like other Crimes, which never used to be comprehanded in Our general Acts of Indomnity. And We Command and Require all Our Judges, or others concerned, to Explain this in the most Ample Sense and Meaning Alls of Indminier at any time have contained: Declaring this shall be as good to every one concerned, as if they had Our Royal Pardon and Remission under Our Great Seal of that Kingdom. And likewise Indemnissing Our Protestant Subjects from all Pains and Penalties due for Hearing or Preaching in Houses; Providing there he no Treasmable Speeches useered in the speeches conventicles by them, in which Case the Law is only to take place even, in which Caje the Lair is only to take place against the Guilty, and none other present: Providing also that they Reveal to any of Our Council the Guilt so Committed; As also, Excepting all Fines or Effects of Sensences a ready given; and likewise Indemnifying fully and freely all Lyahers, for their Meetings and Worships, in all time past, preceding the Publication of these Presents, and We doubt not but Our Protestant Subjects will give the Assistant Assistance and Consourse bevenues, on all Occafioni, in their respective Capacities: In considera-tion whereof, and the Ease those of Our Religion, and others may have hereby, and for the Encourage-ment of Our Protestant-Bishops, and the Regular Clerzy, and fuch as have hitherto lived orderly, We shink fit to Declare, that it never was Our. Principle, nor will We ever Suffer Violence to be offered to any Mant Conscience, nor will We use Force, or Invincible Necessity against any Man on the account of bis Persie ision, nor the Protestant Religion, but well Protest Our Bishops and other Ministers in their Functions, Rights and Properties, and all Our Protestant Subjects in the free Exercise of their Protestant Religion in the Churches; And that We Will, and hereby Promise, on Our Royal Word, to Maintsin, she Possessor of Church-Lands formerly belonging to Abbays, or other Churches of the Ca-thelick Religion, in their full and free Possession and Right, according to Oir Laws and Acts of Parlis ment in that behalf in all time coming; And We will Imploy indifferently all Our Subjects, of all Per-ficisions, so as none shall meet with any Discour ge-ment on the account of his Religion, but be Advanced, and Esteemed by Us, according to their several Capacities and Qualifications, so long as We find Charity and Unity Maintained: And if any Animosteries shall Arise, at We hope in God there will not, We will show the surrest Effects of Our Royal Displeasure against the Beginners or Pomenters thereof, seeing thereby Our, Subjects may be Deprived of this general Ease and Satisfaction, We intend to them, whose Happiness, Prosperny, Westeh and Sifety, is so much our Royal Care, that We will leave nothing undone which may procure these And lastly, To the End all Our, Bleffings for obem. Good Subjects may have Notice of this Our Roral Will and Pleasure, We do hereby Command, Our Lyon King at Arms, and his Brethren Heraulds, Macers, Pursevants and Meffengers at Arms, to make timeous Pric amation thereof at the Mercat-Cross of Edinburgh; And bosides the Printing and Publishing, of this Our Roral Proclamation, it is Our express Will and Pleasure, that the same be pust under the Great Seal of that Our Kingdom per faltum, without paffing any other Seal or Regifler: In Order whereuneo, this shall be to the Directors of Our Chancellary, and their Deputs for Writing the same, and to Our Chancellor for cau-ling Our Great Seal aforesaid to be Appended thereunte, a fufficient Warrand.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the Twelth day of February 4682. And of Our Reign the Third Year.

The Answer of the Lords of the Council to His Majesties Letter,

May it please Your Most Sacred Majesty.

Our Majesties Commands are Exactly Obeyed; Your Royal Proclamation is Printed and Published, by which Your Majesty hath given a farther Evidence of Your Favor and Goodness to all Your Sabjects. And we are hopeful, that by Your Maje-ities extraordinary Acts of Mercy to some who have been too ready on many Occasions to abuse the Clemency of Your Royal Predecessors, they will be at last convinced what they owe to so Gracious a King; And if any shall be still so obstinate as to make and wrong Use of Your Majesties Goodness, We do Unamimously affure Your Majesty, That we will maintain and affert Your Royal Prerogatives and Authority with the hazard of our Lives and Fortunes; And all of us shall in our several Capacitics do our Utmost, that Your Government may be easie to all whom Your Majesty thinks worthy of Your Protection.

We are very willing that Your Majesties Subjects who are Peaceable and Loyal, may be at Rase and Security, notwithstanding of their Profession and Private Worship, and do conceive that such of them as are or shall be employed by Your Majesty in Offices of Trust Civil or Military, are sufficiently seed by Your Majesties Authority and Commission

for their exercing the fame.

We return Your Majefty our most humble. Thanks for giving Us Your Royal Word for fraintaining the Church and our Religion as it is now Established by Law, and rest satisfied; besieving Your Majesties Promise to be the best and greatest Security we can have. We are;

May it pleafe Tour Majesty, Tour Majesties most Humble, most Faithful; And most Obedient Subjects and Servants.
