The King's Most Excellent Majesty
in Council.

HIS Majesty being informed that several Sums of Money Collected for the Relief of the Distressed French Protestants, pursuant to the Letters Patents of His Late Majesty of Ever Blessed Memory, dated the 10th day of December 1681, are still remaining in the Hands of several Persons who were appointed to Collect and Pay in the same. His Majesty in Council was thereupon pleased to Order, And it is hereby Ordered, That such Persons in whose Hands any of the Money Collected as aforesaid doth remain, do forthwith cause the same to be paid into the Chamber of London, according to the directions of the said Letters Patents; And the Commissioners appointed by His Majesty to dispose and distribute the Money Collected for the French Protestants by His Majesties Letters Patents bearing date the 5th day of March 1685. are hereby Authorized and Empowered to dispose of the said Money.

Lezhorne, Febr. 15. Four Gallies and as many Gallies are fitting out by Order of our Great Duke, to serve against the Turks the next Summer. By a Vessel arrived in this Port from *Constantinople* we have advice, That the Grand Signior was at *Adriahople*, and that it was still given out (to encourage the Soldiery) that he will the next Campagne command in Person his Forces in *Hungary*. That the 35s Gallies and 17 Men of War were returned to *Constantinople* in a very ill Condition; And that the Plague continued to rage there very violently.

Venice, Febr. 22. The 16th Instant, the Elector of *Bavaria* was in the Great Council, to see the manner of giving their Voices; The next day he went to see the Arsenal, where he was received by four Nobles appointed by the Senate to accompany him. He saw likewise the new Ships that have been built here this Winter; And went afterwards some Leagues to Sea in a small Frigate, on Board of which he was entertained with a Noble Collation. After his Return, he went to see the Bassa of *Napoli di Romania*, and the other Bassa his Brother, who received him with many expressions of Respect. It is said his Electoral Highness has promised to assist this Republick with a Regiment of Horse, which is to serve in the *Morea* the next Campagne, and that a Gentleman has been dispatched to *Munick* with Orders for the said Regiment to be-

gin forthwith their march. The Duke of *Savoy* (who is here *Incognito*) has likewise seen what's most Curious in this City. The 18th, he went to see the Palace, where he was entertained with a Banquet of Sweet Meats, &c. by Order of the Republick; And the next day had the divertisement of the usual Combat between the *Castellans* and the *Nicolares*. This week arrived here 2 Vessels from the *Morea*, by which we have no other News, than that Signior *Venier*, Captain Extraordinary of the Ships of this State, was gone to Cruize with five or six Men of War in the *Archipelago*; And that the Seralquier of the *Morea* was returned to *Corinthe*, after having reinforced the Garisons of *Patras* and *Lepanto*.

Warsaw, Febr. 15. The Bishop of *Primissia*, Ambassador Extraordinary from this Crown to the Emperor, has begun his Journey to *Vienna*; From whence, as we are told, he is to go with the same Character to *Rome* and *Venice*. The last Letters from *Lemberg* told us, that the Envoy of *Tartary* was still there, but that he would be sent away in few days with this Answer, That the King having ratified the League with the Czars of *Moscow*, he is not now at Liberty to receive any Proposals of Peace, in which their Satisfaction as well as that of his other Allies is not included. The Advices from *Moscow* give an account, that the Czars will have 120000 Men in the Field the next Summer, under the Command of *Kaees Galuzin* their chief Minister; And that the General *Rendezvous* is appointed to be in the Month of *April* near *Smolensko*.

Vienna, March 2. The News of *Teckley's* death is not confirmed, but on the contrary the last Letters from *Upper Hungary* said; they had advice that he was very well at *Temeswaer*, and that they believed he himself had caused the Report first of his being dangerously wounded, and afterwards of his death, to be purposely spread abroad, to make the *Imperialists* less watchful on that side, that so he might have a better opportunity to relieve *Agriu*. They write from *Buda*, That the Detachment which was lately sent towards *Alba Regalis*, had brought back with them 25 Prisoners, having defeated a Party of *Turks* belonging to that Garison commanded by a Nephew of the Bassa, who, with many more, was killed upon the place. That these Prisoners reported, that there was in *Alba Regalis* a Garison of 5000 Men, but that they suffered very much through the want of Provisions: The same Letters add, That the Fortifications of *Buda* are so well repaired, that the Place is in a condition to sustain a Siege: That so soon as the Frost was broke, a Bridge would be made over the *Danube* between *Buda* and *Pest*, for a more easie Communication with the Imperial Troops quartered on that side; And that a great Magazine was providing at *Buda* for the Subsistence of the Imperial Troops during the next Campagne. Week was held here an Extraordinary Council of State upon the Proposition of converting the Truce into a Peace, after which Expresses were dispatched to Rome, Raisbonne, and Paris. The Letters from Poland tell us, That according to the Project resolved on for the next Campagne, the King intends to advance with the main Body of his Forces towards Hungary, to join the Imperial Army if there be occasion, leaving the rest of his Troops and the Cossacks under the Command of the Prince his eldest Son, who are to join with a Body of Moscovites to cover the Ukyain and Padolia, while the Army of the Czars invades the Crim Tartary. This week were tryed here several pieces of Cannon and Mortars of a new Invention, which succeeded very well. The Count de Staremberg is preparing his Equipage, but 'tis not yet known whether he will command in Hungary or Croatia. The Cardinal de Collonitz, Bishop of this City, the Count de Staremberg, and several other Persons of Quality, receive thrice a week at the Doors of the principal Churches of this City, the Charities that are given towards the maintenance of the Hospitals for sick and wounded Soldiers.

Hamburg, March 11. The Letters from Copenhagen give an Account, That the Queen of Denmark was the 5th of this month brought to Bed of a young Prince. We have Advice, That the Sieur Bilinski, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Poland to the Elector of Brandenburg, arrived at Berlin the 7th Instant.

Hague, March 14. The States General, to remove the difficulties arisen about the Ceremonial with the Foreign Ministers, resolved yesterday to lay aside their late Resolution concerning this matter. The States of Holland re-assembled the 12th Instant; The chief Subject of their present deliberation, is the raising a Fond to pay the Arrearages of the last War. The Deputies of the Admiralties continue their Conferences with those of the States about the Equipage designed against the Algerines. The Marechal de Schomberg is still here.

Paris, March 15. The Count de Lobkowitz, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, having, as well by word of Mouth, as in Writing, assured his M. C. Majesty in the Name of the Emperor, That his A. M. will Religiously observe the Truce as well after the War with the Turks is ended, as during the continuance of it; And that He is ready to enter upon a Treaty for adjusting the Limits, and establishing a Peace between the Empire and this Crown upon the Foot of the Truce, in such manner and method as is agreeable to the practice between Sovereign Princes, and that he will contribute all that lies in him for the bringing the same to a happy Conclusion. His M. C. Majesty has thereupon declared to the Count de Lobkowitz, that he has an entire Confidence in the Assurances the Emperor has given him, being persuaded, that they are sincere, and that 'tis without any Reserve his Imperial Majesty promises ingiolably to observe the Truce, so that the Complains that have been brought before the Dyet at Raisbonne, and the Works that have been begun at the Battell of Humingen, and in the Isle of Germersem, which his Majesty is resolved to finish for the Security of his Frontiers, shall not be made use of as a Pretext to break the Truce. On this Foundation his Majesty declares, That he will continue on his part, to entertain a good Correspondence with the Emperor and the Empire, not only during the time of the Truce, but likewise so long as they shall on their part correspond with his Majesties good Intentions. The Cardinal Ramuzzi had the 12th Instant a private Audience of the King at Versailles.

Paris, March 15. The 11th instant the solemn

service for the deceased Prince of Conde, was performed in the Church of *Nostre Dame*, with extraordinary Pomp and Magnificence. Several Archbishops and Bishops, the Parliament, the Chamber of Accounts, the University, and the Magistrates of this City assisting thereat; and the Prince de Conde, the Duke de Bourbon, and the Prince de Conti, being Chief Mourners, accompanied with a great number of Persons of the first Quality. The Ambassadors of *Syam* parted from *Brest* the 2d instant; The Squadron which the King sends with them to *Syam*, is composed of 3 Men of War, and 4 other Ships, which have on Board several Companies of Soldiers. The Cardinal Nuncio, it's said, acquainted the King at his last Audience, That the Queen of *Sueden* has voluntarily quitted the Franchises of the Quarter adjoining to her Palace at Rome. We have an Account, That the Cardinal de Bouillon who has been dangerously ill, begins to recover.

Whitehall, March 7. This day the Heer Van Dyckvelt had Audience of his Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, Conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell Master of the Ceremonies.
