PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners
for England have, in pursuance of an
Act passed in the third and fourth years of Her
Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen,
section sixty-eight; and of another Act passed in
the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign,
chapter thirty-nine, section twenty-one; and of
another Act passed in the fifth and sixth years of
Her Majesty's reign, chapter twenty-six, section
eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty
in Council a scheme, bearing date the twentythird day of November, in the year one thousand
eight hundred and fifty-nine, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesias-'tical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Com-'missioners for England,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to alter and amend the law re-'lating to ecclesiastical houses of residence,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for substituting a money payment for certain property belonging to the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of

"Whereas it was by the said recited Acts enacted and declared, that by the authority of a scheme prepared by us, and ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the said first recited Act, any sum of money which should have been invested in the public funds, or in other security or securities, in trust for any ecclesiastical body corporate, aggregate, or sole, might upon application in writing to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, under the hand and seal of such body corporate, and in the case of any chapter, with the consent of the

visitor thereof, be directed to be sold, and the same should be sold accordingly, and that the produce of such sale should be applied to such purpose, and in such manner, as should appear most conducive to the permanent benefit of such body corporate, and also that for any like purpose, any arrangement might be made, with the consent in writing under the corporate seal of any chapter, for the sale, transfer, or exchange, of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, belonging to such chapter, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments; and that the aforesaid provisions relating to the sale and application of any sum of money invested in trust for any ecclesiastical body corporate, did and should include and apply to all monies and securities for money, and to all stock in the Government funds, or elsewhere, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, or in the name or names of any other public officer, or of any individual or individuals, for or to the credit of, or in trust for, any bishop, dean and chapter, dean or canon, whether for the purpose of being laid out in land or otherwise.

"And whereas the said chapter now consists of a dean and four canons; six canonries having been suspended under the provisions of the said first recited Act.

"And whereas the said dean and chapter are now seized in fee of divers manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, the greater part of which have been heretofore demised or granted on leases or grants for years or lives at small annual reserved rents and upon payment of fines; and they are also beneficially interested in or otherwise entitled to certain sums of stock and cash invested or held in trust as aforesaid, and particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked A.

"And whereas, by an order and decree of the said dean and chapter, bearing date the twenty-first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and duly confirmed as a statute by their visitor, and registered in the registry of the diocese, it was provided that the yearly sum of four thousand and six hundred pounds, part of the yearly sum of nine thousand pounds, hereinafter mentioned, or of the net annual proceeds of the estates which may be substituted for the same, should be appropriated to or for the several per-

sons or objects connected with the said dean and chapter and enumerated and set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked B, and that an annual sum of not less than eight hundred pounds should be set apart for the due reparation of the said cathedral church and the buildings connected therewith.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us, that by reason of the great antiquity of the said church, and of the want of due reparation in times past, it has become necessary for the due sustentation thereof to expend thereon forthwith such a sum of money as cannot be wholly charged on the parties now entitled to the receipt and enjoyment of the divisible corporate revenues of the said dean and chapter.

"And whereas we have ascertained that the sum so required to be forthwith expended in such repairs, and in effecting improvements conducive to the security of the fabric of the said cathedral church, amounts to fifteen thousand and three

hundred pounds, or thereabouts.

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls; and the said dean and chapter have proposed to us, with the consent of their visitor, that the said manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments (except as hereinafter excepted), should be dealt with in manner hereinafter mentioned; and we are of opinion, that it would ultimately conduce as well to the improvement of the said fund, as to the permanent benefit of the said dean and chapter, that the same should be dealt with accordingly.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Worcester, and of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Worcester, as visitor of the said dean and chapter, testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals, we humbly recommend and propose, that, in consideration of the money payments hereinafter mentioned to be paid by us to, or on account of, the said dean and chapter, and of our relinquishing all our right and claim in respect of the said suspended canonries, to and in the estates and property to be retained by the said dean and chapter, and to any participation in the rents and profits thereof (except in the Worcester meadows), or in the money payments hereinafter mentioned, or the estates to be substituted for the same, all the manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, which now belong, either in possession or reversion, to the said dean and chapter (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage, and any property in possession, or not subject to any outstanding demise or grant, situate within the precincts or sanctuary of the said cathedral church, and excepting also the Worcester meadows aforesaid), and all the estate and interest therein of the said dean and chapter, shall, as from and after the first day of November, in this present year, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than any duly published Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, become and be transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and that we and they shall thereupon become and be absolutely seized of the same in fee, and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance, we shall surrender all right and be excluded from all participation in respect of the said suspended canonries to and in the property to be hereafter retained by the said dean and chapter as aforesaid, except in the Worcester meadows aforesaid, and that there shall on the first day of May, and the first day of November, in every year, be paid by us to the said dean and chapter, in respect of the half year then last past, the sum of four thousand and five hundred pounds; and also until the said dean and chapter shall have been put into possession of real estates as hereinafter mentioned, the further sum of one hundred and eighty pounds (such last-mentioned sum to be by them appropriated and paid to the chapter clerk for the time being, in respect of the profits which would have accrued to him on account of the management of the estates hereby proposed to be transferred to us), and that the first payment of each of such half yearly sums respectively, be made on the first day of May next, and that the receipt or receipts of the Receiver-General for the time being of the said dean and chapter, shall be a good and valid discharge to us for all or any and every such sum or sums of money as shall therein be expressed to have been paid to him by us under the authority of this scheme when ratified as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that, as a further consideration for the said transfer and conveyance, there shall be forthwith paid and expended by us in effecting such repairs of the said cathedral church and improvements as aforesaid, under the superintendence of and according to plans and specifications to be prepared by the architect of the dean and chapter, and to be approved by us, the said sum of fifteen thousand and three hundred pounds, for which due allowance has been made in fixing the amount of the annuity to be paid to the said dean and chapter as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that none of the monies or estates to be received or acquired under the provisions of this scheme, shall be applicable to the purposes of our common fund (except only so far as it may be necessary to reimburse such fund, any advances made thereout under the provisions of this scheme), until or unless by and under the like authority, the said dean and chapter shall have been put into possession in fee simple of real estates (of which not more than one eighth part shall consist of tithes or tithe rent charges), sufficient to secure to the said dean and chapter, a clear annual income therefrom (after deducting rates, taxes, and other outgoings, including costs of management), of nine thousand pounds, free from any claim by us on account of the shares to which we may be entitled in respect of suspended canonries, subject however as well to the charges and outgoings hereinbefore mentioned, as to all other capitular liabilities, except the hereinbefore mentioned payment of three hundred and sixty pounds per annum to the chapter clerk."

"Provided also that if when the said dean and chapter shall have been put into possession of permanent estates as last aforesaid, the present chapter clerk shall hold that office, there shall be paid to him by us during his tenure thereof, a yearly sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, in respect of the loss of emoluments which he will then sustain, by reason of the diminution in the number and area of the capitular estates."

"And we further recommend and propose, with the like consent of the said dean and chapter, and of their visitor, that the said sums of stock and cash so described as aforesaid, in the said Schedule marked A, and also any other sums of stock or cash which may be now invested or held in trust for the said dean and chapter, excepting only any stock or cash which may have been produced by the sale of any part of the Worcester meadows aforesaid, shall as soon as conveniently may be, be sold out or transferred, and the same or the proceeds thereof, be paid or carried to our

account at the Bank of England, to be applied towards the objects of this scheme, and particularly to investment in the purchase of any interest in the estates herein proposed to be transferred to us, or any or either of them, or of any other real estates."

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures, relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the said Acts or either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE A.

"The sum of one thousand nine hundred and eighty-one pounds eight shillings and eight pence, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the dean and chapter of Worcester, ex arte the Worcester and Birmingham Canal Navigation Company.

"The sum of one thousand nine hundred and sixty pounds ten shillings and four pence, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities. standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the dean and chapter of Worcester, ex parte the Midland

Railway Company.

"The sum of four hundred and twelve pounds nine shillings and eight pence, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the dean and chapter of Worcester, ex parte the Commissioners for the improvement of the River Severn.

"The sum of one hundred and seventy-seven pounds seventeen shillings and one penny, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the dean and chapter of Worcester, ex parte the Worcester and Birmingham Canal Navigation Com-

Pany.

"The sum of two hundred and seventeen pounds and thirteen shillings, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the dean and chapter of Worcester, ex parte the Commissioners for the improvement of the city of Worcester.

The sum of seven hundred and ninety pounds five shillings and ten pence, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the dean and chapter of Worcester, ex parte the Oxford, Worcester and

Wolverhampton Railway Company.

"The sum of one hundred and fifty-one pounds two shillings and eight pence, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the dean and chapter of Worcester, in the matter of the Shipston-on-Stour Workhouse.

"The sum of six hundred and six pounds fifteen shillings and eleven pence, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the dean and chapter of Worcester, ex parte the Bromsgrove Burial Board.

The sum of one hundred and sixty pounds ten shillings and two pence, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the dean and chapter of be Her Majesty's Solicitor-General.

Worcester, in the matter of compensation paid by the Leominster Canal Company for land in the

parish of Lindridge.

"The sum of two hundred and ninety-two pounds eighteen shillings and four pence, new three pounds per centum Bank Annuities, part of a larger sum of stock standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the dean and chapter of Worcester, being the proceeds of money received for premises taken for the purpose of erecting the new bridge over the Severn at Worcester.

" SCHEDULE B.

" For the repair, restoration, maintenance, and improvement of the fabric of the cathedral and buildings connected with it, the chapter-house, cloisters, college hall, the Edgar Tower, and of the houses of the officers and servants of the cathedral. situated in the cathedral precincts, not being the residentiary houses of the dean or any of the

" For the repair, removal, alteration, or rebuilding of the Guestenhall, the Choristers' School,

and premises attached to them.

" For the statutory stipends and allowances to the dean and canons and the usual and accustomed allowances and payments to the subdean, receiver, and treasurer.

" For the stipends and allowances to the precentor, sacrist, and other ministers, officers, and servants of the church.

" For the expences of the college school, the

choir, and library.

" For providing and repairing the church fur-

" For lighting, watching, and otherwise for the care, management, and improvement of the precincts, and all other expenses connected with the cathedral, and with the services of the church, and for subscriptions and donations to religious and charitable objects."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Wm. L. Bathurst. Worcester.
