Constantineple, February 8. H E Grand Vilier, who continues at Begrade, has of late fent feveral Expreffes hither; to prefs for fpeedy Supplies of Men and Money. As for the firit, Levies are making throughout the whole Ottom.in Empire, but with fo little fuccels, that hitherto they have not been able to get together a number confiderable enough to be fent to Hungary. In many Provinces they have made ule of Force to raile Men, bit could not afterwards prevent the Defertion of the greatest part of them; And many of these, for fear of Punishment, have banded together in several Provinces, where they commit great Diforders: Others have been allured into the Service by the promife of Double Pay, and that they shall be discharged after the end of the next Campagne, but their number is very finall, the generality of those that seem otherwise to have fome Inclination to Lift themselves , being difcouraged by the Deferters that come in great numbers from *Hungary*. And for the raifing of Mo-ney to fupport the Expenses of the War, feveral Proposals have been made for these two Months lait patt in the Divan, and in the Councils that have keen extraordinarily allembled for that purpose, it being found impossible to draw out of the Grand Signior's Treasury more than 4000 Purfes, which make two Millions of Piastres; And the Provinces, which are entirely ruined, being unable to furnish any extra-ordinary Sublidy. The Proposal that was made of felling part of the Grand Signior's Jeweis is found impracticable, for that none dare buy them, for fear of differentiate the Wealth, and drawing thereby fome great Tax upon themielyes, but part of them have been employed to fatisfie the Cham of Tartary, to whom they have been fent in lieu of the Money that had been promifed him from hence. At laft, after many Deliberations, it has been refolved to lay a Tax, by way of Voluntary Contribution, upon all the great Officers of the Empire, and upon the Cadi's, and others of the Law; It's hoped that this Contribution will be raifed without any great difficulty, but many believe 'twill not in all produce above 4 Millions of Piastres, though others think 'twill amount to 6 Millions, The Oc-roman Fleet is now in as bad a condition as 'twas the last year, being composed of but 9 Ships, and 30 Gallies. The Leventi or Soldiers of the Ships who have not been paid in a long time, mutinied fome days ago, and went to the House of the Captain Baffa to demand their Pay. He would have abliged them by Threats to retire, but they, put themselves in a polyture to force his House, and fome agreempted to kill him, so that he had much

ado to escape out of their hands. He afterwards ordered them fix Months Pay, but at the fame time to put a ftop to these Diforders, caused feveral of the principal Authors of them to be strangled, and about 20 others to be thrown into the Sear-This Punishment did not, however, hinder the reft of the Mutineers from affembling together in this City, where they have pillaged feveral Houfes; upon which Leave has been given to the Inhabitants to kill as many of them as they can. The Ships want Provisions and Ammunition, and it's believed they will be obliged to fetch both from *Al xundria*, the Convoys that fhould come from thence not daving to flir, for fear of the Christian Privateers that Cruizein the Archipelago. It is still given out, to content the Reople, that the Grand Signior will command in Person his Forces in Hungary the next. Campagne.

Naples, Feb. 25. The Levies that are making in this Kingdom for the Service of the Republick of Venice are almost compleated; and feveral Barks have of late been fent from hence with new raifed Men for Venice. The Master of a Veffel arrived from Napoli di Romania reports, the Republick will have an Army of 30000' Men in the Morea the next Summer.

Venice, March 20. The preparations for the Campagne are carried on with extraordinary diligence; and the new raifed Troops arrive daily at the Lido, from whence they will be transported with the next great Convoy to the Morea. The 2000 Men which the Prince of Bareit of Brindenburgh has promifed to put into the Service of this Republick, are on their march, as we are informed by an Express that arrived here this week from Germany; and we un-derstand at the fame time, that the Duke of Haz nouer has promifed further to affift this State with goooMen. We have advice by the way of Otranto, that the Greeks of 1 a e. in the Kingdom of Candia, making use of the opportunity that was given them, by, the Garifons marching out of the Town to burg their Baffa, had taken up Arms, and made them-folves Mafters of the place after which they fent to General Morofini, who was at Napolo di Roma nia to defire his Protection, and that he had thereupon fent 8 Ships and 12-Gallies to their affiftancer but having no account the cor nom the General him-felf, we can give no great ciedit to this Report. We have no Letters from Dalmaria fince those which told us that the Tarks had diawh a Body of Men together withe delign as 'twist believed, to Attante Elocates, and that the Broyethtor General Corner to did likewife affemble his Troops to oppose them.

By a veffel arrived from Malta we are informed, that the Gallies of that Order, which are to ferve against the Turks the next Summer, will be ready to Sail by the beginning of the next Month; and by another vellel come from the Morea we are affured, that Captain-General Morofini has appointed the general Rendezvous of the Fleet to be at Corfou ; where he intends to be himfelf towards the middle of The laft week a new Ship was launched April. here, which will carry between 60 and 70 Guns; fhe is now fitting, and will be ready to Sail with the next Convoy to the Morea,

Warfaw, March 14. The Court of Poland, which is at prefent at Zolkiew, is expected here against the middle of the next Month, but the King will make no long ftay in this City, his Majefty intending to be in the Rield at the Head of his Army before the end of May. All our Advices from Molosvy affure us, that very extraordinary Preparations are making for the profecution of the War on that fide, and that they will begin the Campagne wery early ; And there are particular Letters from Bialacerkieu, which fay they had prepared a Train of Artillery of 200 pieces of Cannon. The News of which, as we are told from the Frontiers, has great-Sy starmed the Tartars, who had perfuaded themfelves that the Czars would never have been prewailed with to join in this War with the Crown of Poland; And the Cham has written to the Grand Vifier to let him know, that instead of employing his Troops in conjunction with those of the Grand Signior against the Poles, he shall now ftand in need of affiftance from the Port to defend his Territories against the Moscovites, who are preparing to invade them with a very great Army. The laft Letters from Lomberg informed us, that feveral Tartans who had been taken Prifoners in a Rencounter fome Polifb Troops had lately with the Enemy, had been brought to that place, who reported, that the Garifon of Caminic fuf-fered great want of Provisions, the Countrey round it being forwined, that they sould draw no Sublittence from thence, and feveral Convoys that had been fent to relieve them having been intercepted by the Poles and Coffacks. These Letters fay farther, that the Crown Treasurer was abroad with 3 or 6000 Polifb Horfe, to keep the Enemy from putting any Succors into Caminiec.

Berlin, March 25. The Elector of Brandenburgh has upon the inftances of the Polific Envoy, promifed to fend fome Troops, with feveral pieces of Cannon, and a confiderable number of Bombs and Grenado's, to the affiftance of that Crown. The last advices from Poland faid, the King had ordered his Troops to be at the general Rendezvous before the end of May; and that his Majesty had resolved to keep Caminiec very closely blocked up, while he acted with the main Body of his Forces in concert with the Moseoviver ; who we are alfured from all Hands, will be very firong in the Field the next Summer.

Francfort, March 81. The last Letters from Vienna, which are of the 23 Inftant, give an account, that the general Rendez-

yous of the Imperial Army is appointed to be the 15th of May, between Buda and Gran; and that there was some difcourse of their acting in two diftinct Bodies, one under the Con 1 nd of the Elector of Bavaria, and the other of the Duke of Lorrain, but if it betrue, as they write from Turky, that the Grand Signior will appear the next Campagne in Hungary at the head of a very numerous Army; the Imperialifts will then unite all their Forces, to give That the Lieutenant Finckhim Battle. enstein had been feveral times examined by the Governor of *Buda*; but that he had added nothing of moment to his former Confession, of which you have already had an account. The fame Letters fay, that the Duke of Lorrain was expected at Vienna the beginning of the next Month.

Hamburgh, April 1. The Letters from Dresden tell us, that the Elector of Saxony has promifed to affift the Emperor with 4000 Men the next Campagne. And we are told from Berlin, that his Imperial Majefty defires the like Succor of the Elector of Brandenburgb. They write from Copenbagen, that Preparations are making there for the King's Journey to Holftein.

Hague , April 4. Prince Waldecke parted from hence the last week for Cuylenburg, where he intends to flay Iome fime. The States of Friefland have confented to the state of the War for this present year, Prince Casimir of Nassau, Stadtholder of Friefland and Groningen, returned the 2d of this month to Leenwaerden.
