An Oferna man of war which pet in here on Sunday left with a French Prize, is here atrefted upon the account of leveral Merchants, for haveing ungluely feifed and lept away a fhip laden with Goods taken in upon their accounts.

Weymouth, Dec. 18. By a veilel of this place arriving on Wedne (day laft from Bourdeaux, we are too much aflured of the loss of a ship belonging to this Port, which unhappily foundred near St. Marrins, the ship lost but her men prefetved, and some part of her lading brought to land. Vienna, Dec. 18. The Principal Office's of the Army are again commanded by His Imperial Majefty to render themfelves in this City the 29th of this month, to confult about the Military affairs of the Empire.

The Marquils de Guitry, Ambaliador in Extraordinary from His Most Christian Majesty, will in few dates depart from hence, intending (as 'tis faid) to conferre with the Electors of Saxony and Brandenburg.

- To morrow we expect a folemn Proceffion, in order to the Confectation of a Columne and a Statue, which are to be crefted in Hon ur of the immaculate Conception of the Bleffed Virbin, at which Ceremony their Impecial Maj:lies intend to be prefert.

Letters bearing date the beginning of Oftober laft from Conftastinople informus, that the G and Seignior had fome months fince a defigne to have (with the usual policy of the Empire,) focured himfelf in his Throne by the death of his two Brochers, and wene twice in perfon into their Quarters with intention to have them flrangled, but the old Sultapefs his Mother, by her prefence and Mediation, diverted him, having for their better fecurity fet a good Guard upon them for their defence, in cafe any violence th uld have been offered, but the Grand Seignior being angry at the intended opposition, had fent his Mother a Sherberte, which the fulfpectings gave to one of her Slaves, who within a quarter of an hour after the taking of it, fell slown dead.

The fame Letters affirm, that the Grand Vilier bad in the name of himfelfs and the reft of the Principal Officers, fent a Petition to the Sultan, humbly defiring him by fils Prefence at Conffantingples to give encouragement to the fupplies, intended for his affiftance, and that he would endeavour againft the next Spring, to make the greatest Naval. Provisions he was able, that he might be in a condition to keep the Seas againft the Venetians, and confequently with more promiling fuccels, purfue the Siege of Candia 3 but this gldrefs found not that welcome which the Vilier expected 5 the Sultan immediately tearing it in pieres, and ordering, preparations for a hunting journey to Philippopolic.

Hamburg, Dec. 235 The Swedes General, the tield Heer Wrang'e continues still here, and in few days expects the arrival of the Count de Coningsmark, who is on his way from Stockholm, upon whole conference fornewith may be guessed of the Swedes refolution for the employment of their forces, which are at yer continued in the r bid Quarters in the Dutchy of Bremen. From Lordin we are inform'd, that the Levies made by that Duke, are carried on with all the vigor imaginable, and that feveral thousands of Horfe and Foor are aiready railed upon his own expenses, which gives no imall scalouse to the French Court.

From Wasfaw we are told that the Tattars are hashily retreating by the way of Ukrania into their own Countrey, being warmly ellarum'd at the invation or the Kalmucka who in the behalf of their late deposed Cham, have made a confiderable progress into their Countrey, and will require their utmost vigor to repel them.

They tell us farther that his Majefty of Poland feems willing to leave the City of Thorns to the enjoyment of their Ancient Rights and Liberties, without dimunition of any of their Priviledges, on condition that the Town shall admit what Garrifon his Majefty shall pleafe to put into its That the Protestants fuffer the Religious Roman Catholicks quietly so enjoy that Church, of which they have far fome time had the pollefion  $\frac{1}{2}$  and thall give them liberty to make their Procession without diffurbance.

Letters from the Polish Embaliadors in the Court of the Coar of Mulcouy, of the 22th path, confirm the great and unusual Honours done them at their Reception, i fince which they have had leveral Audiences, and much hopes given wen them of bringing their Nogoriations to an happy illue, the Equit learning very defirons to enter into a cloie Alliance with Poland, and ready to fend his Forces into the Field against the Common Enemy, according to his promile 3 and that the young Prince takes all Opportunities of obliging them, and making is Interest, that he may stand fair for the next Election to the Clowin of Reland.

Venice, Dec. 23. A Fregat from Gaudia being much rolled and hindred in her paflage bither by the late ill weathen, has by a Feluca difpatched hither his Pacquet 1 she late fl letters from thence bearing date 24th of November, which inform us, that the Turks having gain'd the ruin'd Outworks of the Fort Panigra, were by their Mines and Galeries advancing with all imaginable diligence towards the great Trench, where by the frequent fpringing of the Mines on each fide, as well as by the many fallies made by the befreged to diffurb their labours; great flaughters of meri are daily made, ber the loss very confiderable for the moff past amongft the Turks, but by one of their Mongr-pieces fhot into the Town, the Provedicor of Caudia Seignior Lorenzo Pifani was unfortunagelykilled, as was that Noble Venetian Berrolo Pifani by a fign.

They tell us allo, that the Plague raged with great wich lence in the Turks Camp, of which a great number of them were fweptaway, and that very great tains had falled on them for 5 or 5 days before the date of thefe letters; which had infinitely diffurbed and difformaged them in the Slege y which the Grand Vifier confidering, and delpairing of any further fuccels against the Town, by realon of the great defondency of his Army, was refolved to withdraw the great eff part of them 5 but whether to Cante, or so New Candia. only, is yet untertain. He has left about 6000, men bet but is not believed they can be able to continue there the Rains fill encreasing, and the besteged frequently diffurbing them by their fallies. Secretary Giavarino our Minister of State, who has been for some confiderable time continued by the Grand Visiter in his Camp, and lodged in the Tenes of Cater 70golo, is lately dead with 5 or 6 other performs of his family 5 tis fuppoled the tame Contagion which rages with fuch violence in their Camp, infecting them, they being lodged in a place of very ill Air, but made worse by reafon of the multitudes of bodies which were buried round about them.

Seignor Barbaro General of Candia, with Cavaliero Grimani, Captain of the Galeasles, and Seignior Labia, were ready to Embarque themfelves to return home.

The City of Candia is excellently flored with all forts of provisions, and the courage of the fouldiers very eminently flown upon all Occasions; on the other fide, the Turks fuffer great wants of both, Our fhips continually cruiting before their Ports, and intercepting fuch Vettels as a terputeing into Canea for their relief; particularly, Captain Molino meeting with a Convey intending to lade Com for their fupply, borne four of their Saichs, and funk five others, giving chace to the reft.

thets, giving chace to the reft. T'e Convoy defigned to them from Earbary, have been feparated by florm, and none of them as yet put into Catea. One Saich and one Petach both of them laden with (Wheat, Biskets, and other Provisions, were by flrette -of weather forced to put into the Port di Chirachi, beyond Zant, hoping to have concealed themfelves there, as in a place little frequented; but they were upon timely difcovery feifed; the Turks and Greeks found aboard them, put to the Oar, and the Prizes fear into Candia.

 Commiffions are lately given out here for new levies of -men for the relief of *Candia*, whither we are also lending a confiderable number of Malons and Carpenters, with -other Labourers, for the speedy reparation of the Fortifications; to put that place into a good pofture of defence, if the Enemy should return again to the Siege the next Sp in<sub>o</sub>.

Paris, fan. 4. On Sunday laft his Majefty went with many Knights of the Order, with their Collers, to the Jefuits Church, where he heard Vespers 3 and the same day gave Order to Monsieur the Duke of Orleance, to provide for his march into Catalonia, to which place he may begin his pourney with the Mareschal de Pleffis, about the 15th of the next Month. The Marquils de Bellefonds and the Count de Duras, who were preparing for their journey to the Court, are ordered to continue Itill in the Neatherlands.

Letters of the 28th paft from Lille, informe us of a great confipracy that has been lately difcovered there against the French Garrison, the Townsmen having held private iatelligence with the Spanish Forces, and appointed a day, (which was to have been the 26th or 27th past) when upon a Signal they were to have fallen upon the Garrison : but upon a timely difcovery, the Marquis D'Humierer, Gowernour of that Gity, has taken care to prevent their defign; and has fince doubled all his Guards, leaving onely three of the Gates of that City open, and strictly examining all perfons that pass in and out : he has also employed greater numbers of men then formerly, in the building of the New Cittadell, by which means that work is far adyanced, which when perfected, will much conduce to the fecurity of that place.

We are also told that a fitting party of the Enemy, drawn out of their Garrisons of Aire and St. Omer, have lately fallen upon a party of the Regiment of Anvergne, which were upon some defign marched out of their Garrison of Bethune, whome hey routed, killing divers of our men upon the place, and taking about 150 prifoners.

Upon notice given of the arrival of the Earl of *Clarendon* at *Rouen*, his Majesty was pleased to dispatch to him the Sieur de la Fom, one of his Gentlemen in Ordinary, with Orders to retire out of his Dominions.

The Commissioners for the Regulation of Coaches, are furyeying the leveral Houles thorow the City, a confiderable fumm of money being ordered to be yearly paid by all perfons who shall be permitted to keep Coaches, beyond the Limitations preferibed. Halio faid, That the Houles thorowout the Chy, are likewife to be furveyed, and a Tax fet upon the Joyles which each Building takes up, by encroachment upon the Streets. His Majetty is I kewife refolved to take off a great part of the Luxtry of this Kingdome in H-bits, as well as in Coaches and Liveries, intending to preferibe Rules to all Perfors according to their Qualities.

From Genoua we are told, that that Republick being a little jealous of the defigns of their Neighbouring Prince the Duke of Savoy, have made a clofe Alliance with the Swille Cantons, by which the later are obliged to affift the State of Genoua with an Army of Sooe. men, whenfoever it shall be defired, upon the payment of a fumme of moneys agreed upon by them.

From Tournay we are advertifed; that the Citadel there is much advanced, and that two of the Townsmen have been hanged for holding correspondency with the Enemy, and scattering papers in the Castle and Town of Aeth, and other of the Fiench Garrisons, seduceing the Souldiers from their Obedience.

Hague, fan 6 On Thursday last the Ratifications of the 1 reary between these States and the Crown of Swedeland, were mutually oxchanged, the Count de Donna and the Sieur Appettboom, having first received the summe of 140000 Rixdollers for damages received, according to the Atticles made batween them: fince which the Embasiador has had his last Audience from the States, and is now preparing for his Voyage into England.
