Venice, Febr. 8. HIS City is filled with Princes, and other persons of the chiefest rank, that are come hither to partake of the divertifements of the Carnaval. In our former we gave you an account of the arrival of the Elector of Bavari , the Duke of Mantua, the Prince of Bareit of the House of Brandenborg, the Prince of Savoy Soiffons, &c. To which we must now add, that the Duke of Savey arrived here the 6th instant Incognito under the Name of the Count de Tereda, accompanied with five or fix per-fons of quality. We have advice by a Vessel arrived here in 21 days from Nipoli di Romania, that the Seraskier of the Morea, having left a small body of Men for the guard of the Issums of Corineh, or the neck of Land that separates the Golf of Lepanto from that of Engia, was marched with the rest of his Troops towards Patras to reinforce the Garisons of that place and of Lepanco: And that the new Fortifications that are making at Napoli di Romania and on the Hill Palamida are almost brought to perfe-Etion.

Genova, Febr. 8. This week arrived here the Swan from England, and a Dutch Convoy from Holland and Spain, and another from Smirna bound home.

Lemburgh, January 25. The Mejcovite Ambaf-ladors parted from hence the 22d Initant, accom-panied by the Commissioners appointed by the King to conduct them to the Frontiers of Silelia, where they will be received by the Imperial Officers, who have been there some time expecting them. are affored, that the Expence which this Court has been at in defraying these Ambassadors, during their flay here, amounts to above 200000 Florins. Since their departure, the Council of War has been several times assembled in the King's presence, to consult of the means to prosecute the War with all the advantage, which we may promise our selves from the ill posture the Assairs of the Insidels are in. And we have no reason to doubt, it the Moscov. tes perform what they have promifed, but that the Forses of this Crown will make confiderable Progresses the next Campagne. The Levies that are making in this Kingdom, advance in the mean time with good fucces; And the other Preparations are carried on with the fame diligence; The Popes Nuncio has undertaken to provide Magazines of Provisions for the Army; And the King has declared, that be will be in the Field as early as the Imperia-His Majesty has sent Circular Letters to all the Palatinates, to acquaint them with the Reasons that have obliged him to put off the meeting of the Dyet till the next year: The Turks Itaving provided a great Convoy of Provisions in Maldavia; a Body of Tattars was ordered to conduct it to Ca-

m niec, but in their march between that place and Checzin, they were met by the Coffacks commanded by General Mobila, who defeated the Enemy, and took 200 Wagons Laden with Provisions. Some other Conyoys have had the good Fortune to get into Caminiec, but the Relief the Garifon received by them; was so inconsiderable, that we are assured they do however want many things necessary for their Subsistence, and that they stood in great

need of this last Convoy.

Vienna, Febr. 6. The Preparations for the Campagne are carried on with extraordinary Application; And we are affured, that the Emperor will have 60000 Men of his own Troops in the Field the next Summer, without reckoning the Hungarians; Bavarians, and other Auxiliary Forces. They write from Upper Hungary, that a Party of Turks and Tartars commanded by Teckeley, had made an Incursion towards Segedin, and burnt several Villages, for that the Inhabitants had surnished that Garison with Provisions; But that the Encmy in their return, were met and idefeated by a Party of Imperialifts, Teckeley being himself wounded. The Rebels of Mongatz have made another Sally, but were repulsed with the loss of 50 of their Company kill'd, and 6 taken Prisoners. The Letters from Buda of the 27 past tell us, that the Regiment of Lodron with a Party of Huffars commanded by the Count de Ricardi, marched from thence two days before towards Alba Regalis, to keep that Garison from giving any disturbance to the Convoy that was going from Sciria to Five Charches. The advices from the Ottoman Territories say, that the Grand Visier was gope to Adrianople, to be present at a great Council of War that was to be held there in the Grand Signior's presence; And that the Turks were drawing all the Force they could towards Hungary, where, as they give out, they will have a very numerous Army the next Campagne. The Letter which the Grand Visier writ some time ago to Prince Herman of Baden, President of the Council of War, was to this effect: That the Breach of the Peace between the two Empires, had been occasioned by those who had then the Conduct of Affairs; And that they had been punished; That to put an End to the Calamities of the War, he came to Belgrade the last Summer to Negotiate a Peace; But that he then understood, that the Imperial Army was before Buda. That he now writ to him (the Prince of Baden) to know whether they were here in a Disposition to treat, that he might give an account thereof to the Grand Signior, and that a place might be cholen for the Negotiation, prote-Sting, That if the Imperial Court rejected so reasohable a Proposition, they would be answerable for all the effusion of Blood, and the ruine of the Peo-ple that should follow. The Prince of Baden aufwered,

fwered. That the Emperor had not to do with private Persons, but with the Port, which had broken the Treaties, in protecting the Hungarian Rebels, taking feveral places, and exercising great Cruelties upon his Imperial Majesties Subjects, even before the Declaration of the War; That the Emperor had been obliged to enter into a League with the King of Poland, and the Republick of Venice; That the Punishment of some particular Persons was not a sufficient Satisfaction for so unjust a War; But that the Port ought to make the Emperor Reparation for the Damages his Subjects had fulfained, and for the Expences of the War, and fatisfie his Allies. That his Imperial Majesty was very desirous of Peace, which he had always religiously observed, and should not refuse to enter upon a Treaty, in cate the Emt proposed reasonable Conditions upon which a firm Peace might be established; That his Imperial Maietty had otherwise reason to believe they visit not fincerely intend it, especially feeing they contimued to shelter and protect Teckeley, the chief of the Hobelst

Our Governor-General returned hither yesterday from Antwerp; He intends to go the next week to Ghaunt, and afterwards to Numur: The last Letters from Vienna told us, that they had advice from Hungary, that Teckeley, who had made an Incursion into the Imperial Quarters on the side of Segedin, had been met and beaten by a Party of that Garison; and himself wounded; And that the Turks of Sigeth and Canifa having drawn together a Body of Hörse and Foot to sittercept the Convoy that was marching from Sigria to Five Charches, the Imperialists, upon notice of it, had sallen upon them, killed 200, taken 40, and put-the rest to slight.
