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Constantinople, February 8.

4 H E Grand Visier, who continues at Be grade, has of late fent several Expresses hither; to press for speedy Supplies of Men and Money. As for the first, Levies are making throughout the whole Ottoman Empire, but with fo little fuccels, that hitherto they have not been able to get together a number considerable enough to be sent to Hungary. In many Provinces they have made use of Force to raise Men, but could not afterwards prevent the Defertion of the greatest part of them; And many of these, for fear of Punishment, have banded together in several Provinces, where they commit great Disorders: Others have been allured into the Service by the promise of Double Pay, and that they shall be discharged after the end of the next Campagne, but their number is very small, the generality of those that seem otherwise to have some Inclination to List themselves, being discouraged by the Deferters that come in great numbers from Hungary. And for the raising of Mo-ney to support the Expences of the War, several Proposals have been made for these two Months last path in the Divan, and in the Councils that have keen extraordinarily affembled for that purpose, it being found impossible to draw out of the Grand Signior's Treasury more than 4000 Purses, which make two Millions of Piastres; And the Provinces, which are entirely ruined, being unable to furnish any extra-ordinary Subsidy. The Proposal that was made of selling part of the Grand Signior's Jewels is found impracticable, for that none dare buy them, for fear of discovering their Wealth, and drawing thereby some great Tax upon themselves, but part of them have been employed to fatisfie the Cham of Tartary, to whom they have been fent in lieu of the Money that had been promifed him from hence. At last, after many Deliberations, it has been refolved to lay a Tax, by way of Voluntary Contribution, upon all the great Officers of the Empire, and upon the Cadi's, and others of the Law; It's hoped that this Contribution will be raifed without any great difficulty, but many believe 'twill not in all produce above 4 Millions of Piattres, though others think 'twill amount to 6 Millions. The Octoman Fleet is now in as bad a condition as 'twas the Last year, being composed of but 9 Ships, and 30 Gallies. The Leventi or Soldiers of the Ships who have not been paid in a long time, mutinied fome days ago, and went to the House of the Captain Bassa to demand their Pay. He would have obliged them by Threats to retire, but they put themselves in a posture to sorce his House, and some agempted to kill him, so that he had much ado to escape out of their hands. He afterwards ordered them six Months Pay, but at the same time to put a stop to these Disorders, caused several of the principal Authors of them to be strangled, and about 20 others to be thrown into the Seat. This Punishment did not, however, hinder the rest of the Mutineers from assembling together in this City, where they have pillaged several Houses; upon which Leave has been given to the Inhabitants to kill as many of them as they can. The Ships want Provisions and Ammunition, and it's believed they will be obliged to setch both from al candria, the Convoys that should come from thence not daving to stir, for sear of the Christian Privaters that Cruize in the Archipelago. It is still given out, to command in Person his Forces in Hungary the next

Naples, Feb. 25. The Levies that are making in this kingdom for the Service of the Republick of Venice are almost compleated; and several Barks have of late been sept from hence with new raised Men for Venice. The Master of a Vessel arrived from Napoli di Romania reports, the Republick will have an Army of 30000 Men in the Morea the next Summer.

Venice, March 20. The preparations for the Campagne are carried on with extraordinary diligence; and the new raised Troops arrive daily at the Lido. from whence they will be transported with the next great Convoy to the Morea. The 2000 Men which the Prince of Bareit of Brindenburgh has promifed to put into the Service of this Republick, are on their march, as we are informed by an Express that arrived here this week from Germany; and we understand at the same time, that the Duke of Hanouer has promised further to assist this State with 3000Men. We have advice by the way of Otranto, that the Greeks of 1 a e.i in the Kingdom of Candia, making use of the opportunity that was given them, by, the Garifons marching out of the Town to burg their Bassa, had taken up Arms, and made them-solves Masters of the place; after which they sent to General Moroslai, who was at Napolo di stoma nia to defire his Protection, and that he had thereupon fent 8 Ships and 12-Gallies to their affiftancer but having no account the cor from the General him delf, we can give no great credit to this Report. We have no Letters from Dalmaria fince those which old us that the Tarks had thriwn a Body of Men together withou delign as 'two believeds to strante Boldenes, and that the Proveditor General Cornel to did likewife affemble his Troops to oppose them.
