**T**HIS day the following Address, Subscribed by a great Number of the most considerable Anabaptists, in and about London, was presented to the King by several of the Chief of them, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

*The Humble Address of divers of Your Majesties Subjects in and about the City of London, commonly called Anabaptists.*

Dread Sovereign,

**W**E Your Majesties most Humble and Loyal Subjects, who for a long time, have been great Sufferers, by the severe Execution of Penal Laws, about Matters of Religion, (unto which For Conscience Sake, we could not Conform) cannot sufficiently pay those Acknowledgments we owe to Your Majesty for Your late most Gracious Declaration, whereby we are not only delivered from our past Distresses, and our Families from Ruine, but are also allow'd the Free Exercise of our Religion, which is Dearer to us than any Worldly Enjoyment.

GREAT SIR, 'Tis the Sense of this invaluable Favour and Benefit derived to us from Your Royal Clemency, that compels us once more to prostrate our Selves at Your Majesties Feet, with the Tender of our most humble Thanks, for that Peace and Liberty which both we, and all other Dissenters from the National Church now enjoy, and rest confident of, under Your most Gracious Protection.

And being our Selves most firmly resolv'd (as in Conscience bound) to endeavour to the Utmost to give that proof of our Duty and Fidelity to Your Majesty, that You may never have occasion to repent of Your Princely Favour towards us; We cannot but rest confident, That such Demonstrations as these of Your Majesties tender Care of the Prosperity and Quiet of Your peaceable Subjects of all Sorts (though differing in some Sentiments about Religion) will so absolutely command the Hearts of them all, that the onely Emulation among them will be, who may approve themselves best worthy of Your Majesties Favour, and contribute most towards the Glory and Happiness of Your Reign.

And that Almighty God by pouring out his signal Blessings upon Your Majesty, Your Royal Posterity, Government and People, will be pleas'd to convince the whole World of the Wisdom and Truth of Your Majesties Sentiments. That Conscience is not to be Forc'd; And that nothing can more conduce to the Quiet of this Kingdom, and Your Majesty's

Greatness, than an entire Liberty of Conscience, which is most suitable to that Golden Rule, Whatsoever ye would that Men should do to you, do ye even the same to them.

Dantzick, April 8. The Letters from Poland tell us, a new Bassa was entred with a Convoy of Provisions into Caminiec, and that the Tartars that guarded it had afterwards made Incurfions into Volhania, and the other frontier Provinces of Poland, where they had committed great Spoil. The Poles will be much earlier in the Field this Summer than they used to be, and great Magazines are provided for the Subsistence of the Army. These advices add, that the Envoy from the Cham of Tartary had been conducted from Lemberg to Zulkiew, where he was to have his Audience of leave of the King. An Envoy was likewise arrived at that Court, from the Hospodar of Moldavia.

Vienna, April 10. The last week Dyed here Conrad Balthasar Count de Staremberg, one of the Council of State, and President of the Lower Austria, in the 75th year of his age. The Chamber of the Finances has begun to distribute the Moneys for the Levy of the two Companies that are to be added to every Regiment, which according to the Capitulations made with the Officers are to be in a condition to March before the end of June; These New Companies, which together will make above Eight thousand Men, will be put into the Towns of Hungary, from whence as they arrive there the Garifons will be drawn out to reinforce the Imperial Army. The Train of Artillery will be ready in 10 days; several hundred Bombardiers are already arrived here, and a very extraordinary provision has been made of Bombs, Carcasses and other Fireworks; We are told from Upper Hungary that Teckley is extremely mortified at the discovery of his Correspondence with the Hungarians, which has put him out of a condition to perform his promises to the Grand Visier; and that the Tartars, who were under the Orders of the Bassa's of Great Waradin and Temeswaer, are gone home, being sent for by the Cham to defend his own Countreys against the Poles and Moscovites; and that it was believed the Tartars who are now with the Grand Visier will be likewise recalled. The Troops quartered in Upper Hungary which had Orders to March, are countermanded, not to Fatigue and Ruine the Regiments in a Season not very proper for Action. The Turkish Troops which marched lately from Alba Regalis are returned thither without attempting any thing, having understood that the Imperial

perial Troops on the *Drave* were every where on their Guard; The *Bassa* of that Place is very much troubled, as well at the disappointment of his design upon *Buda*, as because the Succors promised him by the Grand Visier do not arrive. We have not only the Confirmation of the advantage which the Croats lately obtained upon the Turks near the Castles of *Zrin* and *Novi*, but are likewise informed, that those of *Perrinza*, marching out with 100 Horse, had surprized the Turkish Guard, which was posted without the Gate of the Fortress *Cofanizza* on the River *Unna*, of whom several were killed, and the rest taken prisoners, The Religious who lately arrived from *Persta*, being likewise charged with Letters for the Pope, is gone to *Rome* to deliver them to his Holiness. The Turkish Aga, of whose arrival at *Delvazin* we told you in our last, is sent to make new Overtures of Peace, to which this Court will not hearken, unless the Turks restore whatever they are still possessed of in *Hungary*, and pay the Emperor four Millions of Gold for the Expenses and Damages of the War, and give satisfaction likewise to all his Allies. The Turks continue to draw their Forces together on the side of *Essecke*, and its not doubted but they will make their utmost efforts to relieve *Alba Regalis*, *Sgeth* and *Canist*, the Garrisons of which Places are reduced to a great want of Ammunition as well as Provisions. We hear from *Buda*, that Lieutenant *Finckenstein* had been put to the Torture, but that he had added nothing material to his former Confession, persisting still that his design was to have got a Sum of Money of the Turks, and then to have discovered the whole matter.

*Cologna, April 18.* The Cardinal de *Furstemberg* is now at *Leges*, where the Marriage between the Prince of *Nassau*, and the Princess of *Furstemberg* was Celebrated the 9th Instant with great Magnificence. The *Sieur Valkenier* is arrived here in his way to *Ratisbonne*, where he is to reside on the part of the States General of the United Provinces.

*Hamburg, April 15.* The *Sieur Huffleman*, who was lately sent by these Magistrates to the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, is come back, with Assurances from his Electoral Highness, That he will contribute all that lies in him, to the Peace and Security of this City. The Levies that are making by the Duke of *Honor*, for the Service of the Republick of *Venice*, are almost completed; And besides these, the Duke of *Wolfmbuttel* will likewise send a Regiment to their Assistance; These Troops will together make a Body of 4000 Men, under the Command of Prince *Maximilian* of *Brunswicke*.

*Brussels, April 22.* There daily pass through this City several Volunteers, who are going to serve against the *Turks* in *Hungary*. And Prince *Charles Thomas* of *Lorraine*, Son of the Prince of *Vaudemont*, who likewise intends to make the Campagne in the Imperial Army, is preparing for his departure. The last Letters from *Vienna*, inform us, That the Troops which were on their march for the Bombarding of *Agria*, had been countermanded, for that this Enterprize would too much harrass them, and make them unfit for Service when the whole Army takes the Field. That the Officers had received their Moneys for the new Companies they are to raise, which they are to have compleat before the end of *June*. And that Orders had been sent to the Imperial Troops quartered in *Bohemia*, *Silesia*, and *Moravia*, to be in a readiness to begin their march to the general Rendezvous.

*Hague, April 22.* The States of *Holland* meet again to-morrow. The Count de *Nassau* General of the Horse in the Service of this State, is expected here the next week from *Germany*. We have an account from *Dresden* of the Death of the Electors Dowager of *Saxony*.

*Paris, April 23.* The King will be this Night at *Maris*, in his return from *Mantemun*. His Majesties Journey to *Luxemburgh* continues fixt for the first or second of the next Month. The Duke de *Mortemar* is going with five or six Men of War against the Corsairs of *Sallé*, who have of late taken several French Ships.

*Whitehal, April 16.* His Majesty has been pleased to constitute Sir *Robert Wright* one of the Justices of the Kings Bench, Lord Chief Justice of the Common-Pleas; And Mr. Justice *Powel* is thereupon removed from the Court of Common-Pleas to the Kings-Bench, and Mr. Baron *Milton* from the Exchequer to the Common-Pleas.

*London, April 15.* *William Grant*, Soldier in Captain *Parson's* Company in His Majesties First Regiment of Guards, and *Richard Carr* Soldier in Sir *Edward Hales's* Regiment, having at the Sessions held at the *Old Baib*, been Convicted of Felony, for Deserting their Colours, and accordingly Sentenced to be Hang'd; the first was Executed on Wednesday last in *Covent-Garden*, and the other this day on *Tower-Hill*.
