The Queen, taking into Her Royal consideration, that upon the decease of Thomas, Earl of Haddington, Knight of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle, without issue, on the 1st day of December last, the title and dignity of Earl of Haddington devolved upon George, now Earl of Haddington, as great grandson and heir male of Charles Hamilton, commonly called Lord Binning (the great grandfather of the said Thomas, late Earl of Haddington), who was the eldest son of Thomas, sixth Earl of Haddington ; and that according to the ordinary rules of honour, the brothers and sisters of the said George, now Earl of Haddington, cannot enjoy that place and precedence which would have been due to them had their father, George Baillie, Esq., survived his cousin, the said Thomas, late Earl of Haddington, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Earl of Haddington, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Charles Baillie, Esq., one of the Lords of Session in Scotland, Robert Baillie, Esq., John Baillie, Clerk, Master of Arts, Rector of Elsdon, in the county of Northumberland, and one of the Canons of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of York, Thomas Baillie, Esq., Captain in the Royal Navy, and Grisell Baillie, Spinster, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same title, place, pre-eminence, and precedence as if their late father, the said George Baillie, had survived his cousin, the said Thomas, late Earl of Haddington, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Earl of Haddington :

And also to command that the said Royal Order and Declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
