

Bishop of Chester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

“Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Benedict Arthure, Incumbent of Saint Catherine’s church, in the said township and chapelry district of Tranmere, in the said parish of Bebington, shall continue to be such incumbent, all the fees which shall be payable in respect of the performance of the said offices in the said church of Saint Paul, Tranmere aforesaid, shall be paid by the incumbent thereof to the said Benedict Arthure.

“We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet.”

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“All that part of the township and chapelry district of Tranmere, in the parish of Bebington, in the county and diocese of Chester, which is situate to the south of an imaginary line extending from the western boundary of such township along the middle of a lane, called Prenton-lane, in an easterly direction, and also along the middle of Well-lane, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the southern end of the fence which divides the close, numbered 406 on the Tithe Commutation Map of the parish of Bebington, and on the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 407 on the same maps, and extending thence northward and eastward along the middle of such fence, and alternately eastward and northward along the middle of the fences dividing the closes, numbered respectively 436 and 441, on the said maps, from the closes, numbered respectively 407, 437, 440, and 442, on the same maps, to the middle of the road leading from the church of the district of Saint Paul aforesaid, to Tranmere Ferry, and extending thence northward along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a point opposite to the western end of the fence dividing the close, numbered 214 on the said maps, from the close numbered 326 on such maps, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such last-mentioned fence to the middle of the Birkenhead, Lancashire, and Cheshire Junction Railway, and extending thence southward along the middle of such railway as far as a point marked A on the said map hereunto annexed, in the centre of the bridge which carries such railway over a road or lane running between certain premises, known as Birkenhead-buildings, and certain other premises, known as Liverpool-buildings, and extending thence along the middle of the last-mentioned lane, and across the road leading from Rock Ferry to Tranmere Ferry aforesaid, and along the middle of the fence dividing the close, numbered 259 on the said maps, from the close, numbered 263 thereon, to the River Mersey.”

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate at

Tranmere, in the township and chapelry district of Tranmere, in the parish of Bebington, in the county of Lancaster, to be called “The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Tranmere,” be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, section sixteen, of an Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine, section three, and of an Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the eleventh day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, section sixteen, of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine, section three, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate in the Westminster Road, in the parish of Saint George the Martyr, Southwark, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester.

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul, situate in the Westminster Road aforesaid:

“Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint George the Martyr, Southwark, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Southwark.’
