**H**IS Majesty being informed, That in several Parishes of this Kingdom no Collections have been hitherto made for the Relief of the Necessitous French Protestants, in pursuance of His Majesties Letters Patents dated the 5th day of March 1685, Is Graciously pleased hereby to Order, That the Archbishops, Bishops, and all others exercising Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Do take Care that the Rectors, Vicars and Curates of such Parishes wherein no Collections have been made, as aforesaid, do exhort their Parishioners to give their Charitable Contribution towards the Relief of the said Necessitous French Protestants; And that the same be Collected and Paid in, according to the directions of the said Letters Patents. And the Commissioners appointed by the said Letters Patents, are hereby Authorized and Impowered to dispose of such Collections in like manner as they have formerly done.

Whitehall, April 18. This day the following Address was presented to His Majesty, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble Address of several of Your Majesties Subjects who, by Your Majesties Bounty and Goodness, enjoy their Lives, forfeited by being in Arms against Your Majesty and Government.

**T**HE great and undeserved Favour which we have received from Your Majesty being no less than Life, calls for the most Sincere and Unfeigned Thankfulness, Especially when we consider how Active we have been against Your Majesty, and how Unable we are to render You Services deserving such Princely Bounty; This had been Cause enough to have compelled us to Prostrate our selves at Your Majesties Feet with the Humblest and most Thankfull Hearts, which we Truly do. But when we likewise call to Mind, That Your Majesty hath not onely permitted us to Live, but likewise, by Your Most Gracious Declaration, engaged Your Self to Protect us, and all the rest of Your Subjects, in the Exercise of our Religion, and En-

joyment of all Properties, we cannot be without, but from the abundance of our Heart's desires our Thankfulness, and the Security we have in Your Majesties Royal Promises; And as the best Return we can make for Your Incomparable Goodness, is to do all Your Subjects, Humbly tender Your Majesty, as it our Duty, the Utmost of our Services in Defence of Your Royal Person and Government.

Lemberg, March 25. We have certain advice that the Turks have put a Convoy of Provisions into *Emmaviec*, and that they afterwards returned to *Moldavia*, and having joined with 30000 *Tatars* commanded by two *Mirsas*, who, it is believed, came from *Hungary*, divided themselves in several Bodies, to make Incursions into the Territories of this Crown; One of these Parties plundered and burnt 8 Villages belonging to the King near *Sicawia*, and carried away a great many Prisoners; Another took their march towards *Volbina*; And a third was defeated, by the Troops under the Command of the *Sieur Laskie*, many being killed, and the rest taken Prisoners, who have been brought hither, and assure us that the *Cham* has resolved to unite all his Forces to make Head against the *Moscovites*, who, they hear, make prodigious Preparations for the Campaign. They write from *Wilna*, that the Army of *Lithuania* will be much more numerous, and earlier in the Field this year than twas the last. The Court will remove the next week to *Warsaw*.

Copenhagen, March 29. There was lately cast away not far from *Elfenour*, an English Vessel, laden at *Newcastle* with Coals, Lead, and other Merchandises; the Master (whose name was *Medford*,) and all the Seamen, 12 in number perishing with the Ship; which *Sir Gabriel Sylvius*, His Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary at this Court having notice of, he immediately made application to the King of *Denmark*, that the Goods which were saved, might be preserved for the Owners, which he obtained, and accordingly part of the Lead, with the Cables and Ankors that had been taken up, was put into the hands of the English Consul, who by *Sir Gabriel's* direction, has employed People to fish for the rest, for the benefit of the Proprietors; for whose sake this Notice is given, that by their Agents they may apply themselves to *Sir Gabriel Sylvius*, or the English Consul at *Elfenour*, who will give them all requisite assistance.

Vienna, April 13. The Duke of *Lorraine* arrived here the 11th Instant from *Inspbruck*, to assist at the Councils of War that are now held here, to prepare things for the opening of the Campaign. A great many Boats pass daily down the *Danube* with Provisions and Ammunition, to fill the Magazines in the Frontier places of *Hungary*. We have an account from *Buda*, That the Lieutenant *Finkenstein* had been sentenced to have his Right Hand Cut off, and to be afterwards Beheaded, his Body to

**Q**uartered, and the Quarters set up near the place by which he had promised the *Turks* to give them entrance into the Town; and that this Sentence was to be executed the 9th Instant, The *Moscovite* Ambassadors have received Advice, that the Forces of the Czars were on their march towards the *Crim Tartary*, and that the *Cossacks* were to act separately under the Command of the *Sieur Samolowitz*, an Officer of great Credit among them. The Bishop of *Primsia*, who arrived here some days ago from *Poland*, has had Audience of the Emperor, but without taking upon him any Publick Character.

**Cologne, April 22.** They write from *Munick*, That the Elector of *Bavaria* intends to part from thence the 18th of the next month for *Vienna*; And that his Troops had already begun their march towards *Hungary*.

**Hamburg, April 22.** The 18th Instant was published here the General Amnesty, or Pardon, which the Emperor has granted this City, with exception of those Persons that are already condemned, or against whom any Process is now depending. The new Regiment of Foot which Prince *Maximilian of Brunwick* has raised for the Service of the Republick, being compleated, begun their march the 14th of this month, the Prince intending to follow himself in few days. We are told from *Berlin*, That the Imperial Minister at that Court, has not yet been able to finish his Negotiation about the Successors which the Emperor desires of his Electoral Highness. They write from *Poland*, That the Forces of that Crown were marching to the general Rendezvous near *Lemberg*; And that the Troops of *Lithuania*, which will make a Body of 18000 Men, are to Rendezvous at *Bizeze*, and to join afterwards in the *Ukraine* with those of *Poland*.

**Hague, April 22.** The Baron *Kragh*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Denmark*, presented the last Week a Memorial to the *States General*, containing: That the King his Master having seen by a Memorial which the Resident of this State had lately presented to him, that the *States General* were concerned, in what manner their Subjects would be treated for the future with relation to the Tolls or Duties, seeing that by the 15 and 17 Articles of the Ordonnance which his Majesty had caused to be published the last year, concerning the payment of the Tolls within his Dominions, the Officers of the Customs are required to make a distinction between the Nations that have any Treaty with his Majesty, and those that have none; His Majesty had commanded him (the said Envoy) to let the *States* know, That although the said Articles are not new, but are to be found in the former Ordonnances published in the year 1671, and that since the Publication of the new Ordonnance made in the month of *May* of the last year nothing has been innovated with regard to the Subjects of the *States General*, and that consequently his Majesty sees not what can have given them reason to apprehend any Innovation for the Future; yet his Majesty, to shew the desire he has to maintain always a good Correspondence with the *States*, and to take away all manner of Scruples, does assure them, That he will leave the Tolls which the Subjects of this State trading into his Dominions are obliged to pay in the same rate, and on the same foot, on which they have hitherto been, without charging their Trade with any new Imposition, hoping the *States* will on their side correspond with this his Majesties good Intention; And not only Reciprocally treat his Subjects with the same Favor, but that they will likewise speedily perfect the Treaty of Commerce lately concluded at the *Hague*.

**Hague, April 25.** The *States of Holland and West-Friesland* re-assembled the 23d Instant, *Prince Philip of Brandenburg* has received the Compliments of Condolance upon the death of his Brother the *Margrave Louis*; He intends to stay here till towards the latter end of the next month, and then to return to *Berlin*. The *Duchess Dowager of Nassau*, and the *Princess of Simmeren*, and the *Princess of Anhalt*, went from hence this morning to *Turnhout*. The *Duke de Croy*, who arrived here the last week from *England*, is preparing for his return to *Hungary*. The Envoy of *Morocco*, who has been some time at *Amsterdam*, is expected here the next Week, to take his Leave of the *States*.
