## PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the "laws concerning the burial of the dead in "England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed, as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of St. John, Bacup, in the parishes of Whalley and Rochdale, and in the Ebenezer and Irwell Terrace Chapel Burial-grounds, in that consolidated chapelry, from the first of July instant to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty;

In the churchyard of St. Bartholomew, St. Thomas, St. Philip, St. Martin, St. Paul, and St. Mary, BIRMINGHAM, from the first of July instant, to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty; and it is also ordered that the operation of two Orders in Council of the second of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and twenty-sixth of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, so far as they direct only one body to be buried in any grave in the General Cemetery in the old parish of Birmingham, and in the Church of England Cemetery at Birmingham, respectively, be postponed from the first of July instant, to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty;

In the western portion in the churchyard of St. Paul's, CHICHESTER, to the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty; and it is ordered that the said ground be then finally closed, with the exception contained in an Order in Council of the seventh April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in regard to vaults and brick graves in the said churchyard;

In so much of Croydon Churchyard as is called the New Burying-ground, from the first of August next to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, subject to the regulations contained in an Order in Council of the eleventh of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in respect of the said churchyard;

In the parish new burial-ground, and in the Wesleyan Burial-ground, Darlaston, from the first of July instant to the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty;

In the burial-ground of the Primitive Methodist Chapel, DUKINFIELD, from the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fiftynine, to the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one;

In the churchyard of Melbourne, Derbyshire, in the Friends' Burial-ground, in the New Jerusalem Chapel Burial-ground, and in the Baptist Chapel Burial-ground, in that parish, from the first of July to the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and fiftynine:

In such parts of the Independent, Wesleyan, Association, and Primitive Wesleyan Chapelyards as are not within three yards of any building, and in Trinity Churchyard, and in the Lower Independent Chapelyard, all in OVER DARWEN, in the parish of Blackburn, from the first of July instant, to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty;

In the new parish burial-ground of PONTEFRACT, from the first of July, and in the old burial-ground at *Knottingley*, in the said parish, from the first of May, to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine;

In the present burial-ground of the chapelry of Thornton, in the parish of Bradford, Yorkshire, from the first of July instant, to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty;

In the chapelyard of the Ecclesiastical District of Whitechapel, Cleckheaton, in the parish of Birstal, Yorkshire, from the first of July instant, to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the thirty-first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, it was ordered that, except in family vaults and graves, only one body be buried in each grave, in the new burial-ground, in the parish of TWICKENHAM, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order in lieu thereof, and it is hereby ordered, that in the said new burialground or churchyard of Twickenham, with the exception of all vaults, brick graves, and family earthen graves, only one body be buried in a grave, and that, in family earthen graves, one foot of earth be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin, and that no coffin be buried within four feet of the ordinary level of the ground.
