



swered, That the Emperor had not to do with private Persons, but with the *Port*, which had broken the Treaties, in protecting the *Hungarian* Rebels, taking several places, and exercising great Cruelties upon his Imperial Majesty's Subjects, even before the Declaration of the War; That the Emperor had been obliged to enter into a League with the King of *Poland*, and the Republick of *Venice*; That the Punishment of some particular Persons was not a sufficient Satisfaction for so unjust a War; But that the *Port* ought to make the Emperor Reparation for the Damages his Subjects had sustained, and for the Expences of the War, and satisfy his Allies. That his Imperial Majesty was very desirous of Peace, which he had always religiously observed, and should not refuse to enter upon a Treaty, in case the *Port* proposed reasonable Conditions upon which a firm Peace might be established; That his Imperial Majesty had otherwise reason to believe they did not sincerely intend it, especially seeing they continued to shelter and protect *Teckelej*, the chief of the Rebels.

*Vienna*, Febr. 9. The Advices from *Hungary* confirm the News we had by our former Letters, that *Teckelej*, who had burnt several Villages on the side of *Segedin*, and committed great Cruelties upon the Inhabitants, had been wounded in his Thigh and Knee, in a Rencontre he had with a Party of that Garrison who were sent out to fight him; in which they succeeded so well, that they put the Rebels and the *Turks* that were with them to flight. The Rebels of *Montatz* continue likewise their Incursions, and to burn the Villages round that place; but in the last they made, they were met by a Party of Dragoons of the Regiment of *Magni*, and were beaten back, 50 of them being killed, and many wounded, and this with the loss only of 6 Men on the side of the *Imperialists*. We have an account from *Electer Hungary*, that the *Turks* having sent Detachments from *Sygeth* and *Canisa*, to attack the Imperial Convoy that was going to *St. Charles*, they had been defeated by the Troops that conducted the said Convoy, under the Command of Colonel *Macari*, 200 of the Enemy being killed upon the place, and 40 taken Prisoners. The Preparations are continued for the Bombarding of *Anzin*.

*Hamburg*, Febr. 15. They write from *Berlin*, that the *Electer of Brandenburg* is going to raise four new Regiments; And we are told from *Dresden*, that the *Electer of Saxony* has likewise resolved to make some new Levies.

*Brussels*, Febr. 25. Our Governour-General returned hither yesterday from *Antwerp*; He intends to go the next week to *Ghaunt*, and afterwards to *Namur*. The last Letters from *Vienna* told us, that they had advice from *Hungary*, that *Teckelej*, who had made an Incursion into the Imperial Quarters on the side of *Segedin*, had been met and beaten by a Party of that Garrison, and himself wounded; And that the *Turks* of *Sygeth* and *Canisa* having drawn together a Body of Horse and Foot, to intercept the Convoy that was marching from *Siria* to *Fiv Churches*, the *Imperialists*, upon notice of it, had fallen upon them, killed 200, taken 40, and put the rest to flight.

*Hague*, Febr. 22. The Deputies of the States of *Holland* and those of the *African* Company of that Country, continue their Conferences with the *Brandenburg* Ministers for the adjusting the Differences depending between the said Company and the Electors of the Electoral Highness. Eight Men of War are fitting out, 3 by *Amsterdam*, 2 by *Rotterdam*, and one by *North Holland*, to be employed in the *Mediterranean* against the *Algerines*. The Ma-

rchal de *Schomberg* will part from hence in few days for *Germany*.

*Hague*, Febr. 25. The Marquis *Alberville* Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain*, had yesterday his publick Audience of the *States-General*, being attended by all the *English* Gentlemen that were here; He had a Train of above 30 Coaches, his own as likewise his Liveries were very proper and noble, and the Ceremony was performed with a great deal of Splendor; after which, he entertained at Dinner the States Deputies, with divers other Persons of Quality.

*Paris*, Febr. 26. The Cardinal Nuncio had on Friday last a long Audience of the King. The same day arrived here an Extraordinary Courier from *Rome*. There are 28 Battalions appointed to work the next Summer on the River *Eure*.

*Whitehall*, Febr. 18. His Majesty was this day Graciously pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon *Charles Cottrell* Esq; Master of the Ceremonies, and at the same time to put about his Neck a Gold Chain and Medal, the mark of his Office.
