Lemberg, March 25. We have certain advice that the Turks have put a Convoy of Provisions into Camanice, and that they afterwards returned to Malaci vice, and that they afterwards returned to Malaci vice, and having joined with 6000 finitary come manded by two Murfa's, who, it's believed, came from Hunnary, divided themlelves in feveral Bo-dies 4 to make Incu fines into the Territor this Grown; One of these Parties plonder to burnt 8 Villages belonging to the hing near Size crann, and carried away a great many Priloners; Another took their march towards *I obinat*; And a third was defeated, by the Troops under the Command of the Sieur Laskie, many being killed, and the reft taken Prifances, who have been brought hither, and affure us that the Cham has refolved to unite all his Forces to make Head against the Mos covicat, who, they hear, make prodigious Preparations for the Campagne. Copenhagen, March 29. There was lately caft away not far from Elfeneur, an English Vessel, la-den at Neurcastle with Coals, Lead, and other Merchandifes; the Master (whole name was Medford, ) and all the Seamen, 12 in number perifying with the Ship; which Sir Gabreel Sylvins, His Majefty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary at this Court having notice of, he immediately made application to theking of *Demmak*, that the Goods which were fa-ved, might be preferved for the Owners, which he obtained, and accordingly part of the Lead, with the Cables and Ankors that had been taken up, was put into the hands of the English Conful, who by Sir Gabriel's direction, has employed People to fifh for the reft, for the benefit of the Proprietors; for whose fake this Notice is given, that by their Agents they may apply themselves to Sir Gabriel Sylvins, or the English Conful at Elfeneur, who will give them all requifite affiftance.

Vienna, April 13, The Duke of Lorrain ar-rived here the 11th Instant from Insprucke, to alfift at the Councils of War that are now held here, to prepare things for the opening of the Campagne, A great many Boats pais daily down the Danube with Provisions and Ammunition, to fill the Maga-zines in the Frontier places of Hungary. We have an account from Buda, That the Lieutenaut Finckenstein had been sentenced to have his Right Hand Cut off, and to be afterwards Beheaded, his Body

Duartered, and the Quarters let up near the place by which he had promifed the Turks to give them entrance into the Town; and that this Sentence was to be executed the 9th Inftant, The Mok covite Ambaffadors have received Advice, that the Forces of the Czars were on their march towards the Crim Turtury, and that the Collacks were to act leparately under the Command of the Sieur Samolowitz, an Officer of great Credit among them. The Bilhop of Primifia, who arrived here fome days ago from Poland, has had Audience of the Emperor, but without taking upon him any Publick CharaCter.

Cologne, April 22. They write from Munick, That the Elector of Bavaria intends to part from thence the 18th of the next month for Vienna; And that his Troops had already begun their march towards Hungary.

Hamburgh, April 22. The 18th Inftant was publifted here the General Amnefty, or Pardon, which the Emperor has granted this City, with exception of those Perfons the pre already condemned, or againft whom any Process is now depending. The new Regiment of Foot which Prince Maximilian of Branjinick has railed for the Service of the Republick, being compleated, begun their march the 14th of this month, the Prince intending to follow himfelf in few days. We are told from Berlin, That the Imperial Minister at that Court, has not yet been able to find this Negotiation about the Succors which the Emperor defires of his Electoral. Highneds. They write from Poland, That the For Ees of that Crown were marching to the general Rendezvous near Lemberg; And that the Troops of Liebuania, which will make a Body of 18000 Men, are to Rendezvous at Bizeze, and to join afterwards in the Upraine with thole if Poland.

Hague, April 22. The Baron Kragh, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, pre-Tented the laft Week a Memorial to the Seates Gene-Y.I., containing: That the King his Mafter having Teen by a Memorial which the Hefident of this State had lately prefented to him, that the States' General were concerned, in what manner their Subjects would be treated for the future with relation to the Tolls or Duties, feeing that by the 15 and 17 Articles of the Ordonnance which his Majelty had caufed to be published the last year, concerning the payment of the Tolls within his Dominions, the Officers of the Cuftoms are required to make a difinction between the Nations that have any Treaty with his Majefty, and those that have none; His Majefty had commanded him ( the faid Envoy ) to let the States know, That although the faid Articles are not new, but are to be found in the former Ordonnances published in the year 1671, and that fince the Publication of the new Ordonnance made in the month of May of the last year nothing has been innovated with regard to the Subjects of the States General, and that confequently his Majefty fees not what can have given them reafon to apprehend any Indovation for the Future; yer his Majelty, to shew the defire he has to maintain flways a good Correspondence with the States, and to take away all manner of Scruples, does affure then, That he will leave the Tolls which the Subjects of this State trading into his Dominions are obliged to pay in the lame itate, and on the fame foot, on which they have hitherto been, without charging their Trade with any new Imposition, hoping the States will on their fide correspond with this his Majeffies good Intention s And not only Reciprocally freat his Subjects with the fame Favor, but that they will likewith speedily perfect the Treaty of Commerce lately concluded at the Hughe,

Hague, April 25. The States of Holland and Weff-Friefland re-affembled the 23d instant, Prince Philip of Brandenburgh has received the Compliments of Condolgance upon the death of his Brother the Margrave Laune; He instends to flay here till towards the latter end of the next month, and then to return to Berlin. The Dutchefs Dowager of Naffam, and the Princefs of Simmercn, and the Princefs of Anhalt, went from hence this morning to Turnhout. The Duke de Croy, who arrived here the laft week from England, is preparing for his return to Hungary. The Envoy of Marocco, who has been fome time at Amflerdam, is expected here the next Week, to take his Leave of the States.
