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Madrid, Jan. 30.

THE Count de *Humanex*, President of the Council de la *Hazienda*, dyed here yesterday, having been sick three or four days. We have an account of the death of *Don Antonio Pan y Agua*, Governor General of *Oran*, and the Coasts of *Africa*. The Marquis de *Villa Mayna*, Master of the Horse to the Queen, is likewise dead. The Count de *Melgar*, late Governor of *Milan*, has obtained his Liberty, but has not yet Leave to come to Court. We had an account by an Express which arrived here the last week from *Flanders*, that the matter of the Limits on the side of *Namur* had been adjusted by the Commissioners of the Two Crowns in their Conference at *Philisville*. The Marquis de *Valera* has caused the Body of his Brother the Duke de *Vejar*, who was killed in the Siege of *Buda*, to be brought hither, in order to be buried among his Ancestors. The Count de *Villar Mayor*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *Portugal* to the Elector Palatin, has been obliged to make some stay at *Vitoria*, by reason of the abundance of Snow that has fallen in those Quarters.

Genoua, Jan. 28. The last week sailed from hence the Count de *Sturum* with the Ships under his Command for *Legborne*, from whence, it's said he has Orders to return to *Holland*. We understand by the Vessels that come from the *Levant*, that the *Turks* make their utmost Efforts to have a numerous Army in *Hungary* the next Summer.

Turin, Febr. 2. The Duke of *Savoy* parted from hence the 20th of the last month for *Venice*, being attended by the Counts de la *Rouere*, de la *Trinité*, and de *Prela*, and the Marquis de *Beuil*, with several other Officers of his House. The Marquis d'Arfy Ambassador of *France*, is likewise gone to *Venice*.

Milan, Febr. 4. The 31st past, the Duke of *Savoy* arrived here *Incognito*, accompanied only with six or seven Persons; He went directly to the House of Count *Porro* his Resident, and having seen what was most curious in this City, his R. H. parted from hence yesterday for *Venice*, to pass the rest of the Carnival there.

Venice, Febr. 1. The Elector of *Bavaria*, the Duke of *Mantua*, and several other Princes are come hither to see the Divertements of the Carnival; And though the first is *Incognito*, the Doge has not omitted to appoint four Noble *Venetians* to accompany his Electoral Highness during his stay in this City. The Prince of *Lubomirsky* who arrived here the last week, had, the 28th past, Audience of the Doge; He will part from hence in few days for *Rome*. The Marquis de *Corbons* is arrived from the *Levant*, to raise Recruits for his Regiment of Dragoons now in the *Morea*. The Prince of *Bareit* of the House of *Brandenburgh*, has made a Treaty with the Republick for 2000 Men, which he has undertaken to raise against the next Campagne. Prince *John of Waldeck* has likewise made an Agreement with the Senate for 1000 Foot. The last Ships that arrived here from the *Morea*, had on Board 53 pieces of brass Cannon taken from the *Turks*, which are to be new cast. Captain General *Morogini* continued, according to our freshest Advices from those Parts, at *Napoli di Romania*; And the Serasquier of the *Morea* at *Corinthe*. The Bassa of *Napoli di Romania* and his Brother are still here.

Legborne, Febr. 3. This week arrived here a Merchant Ship from *Smirna*, by which we have advice, that the Grand Signior had received an account by the Expresses dispatched by the Grand Visier from *Belgrade*, that the Overtures he had made in order to a Peace, had been rejected by the *Imperialists*, who even refused to grant a Passport for the Ambassador he had proposed to send to *Vienna*; That this News had very much disturbed him, and made him resolve to remove to *Adrianople*, tearing it would occasion some new disorder at *Constantinople*, where the People were kept in their Duty, by nothing more than the hopes they had of a Peace; And that to satisfy them the Grand Signior had again declared, that he will command in Person his Army in *Hungary* the next Campagne. By another Vessel arrived from *Alexandria*, we are informed that they left in that Port four great Ships ready to sail for *Constantinople*, on which were embarked the new Levies that had been made in those Parts, and some Ammunition and Provisions.

Lemberg, Jan. 18. The Ambassadors of *Moscovy* had the 13th Instant their Audience of Leave of the King and Queen, to which they were conducted

ducted with the same Ceremonies that were observed at their first Publick Audience; and they are now preparing for their departure, being extremely satisfied with the Honours they have received at this Court. In the last Conference that was held with these Ambassadors, it was among other things agreed, that in case the Cham of *Tartary* does the next Campaigne join any considerable number of his Troops with those of the Grand Signior, the Czars of *Moscovy* will likewise join a good Body of their Troops with the Forces of this Crown; And that during the whole course of this War, the Forces on both sides shall act according to such measures, as shall be concerted between the Allies, for the greatest advantage of the common Interests. The Emperor's Minister at this Court has been several times present in the Council of War, which meets almost every day to direct the Preparations for the next Campaigne, as well as to consult about the designs of it. His Majesty has resolved to send the Bishop of *Primilia* with the Character of his Ambassador to *Vienna*; And has named several other Persons to go in the Quality of his Envoys to divers Courts of Christendom, to demand assistance against the *Turks*. The Envoy from the Cham of *Tartary* has been dispatched with an Answer, that shews the firm Resolution of this Court not to separate from its Allies. The 11th Instant, was performed the Ceremony of giving the Cap to Cardinal *Pallavicini* the Pope's Nuncio at this Court, which had been brought from *Rome* by the Marquis *Cisfani*: But the King was not present at the Solemnity. The Court will remove the next week to *Zolkiew*.

Warsaw, Jan 29 The *Moscovite* Ambassadors having adjusted all matters with the Ministers of this Crown, parted from *Lemberg* the 21st of this month, having sent their Secretary before to *Vienna*, to prepare things against their arrival there; It was said, that having finished their Commission at the Emperor's Court, they would go from thence to *Venice*, but now we are told otherwise, and that they will negotiate the matters they are charged with in relation to that Republick, with the *Venetian* Ambassador at *Vienna*. The King of *Poland* has named the Sieur *Grinsky* Palatin of *Braclaw*, to go his Envoy to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to demand Succors against the *Turks*, and is likewise sending to other Courts for the same purpose. His Majesty has declared that he will command his Forces in Person the next Campaigne, and that he will be in the Field before the end of *May*; He has given out several Commissions for new Levies as well of Horse as Foot, and great care is taken to provide Magazines in all the Frontier places for the subsistence of the Army.

Cologne, Febr. 11. The last advices from *Hungary* tell us, That Count *Teckelej*, who continued at *Temeswar*, had received 30 thousand Crowns from the Grand Visier, and that with the help of this Money, he had raised some *Hungarian* Troops, part of which he had sent to reinforce the Garrison of *Mongatz*. That they had an account by Letters of the 10th of *December* from *Constantinople*, That the Plague continued to rage there very violently; That the scarcity of Provisions increased daily; And that all things were there in great disorder; That Preparations were making for the Grand Signior's removal to *Adrianople*, from whence, 'twas given out, he would go in the month of *April* to *Bekrude*, to put himself at the head of his Army. That the Cham of *Tartary* had by his

Envoys, made very pressing Instances at the *Port* to be paid the Subsidies that had been promised him, declaring he should not otherwise be able to send the Succors to the *Ottoman* Army, that might be expected from him; But that however, there had been only sent him 50 thousand Pistres, the rest being made up in Jewels, Sabres set with pretious Stones, and rich Furniture for Horses, which had been taken out of the Grand Signior's Treasury. And that some Money and Presents had been likewise sent to the chief of the Militia, and the Divans of *Barbary*, to engage them to send their Ships to the *Levant* to join the *Ottoman* Fleet the next Summer.

Hamburg, Febr. 11. Yesterday Sentence was pronounced against the prisoner *Vander Lind*, by which he is Condemned to pay 2000 Crowns, and to be a prisoner four years. The Letters from *Poland*, tell us, That the *Moscovite* Ambassadors were on their Journey to *Vienna*. That great preparations are making in that Kingdom for the next Campaigne. And that Cardinal *Pallavicini* the Pope's Nuncio, had promised to provide Magazines of Provisions for the subsistence of the Forces.

Paris, Febr. 22. The Marquis de *Bernay*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoy* to compliment the King upon his Recovery, had the 19th Instant his Audiences of Leave. Yesterday the Cardinal *Ranuzzi*, the Pope's Nuncio, had a private Audience of his M. C. Majesty. The Duke de *Gefures* has taken possession of his Government of this City. There has lately hapned a Fire at *Rochelle*, which, besides the other mischief it did, burnt down the chief Church of that City. We had two days ago an account of the death of the Archbishop of *Teurs*.

Whitehall, Febr. 15. This day the Parliament met at *Westminster*, and was farther Prorogued to the 28th of *April* next.
