

My own loss was in the Cavalry solely, and amounted to 48. Of these 22 are slightly wounded; but I deeply regret to report the death of that good and gallant soldier, Captain Wardlaw; his brave brothers in arms, Captain Hudson and Lieutenant Vyse, of the 6th Carabineers; and also the severe wound of Captain Head, who commanded the detachment of 9th Lancers.

The charge executed by the Carabineers and Lancers, led by Captain Wardlaw, was so truly dashing and brilliant, that I could not do otherwise than make most prominent mention of it, and I am sure the Major-General will regret, as deeply as myself, that he and his gallant comrades were not spared to serve their country on future occasions.

The General will see by the list of casualties that Captain Hudson's newly raised body of horse was not at all backward. It rendered excellent service; less it could not do under its distinguished commander, whom I beg particularly to mention to the Major-General as having, on every possible occasion, rendered me the most effective service, whether in gaining information, reconnoitring the country, or leading his regiment.

The troop of Horse Artillery, under Captain Bishop, and the 2 guns, under Lieutenant Griffin, the whole commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel Kinleside, mainly contributed to the defeat of the enemy, and the Major-General will duly appreciate their coolness and skill. I received the most efficient aid from my Brigade-Major, Captain French, and from my orderly officer, Captain Light, of the Artillery, who conveyed my order to the Dragoons to charge, and went in with them, and I may say I never saw greater zeal and alacrity displayed than by the officers who accompanied me to the field either as Field Engineers or as volunteers. I could almost regret the enemy did not make a greater show of resistance.

## No. 9.

*Lieutenant-Colonel Seaton, C.B., Commanding Moveable Column, to Captain Stewart, Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General.*

SIR, Camp, Puttiallee, December 18, 1857.

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of the Major-General commanding Delhi Field Force, that I marched with the force, as per margin,\* from Suhawur, at daylight yesterday.

Having reason to believe the enemy might be at Puttiallee, I strengthened my advanced guard with Cavalry and 2 Horse Artillery guns, whilst Captain Hodson went forward with a large party of his regiment, throwing out reconnoitring parties on each flank, so as to give timely notice and prevent all chance of a surprise.

Soon after the column had cleared the village of Serai Nawabgunge, about four miles west of this place, I received intimation from Captain Hodson that the enemy's videttes were close in his front, had fired on his party, and retired slowly as he advanced. I immediately sent on the two Horse Artillery guns attached to the advance guard under Lieutenant Deroin to join Captain Hodson, at the same time forming the infantry up in quarter distance columns, at deploying distance to the right of the road, with guns on each flank, and the whole of my cavalry on my extreme right.

Having sent orders to Captain Hodson not to engage the enemy further, I took the opportunity of serving out the bread and grog to the men, thus allowing time for the heavy guns, under Lieutenant Gillespie, to arrive. By this time the enemy had opened fire from three guns at Captain Hodson's party, unreplied to by us, until I had got my infantry near enough to act effectively, should the enemy stand. I now directed Lieutenant-Colonel Kinleside to bring his artillery into action, which was at once and most effectually done.

Four Horse Artillery guns, under Lieutenants Deroin and Griffin, dashed to our immediate front, whilst four more, under Lieutenant Bishop, taking a detour to the right and wheeling into line, took the enemy in flank. The enemy, meantime, had shown his strength, and opened eleven guns, some of heavy calibre, upon us. By this time the infantry and heavy guns topped the rise which had previously hidden them, and the sun, being to the back of the foe, shone directly on us, exposing a front so formidable as to deprive him of all further courage to resist. His fire slackened, and at last ceased altogether, and the Horse Artillery, limbering up, charged, with some of Hodson's Horse, right into the enemy's camp, capturing several guns in position, all the camp, magazine, &c., and cutting down numbers of the gunners.

My object in keeping so large a body of my cavalry on my right was now attained, as, instead of going through the town, and being checked by the numbers of enclosures, gardens, &c., which extend for more than a mile to its east, they went round, and thus came into the open plain beyond, on more even terms with the enemy. Colonel Kinleside got quickly through the town, and, joining the cavalry beyond, carried on the pursuit with them. This was kept up for seven miles. The enemy were cut down on all sides, whilst many were drowned in endeavouring to cross the wheels of the Boor Gungha to our left, or shot in the water. Several guns, tumbrils, &c., were taken in this pursuit.

Meantime, directing Captain Stafford with his regiment to take charge of the enemy's camp and the captured guns, I requested Major Eld to skirmish through the gardens with the infantry. This was most efficiently performed, and numbers of the enemy killed.

In this engagement 12 guns and many tumbrils were captured, a list of which I have the honor to enclose, and I estimate the loss of the enemy to be over 700 killed. I might with safety estimate their loss much higher.

My own loss, as the Major-General will perceive from the accompanying return, was most trifling.

In this, as in the late affair at Gungeree, the artillery and cavalry were principally engaged, and in fact the action was fought by them. I cannot speak too highly in their praise, and I beg to mention to the Major-General, Colonel Kinleside, who commanded the whole of the artillery, and Lieutenants Bishop, Deroin, and Griffin, who served under him.

To Lieutenant Russell, who commanded the Dragoons, and his brave comrades, my thanks are specially due for their gallantry in action, and the vigour of their pursuit.

After the action at Gungeree, I specially mentioned Captain Hodson and his regiment. I can but repeat what I then said, and beg that the Major-General will be good enough to bring this officer, and his great and important services, to the special notice of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief. The infantry had no opportunity of coming in contact with the enemy; but I must beg to mention to the Major-General that, on all occasions,

I have met with the most zealous and efficient support from that good officer, Major Eld, who on this occasion took command of the line.

From my staff officers, Captain French and Captain Light, I received all that active and zealous assistance I expected from two such efficient officers. They shared in the pursuit of the enemy; and I must not omit to mention how much obliged I felt to Captains Taylor and Greathed, who went forward with Captain Hodson to reconnoitre the enemy's position, protected by a party of Hodson's Horse under Lieutenant McDougall, to whom my thanks are due.

GENERAL ORDERS BY THE PRESIDENT  
OF THE COUNCIL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

THE Honorable the President of the Council of India in Council directs the publication of the following report of the operations of the cavalry brigade under Brigadier, now Brigadier-General, Hope Grant, C.B.:

*Brigadier-General Hope Grant, C.B., to Major H. W. Norman, Assistant Adjutant-General of the Army, Head Quarters.*

SIR, *Camp, Futtyghur, Jan. 10, 1858.*

IN compliance with the orders received from his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, through you, I have the honor to forward a report of the operations of the Cavalry Brigade at Delhi, in pursuit of the mutineers down the Doab, and up to the time his Excellency joined the force on the other side of the Ganges, on the way to Lucknow.

When this serious disturbance broke out, Her Majesty's 9th Lancers and two troops of Horse Artillery constituted the European portion of the force at Umballa, the remainder consisting of the 4th Light Cavalry (Lancers), the 5th, and 60th Regiments Native Infantry.

Shortly after the news of the proceedings at Meerut and Delhi reached the station, symptoms of disaffection on the part of these two Native Infantry Regiments became apparent; doubts also were entertained regarding the spirit of the Native Cavalry, and it behoved that the greatest watchfulness should be maintained by the European troops, in expectation of an outbreak. They were, therefore, constantly, day and night, under arms, and at all times ready for immediate action, had such been necessary; indeed, on Sunday the 10th of May, and on two or three other occasions, these troops actually were in saddle.

The probability of any movement of these native troops wore off as portions of the European infantry regiments in the hill stations moved down to Umballa. By the end of the month of May, a small compact column had been assembled, and Her Majesty's 9th Lancers formed the Cavalry of this force. The 4th Light Cavalry (Lancers) were

detached on duty to Saharunpore and other places in the vicinity of Umballa, except the head quarters and one squadron, which accompanied the force as far towards Delhi as Allipore, whence it proceeded to Meerut via Bagput.

At Allipore, early in June, this force, commanded by Major-General Sir H. Barnard, K.C.B., was joined by that from Meerut, under Brigadier A. Wilson, and two squadrons of the 6th Dragoon Guards, Carabineers, under Lieutenant-Colonel Custance, were added to the cavalry.

These squadrons had already, on the banks of the Hindun, had the opportunity, twice, of meeting the mutineers, and had, under their able commander, rendered essential service on each occasion.

The rebels and mutineers having taken up a strong position, defended by artillery, at a place named Badul-ke-Serai, about five miles from Delhi, the force moved to its attack on the morning of the 8th June. Three squadrons of the 9th Lancers, commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel Yule, and two troops of Horse Artillery were detached very early in the morning by the bank of the canal to turn the enemy's left. These troops attained their point shortly after the attack commenced in front, and were soon in action. Two squadrons and a portion of the Horse Artillery were very gallantly and successfully led by Lieutenant-Colonel Yule. The cavalry charged the rebels, and rode through them. Lieutenant Jones, of the 9th Lancers, with his squadron, captured one of their guns, killing the drivers, and, with Lieutenant-Colonel Yule's assistance, turned it upon a village occupied by the rebels, who were quickly dislodged. This was a well-conceived act gallantly executed. The remainder of the Horse Artillery, for a short period, got into very difficult ground, from which they took time to extricate themselves. The other squadron of the 9th Lancers was left for their protection.

The squadrons of the Carabineers and 4th squadron of the 9th Lancers were with the main body of our troops, and did good service. The Carabineers, from the right of our line, drove the rebels after they had broken across the canal. The rebels having been driven out of Badul-ka-Serai, a hot pursuit towards Delhi was taken up, but chiefly by the infantry and horse artillery, as the ground on each side the road was covered by houses and enclosures.

The operations of the day terminated by the firm possession, by the British troops, of the heights before Delhi.

From this period, during all the siege, nearly the whole of the outpost duties fell to the lot of the cavalry. This duty was a very arduous one. The rebels were constantly threatening our right flank in particular, and our rear, so that both by day and night the cavalry were liable to be, and were frequently, turned out, and were necessarily held always in readiness.

On the 12th June the Guide Corps joined the camp,—a very fine body, numbering about 260 men of Irregular Cavalry, commanded by Captain Daly. This corps had already achieved a high renown by its excellent service in the Punjab; and had, soon after reaching Delhi, an opportunity of displaying its excellent qualities, as on the 19th a very serious attack was made on our rear, about four o'clock in the afternoon, by a strong force of the rebels with a numerous artillery, who had posted their main body in a village beyond the Ochterlony Garden. Immediately on the commencement of the attack, I moved out with the cavalry and a portion of the artillery; parties of whom, acting on either flank of the garden named, drove the enemy's skirmishers back upon their

position, and held them in check, until the rest of the artillery and the whole of the available portion of our small force of infantry could come up.

The ground was very disadvantageous for cavalry, being much intersected by walls of gardens, &c.; but two squadrons of the gallant 9th Lancers and the Guide Cavalry on our left delivered a most successful charge, right at the enemy, and drove them back completely. In this charge, I grieve to say, the 9th Lancers lost their gallant leader, Lieutenant-Colonel Yule, who was killed—an excellent officer, full of military ardour and zeal. The regiment has to mourn in him the loss of one of its very bravest and most efficient officers. Captain Daly also, leading his Guides, was severely wounded by a musket shot, which, for the rest of the siege, deprived the corps and the service at large of a most energetic, experienced officer.

Ere the above was accomplished, evening had closed in, and soon it became too dark to distinguish friend from foe. The enemy retired to their village, leaving a gun and limber, with its ammunition carriage, on the ground. These were brought into our camp on the following morning.

In my despatch reporting this action, I had the sincere gratification of naming two privates of the 9th Lancers, who had displayed signal gallantry in the fight—Privates Thomas Hancock, who lost an arm on the occasion, and John Purcell, who had his horse shot under him, and was, I regret to say, afterwards killed at the assault of Delhi. Sir Henry Barnard was pleased to recommend that the Victoria Cross should be conferred on both. A private sowar also, named Roopur Khan, of the 4th Irregular Cavalry, my orderly at the time, displayed great bravery and devotion in offering me his horse when my own had been killed under me, and was chiefly instrumental in aiding my escape from the midst of the enemy. I am happy in being able to record his promotion to duffadar, and his admission to the Order of Merit in reward of such excellent conduct.

About this period, other regiments joined the cavalry force; portions of the 1st, 2d, and 5th Regiments of Punjab Cavalry, and Hodson's Horse. The latter consisted entirely of new levies; but have since greatly improved and become useful troops. The squadron commanded by Lieutenant Gough has, under my own observation, performed very valuable service, and their gallantry has been conspicuously noticed in a despatch of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief. The Punjab corps, under their distinguished leaders, Lieutenant Watson, Lieutenant Nicolson afterwards, and at the present time Captain Probyn and Lieutenant Younghusband, have proved themselves admirable soldiers. Confident in their officers and assured of victory, these troops have never hesitated to attack the Hindustani horsemen in any odds, and have invariably forced them to give way.

On the 9th of July, a party of the 9th Irregular Cavalry, whose conduct I had been for some time doubtful of, proved themselves false to their oath of allegiance, and a picquet on duty on the right flank of the camp admitted a force of the enemy's cavalry within their post. These horsemen entered the camp, fought desperately, and tried to take away a battery of guns. They also rode up to a picquet where we had two heavy guns placed in position, intending to spike them; but they were gallantly withstood by a party of the 9th Lancers, under command of Lieutenant Martin, who prevented the attack being made. I beg to be allowed to copy part of a letter written to me by Captain

Light of the Bengal Artillery, the officer in command of the picquet :—

“I believe that to the prompt manner in which Lieutenant Martin got his party under arms, and the bold way in which he placed them between the enemy and the rear of my battery, both myself and the party of Artillery under my command are indebted for escaping from an attack which must have been disastrous.”

The cavalry were frequently employed during the siege of Delhi in escort and patrolling duties, occasionally making distant reconnoissances ; and in the month of August, Lieutenant Hodson, with 200 of his own men and a squadron of Guide Cavalry, proceeded to Rohtuck, where he fell in with a party of the rebels and discomfited them, killing several,—on one occasion, a reasaldar and 25 men of Irregular Cavalry whom he had surprised. Lieutenant Hodson displayed great intelligence and alacrity in this duty, extricating himself from more than one perilous position, and on his return to camp was able to give valuable information of the state of the districts he had passed through.

The cavalry were also able to afford assistance to the artillery in the trenches, in consequence of numerous casualties and sickness having reduced their numbers and rendered the duties very severe. I was requested by Major-General Wilson, at this time in command, to furnish men from the Carabineers and 9th Lancers, and I ordered 10 of the former and 60 of the latter daily, under Lieutenants Blair and Evans, of the 9th Lancers, who volunteered their services on this duty. Nothing could be better or more praiseworthy than the way in which the men of these two regiments vied with each other, day and night, in the performance of this severe work, and I beg to be allowed to record here extracts from the despatches of Major-General A. Wilson, commanding the force, and of Major Brind, of the Artillery, who commanded in the batteries and witnessed their conduct :—

“I should neither be fulfilling the repeatedly expressed wishes of the artillery officers attached to this force, nor following the dictates of my own inclination, if I failed to acknowledge the valuable assistance which has, throughout the operations before Delhi, been most cheerfully given by the non-commissioned officers and men of Her Majesty's 9th Lancers and the 6th Dragoon Guards in working the batteries. Without it, owing to the comparatively small number of artillerymen, I should have been quite unable to man the batteries efficiently, or keep up the heavy fire which, aided by these men, I have happily been able to do.

“A. WILSON, Major-General,

“In expressing the high satisfaction I experienced in observing the zealous performance of duty on the part of the Foot Artillery with the army of Delhi, I consider it incumbent on me to bring to the special notice of Major-General A. Wilson, the officers and men of the 9th Lancers, who were employed in the batteries as artillerymen under my command and observation ; Lieutenants Evans and Blair are deserving of honourable mention for the zealous and cheerful performance of their duties.

“The coolness and bravery of officers and men in situations of extreme danger, whilst engaged in a novel duty, called forth the admiration of all who witnessed it, and especially of those who had the satisfaction of serving with them.

At 2 o'clock, on the morning of the day of assault, all the artillerymen, with the exception of two serjeants, had been withdrawn for other duties, and the guns in the 24-pounder breaching battery were manned by 30 men of the 9th Royal Lancers. Their services were acknowledged by the Assistant Adjutant-General of Artillery in the following letter to myself, a part of which I have the honour to copy :—

“Taking advantage of the darkness, the enemy had, during the night, crowned the breach in the Cashmere curtain with gabions and fascines, which we discovered at daybreak, and, as they would have presented a very serious obstacle to our assaulting parties, it was absolutely necessary to clear them away before the attack took place.

“Through the zeal and intelligence of your men, who worked like trained artillerymen, I was enabled to accomplish this with perfect success, and Sir Archdale Wilson personally thanked them, when he came down to the battery, for the very admirable services they had performed.

A few men of the Carabineers and 10 men of the 9th Lancers also did permanent duty,—the former with Major Tombs' and the latter with Major Turner's troops of Horse Artillery, in which they took their regular tour of all duties, and rendered, by their regular willingness and intelligence, most useful and efficient aid, for which these officers have expressed their thankfulness.

On the 14th of September, the assault on the city of Delhi commenced, in which 600 of the cavalry,—200 of whom were of the 9th Lancers, and the rest Punjaub Irregular Cavalry,—took part. To their lot it fell to cover the attacking columns and our principal batteries from the enemy without the walls of the place, and strongly posted near the Lahoree gate and in the Kishengunge suburb. Nothing could exceed the noble conduct of all, both native and European. In a position whence, from the nature of the ground, they could make no attack, these gallant troops were exposed for two hours to a very severe fire, both of artillery and infantry. In their front, the enemy, flushed with success after having maintained their position at Kishengunge, in face of an attempt to dislodge them by a small column of our troops from the right of camp, moved down and occupied a small village about a hundred yards from the walls, with two 18-pounders, which were in time silenced and spiked by our Horse Artillery ; but, on our right flank, the fire of artillery and musketry from the Kishengunge suburb, which could not be kept down, as also from the Lahoree bastion, which had not fallen into our possession, was most galling. My aide-de-Camp, Captain the Honourable A. Anson, was wounded in the hand, and Captain Prosser, 6th Dragoon Guards, Acting Aide-de-Camp, was dangerously wounded in the hand by a musket ball. The 9th Lancers were in first line supported by the Punjaub Cavalry, and nothing could be finer than the unflinching coolness with which all these gallant soldiers held this trying position. Nothing daunted by the numerous casualties and the certainty that they had only to endure, when I felt it my duty to praise their steady behaviour, they declared their willingness and determination to stand fire as long as need be. The conduct of all—European and native, officers and men—was most admirable. On this occasion, the 9th Lancers were commanded, with great coolness and judgment, by Captain Drysdale, a most

gallant officer, whose name I wish to bring under the favourable notice of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief. The remainder of the cavalry, under command of Captain Anson, 9th Lancers, stopped behind for the protection of the camp, which required the greatest vigilance and attention, and which was successfully performed. Until the final and complete fall of the city of Delhi on the 20th, the cavalry were employed in protecting the camp and covering the road leading therefrom to the Cashmere gate, and on two occasions a force made reconnoissances towards the southern face of the city.

Hodson's Horse was employed in following up the retreat of the enemy from Delhi, and, owing to the activity and keen intelligence of their leader, succeeded in capturing the King of Delhi, who was brought in a prisoner; and, a few days after, three of the King's sons were killed by them near Humayun's tomb. This officer, with his horsemen, was exceedingly useful in beating up the hiding-places of the rebels in the immediate neighbourhood of the city, and rendered most valuable service.

The portion of Her Majesty's Carabineers were shortly detached with the column under Brigadier Showers that operated to the west of the Jumna, and I regret to say I have no means at this time of placing on record the nature of the service they met with. Their previous history warrants me in the belief that they have surely sustained the good name they have so long and deservedly borne.

After the capture of Delhi, a moveable column, under command of Brigadier Greathed, was despatched across the Jumna, and the following corps of cavalry formed part:—Her Majesty's 9th Lancers, commanded by Captain Drysdale, and a squadron each of the 1st Punjaub Cavalry under Lieutenant Watson, 2nd Punjaub Cavalry under Lieutenant Probyn, 5th Punjaub Cavalry under Lieutenant Younghusband, Hodson's Horse under Lieutenant Gough, the whole under command of Major Ouvry, of the 9th Lancers, a most energetic, useful, and brave officer.

The column left Delhi on the 24th of September, and on the 28th encountered the rebels and mutineers at Bolundshubur, where they had taken up a formidable position among the gardens and enclosures of the Civil Cantonment, having the town in their rear. After having been beaten out of their position, the cavalry were ordered to drive them out of the town, and part of the 9th Lancers proceeded down one street, while another portion of the same regiment, under Lieutenant Sarel, supported by Younghusband's Horse, took another road, the remainder of the Punjaub Cavalry moving round outside the town. This hazardous duty for cavalry was ably executed. Captain Drysdale's column pushed its way through, and discovered the enemy reforming outside the town. Preparing to return they were instantly charged and dispersed. In this charge Captain Drysdale's horse was killed, and in falling that officer's collar-bone was broken. Two men of the 9th Lancers—Lance-Corporal Kells and Private Jordan—most gallantly extricated and brought away their Commander. Lieutenant Sarel was also successful, and cleared the portion of the town through which he led his squadrons; but, in the act of running a sepoy through, was shot in the hand and arm, and had one of his fingers blown away. Cornet Thonger was also wounded in the arm slightly. A most gallant feat was here performed by Lieutenant Blair, since exchanged into the 2nd Dragoon Guards, who was ordered to take a party of 1 serjeant and 12

men\* and bring in a deserted ammunition waggon. As his party approached, a body of 50 or 60 of the enemy's horse came down upon him from a village where they had remained unobserved. Without a moment's hesitation, he formed up his men, and regardless of the odds, gallantly led them on, dashing through the rebels. He made good his retreat without losing a man, leaving 9 of them dead upon the field. Of these he killed 4 himself; but, to my deep regret, after running a native officer through the body with his sword, he was severely wounded, the joint of his shoulder being nearly severed. This gallant young officer is, I am thankful, doing well at Meerut, and will, I trust, be shortly restored to the Service in which his early career gives promise of distinction. Serjeant Shaw, of this party, also behaved in the most gallant manner. One of the men, Lance Corporal Andrews, lost his horse from falling with him. The serjeant pulled up between him and the enemy, and enabled him to effect his escape. The serjeant's horse was wounded on the occasion, and, if it had not been for a party of the 1st Punjaub Cavalry, under Lieutenant Watson, coming up at the moment to their support, both these men would undoubtedly have lost their lives. Lieutenant Younghusband's squadron charged a large body, and killed about 80 of the enemy; and the remainder of the Punjaub Cavalry cut up many more outside the town.

On the 6th of October the column again attacked the mutineers and rebels at Allygurrh, and the cavalry, commanded by Major Ouvry, passing round the town, fell in with them in retreat, and cut down about 200.

On the 8th, the Punjaub Corps were sent to a village named Akbarpore, belonging to two notorious rebels, Mungul Sein and Acbar Sein, whom they hoped to surprise. This was so well accomplished, that both these chiefs were killed, and upwards of a hundred of their armed followers, our cavalry having completely surrounded the village ere their approach was known.

On the following morning the column moved to Bidggurrh, about forty-four miles distant from the parade ground at Agra, whence, at the urgent summons of the Chief Commissioner for its immediate march, it proceeded with the utmost rapidity, and reached the station on the 10th, after a long and harassing march. Every thing had been reported quiet there, and, although a strong force of the enemy was believed to be within ten or eleven miles of the place, no apprehension of any immediate attack existed.

The regiments had hardly arrived and taken up the encamping ground on the grand parade, when four men, described as *fakirs*, beating tom-toms, came up to the quarter-guard of the 9th Lancers. The serjeant desired them to go away, but one of the villains drew a tulwar and cut him down, then attacked another serjeant and a corporal, both of whom were wounded; but, the guard then moving out, all were killed. Hardly had this transpired, when Artillery, concealed in the high Bajra Fields, opened from different positions a cross fire upon the few tents pitched, causing some loss. In a moment every soldier stood to his arms. The Artillery from their parks, while their horses were being put to, returned the fire. The cavalry were quickly mounted, and, ere a few minutes had elapsed, the troops were prepared to repel the attack.

The enemy's cavalry, about 300 in number, hoping to find us unprepared, came round by our left flank, and made a rush upon the camp, but were most gallantly met and repulsed by a squadron of the 9th Lancers, led by Captain French. This enabled the artillery and the remainder of the force to prepare to attack the enemy's position; but I grieve to state that this advantage was purchased at the cost of Captain French's life, who fell, mortally wounded, in this charge, and the 9th Lancers lost a brave, daring officer, of ripe judgment, highly valued by the regiment. Lieutenant Jones also, whom I have before mentioned, was severely wounded; he was wounded by a shot, cut down, and afterwards received twenty-two sword cuts in different parts of his body. This young officer had so far through this campaign given evidence of the possession of many high military qualities. Ever foremost in danger, ready to undergo any hardship or fatigue at duty's call, he has exhibited intelligence and judgment on every occasion of his having been employed. He will, I have every hope, be restored to health.

About this period of the action, one of our guns, of which all the drivers and gunners had been wounded, fell into the hands of the enemy; but was recovered by a gallant charge of a squadron of the 9th Lancers, under Lieutenant Wilkinou, detached for this object from the rest of the corps by Captain Anson, who moved in support.

After this our troops being well in hand, moved to an organized attack, and drove off the enemy, capturing their guns in different places, until their camp was reached; whence the enemy, being in full retreat, were pursued by the artillery and cavalry as far as the Kharee Nuddee, ten miles, capturing baggage, the remainder of their guns, killing many, and entirely dispersing the whole force. The Irregular Cavalry made a most dashing charge at a regiment of infantry, drawn up to cover three heavy guns. They drove them away, cut up a number, and took the guns.

Their intended surprise of our troops turned out evidently a surprise to themselves, as they could not have calculated on the presence of Brigadier Greathed's column. Guns, ammunition, stores, and standing camp, all fell into our hands. The victory was complete.

On the 14th the column recrossed the Jumna, and proceeded by the Mynpoorie road towards Cawnpore.

Having been appointed to the command, I was enabled, after some difficulty, accompanied by my Brigade Major, Captain Hamilton, to join the force on the 18th of October.

The column moved on by forced marches, and arrived near Kanouj on the 22nd, when information reached me that a small force of the enemy, with 4 guns, had that morning left the town with the purpose of crossing the Kali Nuddee, about two miles off. I immediately ordered off one squadron 9th Lancers, with Watson's, Probyn's, and Youngusband's squadrons, with 2 guns, the whole under Major Ouvry's command, myself following in support with another squadron of the 9th Lancers and 2 other guns. Major Ouvry came up with them attempting to cross the Nuddee. The enemy opened fire, which was quickly replied to, and silenced, and their guns taken. Major Ouvry had most successfully and with his usual gallantry, attacked them in a position where little resistance could be made. The cavalry after this pursued them to the banks of the Ganges, executing great slaughter among them, and finally driving them into the river, in which several were drowned.

The column pursued its march to Cawnpore, where it arrived on the 26th of October, crossed

the Ganges into Oude, and was engaged at Bante-rah on the 2nd of November. In this skirmish the cavalry and horse artillery endeavoured to come to close combat with the enemy; but they would not stand; a nine-pounder gun was however captured.

His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief shortly after assumed command of the troops in the field, and the career and conduct of the cavalry since have been under his own observation. I must, however, before closing this report, beg permission to bring prominently forward, for his Excellency's consideration, the names of four very gallant young officers, whose acts of bravery may, I trust, be deemed by the Commander-in-Chief such as to merit his recommending the bestowal of the Victoria Cross.

These officers are Lieutenant Blair, 2nd Dragoon Guards, and Lieutenant Jones, 9th Lancers. The particular instances of acts of bravery on their part I have already mentioned. The other two are Captain Probyn, of the 2nd, and Lieutenant Watson, of the 1st Punjaub Cavalry. Captain Probyn has been distinguished for gallantry and daring throughout this campaign. At the battle of Agra, when his squadron charged the rebel infantry, he was some time separated from his men and surrounded by five or six sepoy. He defended himself from the various cuts made at him, and, before his own men joined him, had cut down two of his assailants. At another time, in single combat with a sepoy, he was wounded in the wrist by the bayonet, and his horse also slightly wounded; but, though the sepoy fought desperately, he cut him down. The same day he singled out a standard-bearer, and, in the presence of a number of the enemy, killed him and captured the standard. These are only a few of the gallant deeds of this brave young officer. Skilful in the use of his sword and spear, and an excellent horseman, his active courage and coolness in conflict have borne him safely through many combats.

Lieutenant Watson, on the 14th of November, with his own squadron, and that under Captain (then Lieutenant) Probyn, came upon a body of the rebel cavalry. The ressaldar in command of them—a fine specimen of the Hindustani Mussulman,—and backed up by some half-dozen equally brave men,—rode out to the front. Lieutenant Watson singled out this fine-looking fellow and attacked him. The ressaldar presented his pistol at Lieutenant Watson's breast, at a yard's distance, and fired; but, most providentially, without effect; the ball must, by accident, have previously fallen out. Lieutenant Watson ran the man through with his sword and dismounted him; but the native officer, nothing daunted, drew his tulwar, and with his sowars, renewed his attack upon Lieutenant Watson, who bravely defended himself until his own men joined in the melée and utterly routed the party. In this rencontre, Lieutenant Watson received a blow on the head from a tulwar, another on his left arm which severed his chain gauntlet glove, a tulwar cut on his right arm which fortunately only divided the sleeve of his jacket, but disabled the arm for some time; a bullet also passed through his coat, and he received a blow on his leg which lamed him for some days afterwards. His charger too was grazed by a bullet. On many other occasions, his good sword, wielded by a strong arm, directed by a brave heart and cool head, has laid low many an opponent in fair combat.

Nothing could have exceeded in gallantry and daring the conduct of all the four officers whom I have thus prominently brought to notice.

I beg also to mention the excellent service and assistance I have on all occasions received from

my Brigade Major (now Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General of Division), Captain W. Hamilton, 9th Lancers, throughout the whole campaign. His exertions have been unceasing. He is brave, cool, and collected in action, and at all times unremitting in attention to his duties, from which, in spite of the severity of the hot season and rains upon the constitution of so many, he was never day or night absent when called upon.

My aide-de-camp also, Captain the Honourable A. Anson, I wish to bring particularly to the favourable notice of his Excellency. His conduct has been most praiseworthy throughout the whole campaign. Animated by a most soldier-like spirit, active and intelligent, I have found him a most useful aid, and on all occasions my orders have been delivered with precision; and his own gallantry and bravery have been universally remarked upon. He was wounded at the assault of Delhi by a musket-ball in the hand; but has, I am happy to say, some time since recovered and returned to his duty.

In conclusion, I desire to express my obligation to the officers, non-commissioned officers, and men of both European and native cavalry under my command for their excellent conduct and ready obedience under all circumstances. Their qualities as soldiers have been fully tested by exposure to hardships during all seasons of the year in this trying climate, and by all other vicissitudes of a soldier's career, and in no instance have they failed to fulfil their duty, and deserve my highest commendations.

2. The despatches speak for themselves, and I need not bring to the notice of his Excellency the great gallantry and judgment displayed by Messrs. Hume and Maconochie, or Captain Alexander's nerve in consenting to the attack against such odds.

3. I think Captain Alexander could not have received a letter I sent him, prohibiting an attack on these people; but, as it has turned out, the victory will be most useful, and tend in a great measure to ensure the tranquillity of the Etawah district.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of the Brigadier commanding, that, deeming it advisable to visit my outpost at Bukewar, and also reconnoitre the enemy's position at Anuntram, I proceeded yesterday morning at daylight, with a party of 30 sowars of my regiment, and accompanied by Mr. Hume, Magistrate, and Mr. Maconochie, the Deputy Magistrate of Etawah.

Ordering the picquet of 30 rank and file of my regiment, and 80 sowars of the Etawah Local Horse, stationed at Bukewar, to fall in, we proceeded to Anuntram, distant six miles. We arrived there about half-past 9 A.M., and found about 700

matchlockmen, belonging to different loyal Zemindars, ready to join us.

We moved on at once to the enemy's position, which was about a mile from Anuntram, and found them very strongly posted, stronger than we were led to believe from reports. Their right resting on the Cawnpore road, occupied a large tope of mangoe trees with a wall of six feet all round, and a small ditch in front; their left on a village (Phoolpore), and every grove and field between occupied by them. Their right was the chief position, and looked most formidable, the enclosure swarming with the enemy, and one gun facing down the road towards us.

Having reconnoitred, and having been offered the loan of a gun from Anuntram, we came to the decision of attacking the place. Having shown ourselves to the enemy, it appeared to us that the effect on the country around would be very bad, did we retire without attempting something; so I formed the cavalry into three troops; my own men I took opposite the right rear of the enemy's entrenchment, and within 300 yards; one troop I directed to go to the right, and the third to remain in the centre as a support for the gun, which had by this time come up, and was planted as near as we could judge opposite the enemy's.\*

Mr. Hume having with some difficulty collected about 200 or 300 matchlockmen out of the 700, advanced most gallantly with them towards the entrenchment. The fire of the enemy had been directed towards my troop; but, seeing the advance of our matchlockmen, they turned it towards them. Our gun then opened, advancing nearer at each discharge. About the fifth discharge, our gun was close up to the wall, and, a rush being made, headed in the most gallant manner by Mr. Hume, the enemy began to retreat.

Having already got to their right rear with my troop of 60 men, the time came for us to act. The word 'charge' was given by me, and in a few seconds we were in the midst of them, sweeping round the rear of the entrenchment to the village on the enemy's left. Many of the enemy escaped owing to the great height of cultivation and the villages, where it was impossible for cavalry to follow, and, had the Local Horse acted on the right, when they saw my troop coming round, the victory would have been most complete; but they rendered no assistance at first. However, the enemy were completely routed, their only gun, with a quantity of ammunition, baggage, ponies, matchlocks, swords, &c., captured, and about 125 killed in the field and six hanged. We followed them up for about three miles, and then gave up further pursuit, the enemy dispersing in all directions, and my party of cavalry being too small to detach after them; besides, we had then come about twenty-five miles, and had to return to Etawah the same evening, which we reached about 7 P.M.

The number of the enemy could not certainly have been under 1200 or 1300 men, including a few sowars.

Our casualties were:

Killed—12 matchlockmen.  
Severely wounded—2 sowars. Alexander's Horse.  
Severely wounded—3 horses. Alexander's Horse.  
Slightly wounded—1 horse. Alexander's Horse.  
Slightly wounded—1 sowar of Local Horse.  
Severely wounded—4 horses of Local Horse.  
Wounded—15 matchlockmen.  
Missing—2 horses.

A copy of Mr. Hume's report to Government is enclosed for the Brigadier's information, and shows

the active and gallant part taken by that officer and his matchlockmen.

I now beg to bring to the notice of Brigadier Seatou, C.B., the able assistance I received from Mr. Hume, who gallantly led the assault, and Mr. Maconochie, who accompanied my troop of cavalry throughout the day, and was always to the front.

The conduct of my men was admirable, and many individual acts of gallantry were performed. Some of the sowars of the Local Horse did their duty well, and the conduct of the matchlockmen who went to the assault, after they once got in to the enemy, Mr. Hume reports to have been excellent.

I beg to bring all parties concerned to the favourable notice of the Brigadier commanding, and trust he may deem the affair worthy of being reported to his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief.

I trust the Brigadier will not consider I exceeded my duty in attacking a position I had previously reported as being too strong for the whole of our force. I think, however, Anuntram will be free from Roop Sing and his followers, for some time to come.

The information regarding the enemy's regular troops at Ajeetmul, and mentioned by Mr. Hume, was only brought to-day; and it is fortunate as things have turned out, that we did not know of it yesterday, for we should not have gone out, and this victory would not have been gained.

I HAVE the honor to report that we yesterday obtained a signal success over the enemy near Anuntram

2. At 6 A.M. the 7th of February, Captain Alexander, Mr. Maconochie and myself left Etawah with 30 sowars to visit the picquet at Bukewar, and reconnoitre the enemy's position beyond. At Bukewar, we were joined by the picquet, viz., 30 of Alexander's Horse, and about 80 of the Etawah Local Horse. We then pushed on to Anuntram, a small town on the main Oreyah and Cawnpore road, distant about twenty-one miles from our camp at Etawah. At Anuntram I called out about 700 of the matchlockmen posted there to keep the enemy in check, and, taking a small gun of Rao Juswant Rao's, advanced along the main road. About a mile from Anuntram, we found the enemy posted in several dense mango topes, surrounded by high earth-banks, and occupying the intermediate Urhur and Castor Oil plant fields, in skirmishing order. As we drew near, the enemy concentrated themselves in the two enclosures C and B (see sketch), still keeping, however, some hundreds of men out as skirmishers in the field immediately surrounding their position. As the banks surrounding the enclosure were not less than six feet high from outside as there were no entrances, and the branches of the trees come down to within two feet of the top of the bank, Captain Alexander, finding that his cavalry could not attack them with any reasonable chance of success, halted them at D. After consulting him I posted the Local Horse at E, and then leaving them there with orders to cut up any fugitives, drew the men up in a sort of line at GG, with the gun in the centre.

The enemy by this time had opened a smart fire on us, and Captain Alexander, to whom I reported what I had done, as well as the nature of the position which I had closely inspected from N, desired me to advance with the gun and matchlockmen. Koor Lutchmun Sing and three or four of my own sowars assisting me manfully, I succeeded in bringing up about 350 of the matchlockmen into a position KKK, still keeping the gun in the centre G. Our matchlockmen nevertheless were no cowards; they fought bravely, a little later, hand to hand, but they were new to the system of going straight a-head at our enemy, were immensely outnumbered, and were obliged to advance under a very heavy fire, which, as they could, under the most favourable circumstances, see only the heads of their opponents, they could not return with any effect.

3. By degrees, taking advantage of a number of small ridges intervening between us and the point which I had chosen for the attack, I pushed the men on to within twenty yards of the entrenchment, keeping up, as we advanced, a fire from the Rao's gun in answer to that of the enemy. I then ran the gun up to the little knoll A, which, distant about five yards from the entrenchment, gave me the command of the interior. By this time some 300 or 400 of the enemy ran out of the opposite side of the enclosure in the direction NN, and were promptly pursued by Captain Alexander and his sixty troopers, who cut up a considerable number of them, though not without some casualties, as even single fugitives, almost without exception, turned and fought. The Local Horse did not assist; they had no European officer (I have applied in vain for one), and either would not, or thought they ought not to move without an order to do so. At A we fired one round, and, all the men lining that particular portion of the "moorcha" beginning to run, the matchlockmen made a rush, and to the number of 150 or 200 got in. Just as they did so, the enemy fired their gun in our faces, doing, however, no damage, and then, for the most part throwing away their guns, both parties went at it with swords. In less than a minute the main body of the enemy, some 600 strong, ran out in the direction SSS; a few still stood by the gun. These, in a very short time, were dispersed, and, as I thought, either cut up or driven out; but in this I was mistaken (without uniform it was difficult to distinguish foes from friends), and we had not proceeded fifty yards in pursuit, when we were stopped by shouts from the rear, and found that the enemy had retaken and loaded the gun. We re-took it, however, before they could fire it. Lutchmun Sing and I then pushed on with some half dozen sowars; but the rebels were too far a-head, and we picked up only a few stragglers. Captain Alexander then returned from the pursuit in the direction NN; the Local Horse came up at last, the enemy was pursued some three miles, and a number more accounted for; one and all, however, fighting to the last. Nine prisoners were also taken, of whom six were hanged. I ought to add that the enclosure C was evacuated directly we took the gun.

4. The enemy was certainly not less than 1,200 strong when we advanced from the position K K K, and probably numbered not less than 2,000. They had a few irregular cavalry, and, it is reported, about 50 sepoy; but I saw none of the latter. The former as usual kept well out of range, and ultimately disappeared without showing fight. They lost 125 men killed, their gun (an iron one) and limber, matchlocks, swords, bundles of clothes, burtons, ponies, &c., in fact their whole baggage. Our loss was not severe; 12 matchlockmen were killed, a few (amongst

them the brave leader of the Chowdrayan of Binsea's men, Bhowanee Sing) wounded; 2 of Alexander's men and 3 of his horses; 1 of the local horsemen and 4 of the horses badly wounded, and several other men and horses scratched more or less.

5. The pursuit over, we returned with the captured gun to Etawah, having accomplished the whole affair, including the 50 miles' ride in 12 hours. It may be worth mentioning that the very time we made the attack, Lallpooree Goosaeen, the Nana's Pirohit, with a considerable force of regular mutineers, was at Ajeetmul, scarcely more than 6 miles from the battle field, so that we rather stole a march on him.

6. I having been chiefly with the matchlockmen, my account is necessarily a one-sided one; but it must not be supposed that I wish to ignore the services rendered by the rest of the force. It is true that, owing to the nature of the position, the brunt of the assault fell upon the footmen; but the great loss sustained by the enemy is chiefly owing to the energetic pursuit of Captain Alexander and his horse. About 20 were killed in the entrenchment and within a few yards of it by the matchlockmen; 11 were killed by the small party with me; but the rest were, I believe, to a man cut up by Alexander's Horse; the fugitives, be it remembered, fighting most resolutely, and using swords, spears, and matchlocks, but too successfully.

7. The gallant conduct of Koor Lutchmun Sing, my Deputy Magistrate; of Raheem Buksh, a Duffadar, formerly of the Gwalior Contingent, now of the Etawah Local Horse; and of Bhowanee Sing, the leader of the Binsea men, deserves especial notice.

Sir,

I HAVE the honor to acquaint you, whilst escorting the fleet of 150 boats up the Gogra I received information that the village and fort of Chandepore, on the right bank, were strongly held by the enemy, who intended to resist the progress of the boats. I therefore landed on the 17th instant, at 10 A.M., two miles below, with the force named in the margin,\* to attack the fort and clear away all obstruction. Line being formed by the seamen, with a mountain howitzer in the centre under Lieutenant Turnour, preceded by a strong body of marines and seamen as skirmishers, with supports of Seikhs and other seamen, under Captain Weston, 36th Regiment Native Infantry, and a reserve of Goorkhas, I quickly advanced through the thick cover and high growing crops, passing through the village, found it deserted, but on emerging from it, the skirmishers were received by a heavy fire of musketry and guns from men concealed in rifle pits, in the thick prickly jungle of bambo, which surrounded the fort. Captain Weston gallantly dashed forward, and whilst trying to force in the wicker gate, was badly wounded in the shoulder by a villain, who had just implored mercy, and was carried to the rear. Mr. Ingles, mate, then took charge of the skirmishers, and a good fire was kept up on both sides, our men getting shelter in the village. The gun was quickly pushed up within 100 yards of the entrance, and plied the jungle well with grape; at the same time I ordered Mr. Fowler, in the Jumna steamer, to advance and enfilade the fort with grape, which made it too hot, and the Goorkhas threatening the right flank, the rebels being afraid of their retreat being cut off, fled through the jungle in the rear as we entered in the front, leaving behind them 2 guns, with spare waggon, ammunition, &c., and a quantity of silk dresses, silver-mounted swords, ornaments, money, &c., which evidently belonged to some influential men. The action commenced at 11, and firing ceased at 12.15.

The enemy is supposed to have been about 300, but probably not many killed, as they were perfectly concealed; our casualties were, 4 wounded, 2 severely. I did not attempt to pursue them from the smallness of my force, and the object being perfectly accomplished. Having passed up the fleet, I burnt the fort and adjacent buildings, withdrew the pickets, re-embarked on the steamer, and proceeded up the river, but it being dark without a pilot, we shortly grounded, and remained exposed to the shore till the next morning.

I have now much pleasure in bringing to your notice the cheerful manner of all under my command, and especially I beg to recommend to the consideration of the Commander-in-Chief the gallant conduct of that fine soldier, Captain Weston, whose temporary loss, from his severe wound, every one in the camp most deeply deplores. Lieutenant Burlton, 40th Native Infantry, with his Sikhs, were as usual well forward, and the Goorkhas, under Captain Daveedass Opadeeah, rendered good service. I am also much indebted to Captain Reid, 37th Native Infantry, for his valuable service, who landed as a volunteer from his charge of the boats. Doctors Shore, R.N., and Wilson, Honourable East India Company's

service, were in close attendance with the wounded.

It is nearly impossible to describe the strength of the fort, peculiar to Oude. Surrounded by a thick jungle of prickly bamboo, nearly impassable, with high banks; inside was a line of rifle pits and loop-hole breastworks, with a zig-zag path with gates leading to a second set, and in front of the fort were bastions with a sort of parapet, all loop-holed, as were all the other buildings in the place, all round which was thick cover.

The following officers were also present:—Lord Charles Scott, Mr. Foot, Mr. Stephenson, and Mr. Cooley, Boatswain; and the Jumna steamer, Captain Williamson, was well handled.

## GENERAL ORDERS BY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF INDIA.

No. 256.

*Allahabad, March 9, 1858.*

THE Right Honorable the Governor-General has the gratification of publishing the following report of an action fought on the banks of the Gogra, near the village of Phoolpore, in which the Sarun Field Force, under Colonel Rowcroft, reinforced by the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division of the Nepalese troops, under the command of Maharajah Jung Bahadoor, overthrew and dispersed a rebel force under the guidance of Gholam Hossein, capturing their guns, camp equipage, &c., and securing the passage of the river. In this engagement his Excellency the Maharajah Jung Bahadoor himself laying a gun from one of his own batteries, blew up one of the enemy's tumbrils.

To Colonel Rowcroft, commanding the Sarun Field Force, to Brigadier Junga Doje, commanding the Goorkha Brigade, and to all the officers and men under them, the Right Honorable the Governor-General offers his cordial acknowledgments of their gallant exertions on this occasion.

SIR, (No. 178.)

I HAVE the honor to enclose, for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor-General in Council, the report of an action fought about two miles in front of the village of Phoolpore, between the Sarun Field Force, under Colonel Rowcroft, reinforced by the 2nd Brigade of the 1st Division of the Nepalese Army, and the enemy, under command of Gholam Hossein, son of Mahomed Hossein.

2. The enemy, about 2,000 strong, with some cavalry and 5 guns, occupied a position on the right bank of the river, with their left resting on it. Colonel Rowcroft marched to attack them, and after an action of an hour, the details of which are given in his own despatch, the enemy was completely defeated and driven from the field, with the loss of three of his five guns, camp equipage, &c.

3. Colonel Rowcroft's attack was materially aided by the fire of a battery which was disposed on the left bank of the river by his Excellency Maharajah Jung Bahadoor in person, who rode down to the bank on hearing the firing, and observing that the position of the battery enfladed the left of the enemy's position, he immediately ordered it to open fire. The fire was most effective. It silenced the enemy in that part of the line before the action ceased on the right, and a shot from a gun laid by his Excellency himself, blew up one of the rebel's tumbrils.

4. In conclusion, it is my pleasing duty to bring to the notice of his Lordship in Council, the names of the officers who distinguished themselves in this gallant, and, as affecting the crossing the river, very important action.

5. Brigadier Junga Doje, commanding the 2nd Goorkha Brigade, Colonel Turke Khan, commanding Sereenath Regiment, Colonel Shreekiassna Sohae, commanding Lungenath Regiment, Major-Captain Sreebukht Kunka, commanding Ramdul

Regiment, zealously exerted themselves in the field and did good service. Colonel Lall Sing, commanding the battery on the left bank of the river, Major-Captain Soojin Sing, commanding Goorkha Artillery, with the 2nd Brigade, and Lieutenant Tuckman Jasse, in charge of a half battery, all distinguished themselves by their zeal and precision of fire. To all these officers and the whole Goorkha troops engaged, my best acknowledgments are due.

6. I beg to bring prominently to the notice of his Lordship in Council, the services of Colonel Rowcroft, commanding the Sarun Field Force. The skilful dispositions which he made, and the admirable manner in which he carried them out, left nothing to be desired. His complete success secured the passage of the river.

7. To Captain Sotheby and Lieutenant Turnour, R.N., the Hon. V. A. Montague, Acting Aide-de-Camp to Colonel Rowcroft, Lieutenant Pyne, commanding Royal Marines, and all the officers and men of the Naval Brigade, my best thanks are due for their zeal and bravery.

8. Captain Morgan, Field Force Staff, is most honorably mentioned by Colonel Rowcroft and Lieutenant Burlton, commanding detachment of Sikhs; to both these officers my acknowledgments are due.

9. Captain Brooks, attached to the Ramdull Regiment greatly distinguished himself. This officer's leading of the attack on the left attracted the particular notice of his Excellency the Maharajah, who personally mentioned it to me.

10. Lieutenant Sankey, Engineers, was on the field, and made himself useful, carrying orders for Colonel Rowcroft.

11. The officers attached to Brigadier Doje's Brigade, Captain Montgomery and Lieutenants Francis and Gibb, are also honorably mentioned.

SIR, (No. 172.)

I HAVE the honor to report to you, for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor-General and his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the following movements and operations of the Field force under my command.

2. Late on the evening of the 18th instant, it was decided not to give up the preparations for crossing the River Gogra at Chupra Ghat, with the whole Field force then under my orders, my force having been reinforced by the 2nd Brigade of three regiments and six guns, of the 1st Division of Nepalese troops, as likely to cause much delay in the upward progress of the fleet of boats. The necessary orders were issued for the fleet of boats, under charge of Captain Reed, with escort, as formerly, of a detachment of the Naval Brigade and Sikhs Detachment, with the addition of two companies of the Ramdull Goorkha Regiment, and two 12-pounder howitzers, under the command of Captain Sotheby, R.A., of Her Majesty's steam frigate Pearl, to continue progress next morning. I ordered two companies and three guns of the 2nd Brigade to march early the next morning up the bank of the river about three miles, to cover and protect the fleet of boats and steamer

Jumna while passing the fort of Chihora, on the right bank of the river, reported to be occupied by the enemy. I marched the next morning at 9 o'clock with the remainder of the Naval Brigade, and four Goorkha Regiments with Artillery for the village and fort of Nourainee, to cover and protect the fleet of boats and steamer at that point. After a nine hours' march of 20 miles, arrived on the left bank of the river opposite Nourainee at 5½ P.M., the latter part of the march being through very heavy deep sand, at the same time with the leading boats. I wrote to Captain Sotheby on the steamer, then a little lower down the river, to move up and prepare for disembarking the detachment of Naval Brigade, to cross the river that night at 10 o'clock, the Naval Brigade and 2 12-pound howitzers, under the command of Captain Sotheby, R.N. Five companies of Ramdull Goorkha Regiments and detachments of Sikhs embarked in boats, and we crossed the river to right bank, the Naval Brigade men having to pull the guns through a long deep sand assisted by some Goorkhas of the Ramdull Regiment, and about 12 o'clock we had seized and occupied the village and fort of Nourainee, finding it evacuated by the enemy. We remained close to the village and fort in bivouac till morning. Captain Reid and Lieutenant Sankey accompanied the troops.

3. That same day, the 20th instant, prepared to move to attack the enemy reported to be encamped near Phoolpore, about six miles distant, on right bank. Every exertion was made by Captain Sotheby, officers, and men of the Naval Brigade to ferry over spare ammunition, &c. Captain Montgomery, in military charge of 2nd Brigade, under command of Brigadier Junga Doje, and with the Goorkha officers, exerted themselves to cross their men and guns, not having arrived the night before. About 10 o'clock P.M., 20th instant, I marched with the force as per margin,\* after a march of some six miles through fields and heavy cultivation and woods, found the enemy in position in a wood on the banks of the river, beyond Phoolpore. Gholam Hossein, son of the Nazim Mahomet Hossein, being the chief officer present, with Ali Hyder, in immediate command, were in position near and in a wood, with some broken ground in their front, and their left on the river. The enemy then kept up a sharp cannonade for nearly an hour, which was briskly replied to by the Naval Brigade Artillery, under charge of Lieutenant Turnour, R.N., a most zealous, active officer, and most actively and zealously superintended by Captain Sotheby, commanding the Naval Brigade, of the Pearl, whose fire was most effective. Lieutenant Pym, R.N., in charge of the Royal Marines of Her Majesty's steam frigate Pearl, skirmished to the front, doing excellent service with their rifles, pressing forward most gallantly, capturing one gun, turning it on the enemy and firing nine rounds of grape, also capturing a second gun, aided by a few Seikhs and Goorkhas, a third gun being captured by the Goorkhas. The Goorkha skirmishers I had ordered out early on the right flank having pressed on rapidly into action. Lieutenant Pym, R.N., brings to notice the gallant bearing of Acting Sergeant Francis Butler, of the Woolwich Division, during the action, who rendered him great assistance; also the admirable conduct of all the Marines. The Goorkha Artillery in the centre, and on the right flank, by a flank movement I made to the left were somewhat thrown to the right rear, but rapidly pushed into action through a village and heavy cultivation, opening their guns

with effect upon the enemy. In about an hour the enemy gave way, and were speedily in full retreat, defeated and routed with the loss of three of their five guns and a portion of their camp equipment. The enemy were reported to be 2000 strong, including 200 sepoy, a few hundred cavalry, and five guns in the field; some having gone off earlier in the day with their heavy baggage. Being nearly dark when the action ceased, and the cultivation very heavy, it was impossible to ascertain the number of the enemy killed, but many were found afterwards in the different fields; and the enemy are reported to have carried away a number of their wounded,—their commandant, Ali Hyder, being severely wounded in the thigh. Our casualty list, I am happy to say, is very light. The action ceased a little earlier on the right by the river; the Naval Column and guns and part of Ramdull Regiment pursued the enemy till nearly dark. We then moved to our right rear, to rejoin the other portion of the force; one hour more of daylight would have given us greater success.

4. Captain Brooks, in military charge of the Ramdull Regiment, zealously exerted himself during the action; Captain Montgomery, in military charge of 2nd brigade of Goorkhas, and Lieutenant Francis, attached to the Junganath Regiment, greatly exerted themselves. Captain Morgan, my field force staff, was most zealous in giving his services wherever required. Lieutenant Burlton, in charge of the detachment of Seikhs, was most useful and active, and skirmishing to the front with his active, ready men. The Honourable P. A. Montague, R.N., my Acting Aide-de-Camp, was active and zealous, carrying orders; and Lieutenant Sankey, of Engineers, afforded me every assistance, and in passing orders in the field.

5. Brigadier Junga Doje, commanding 2nd Goorkha Brigade, Colonel Turke Khan, commanding Junganath Regiment, Major Captain Suree Vakht Kanka, commanding Ramdull Regiment, zealously exerted themselves in the field. First Lieutenant Gibb, Bengal Artillery, attached to the Goorkha Artillery, was very active and zealous in affording every assistance to bring the guns rapidly into action, and he reports Major Captain Loogin Singh, commanding Goorkha Artillery, and Lieutenant Inckman Jaisee, in charge of a half battery, evinced much zeal during the action, the latter forcing his guns through a village and difficult to bring them into action.

6. A battery of six guns, placed on the left bank of the river by his Highness Jung Bahadoor, did excellent service under the orders of his Excellency, playing on the left flank of the enemy, and one shot breaking up one of their tumbrils.

7. Drs. Stone and Dickinson, Naval Brigade, Drs. Morton and Playfair, attached to the 2nd Brigade of Goorkhas, and Dr. Wilson, attached to the Ramdull Regiment, were present and active in the field and ready for any emergency. The Naval Chaplain the Rev. Mr. Williams, was present in the field.

8. I shall esteem it a favour if you will bring to the favourable notice of the Right Honorable the Governor-General and his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the officers and troops mentioned, and engaged in the action and operations reported in the despatch, attended with such complete results and the attainment of the urgent object you had in view, the safe and easy construction of a bridge of boats over the Gogra at Phoolpore, for the passage of the troops under the command of his Highness Maharajah Jung Bahadoor, into Oude.
