And the Commissioners appointed by the said Letters Patents, are hereby Authorized and Impowered to dispose if such Collections in like manner as they have formerly done.

Whitehall, April 18. This day the following Address was presented to His Majesty, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Mijesty.

The Humble Address of several of Your Majesties Subjects who, by Your Majesties Bounty and Goodness, enjoy their Lives, forfeited by being in Arms against Your Majesty and Government.

H E great and undescroed Favour which we have received from Your Majesty being no less than Life, calls for the most Sincere and Unseigned Bhan! fulness, Especially when we consist how Astive we have been against Your Majesty, and how Unable we are to render You Services deserving such Princely Bounty; This had been Cause enough to have compelled us to Prostrate our selves at Your Majesties Feet with the Humblest and most Thanks, il Hearts, which we Truely do. But when we likewise call to Mind, That Your Majesty bath not onely permitted us to Live, but likewise, by Your Most Gracious Declaration, engaged Your Self to Protest us, and all the rest of Tour Subjects, in the Exercise of our Religion, and En-

journeme of all Properties, we cannot be Stant, b. t. from the abundance of our Heavy experts our Thankfulne's, and the Security we have in Thir his jesties Royal Promies 3. And a subscript K turn me can make for Your Lucompanie (5 of his grans out all Four Subjects, Hungy tender Your Affely, as is, our Duty; the Utmft of Services in Defence of Your Royal Person and Gomment.

Lemberg, March 25. We have certain advice that the Turks have put a Convoy of Provisions into Caminiee, and that they afterwards returned to Maldadvia, and having joined with 600 flighters come manded by two Murfa's, who, it's believed, came from Huniary, divided themselves in several Bodies; to make Incu sous into the Territor this Grown; One of these Parties plander with burnt 8 Villages belonging to the hing near statement, and carried away a great many Prisoners; Another took their march towards Volking & And a third was descated, by the Troops under the Command of the Sieur Laskie, many being killed, and the rest taken Prisoners, who have been brought hither, and assure us that the Cham has resolved to unite all his Forces to make Head against the Moscovica, who, they hear, make prodigious Preparations for the Campagne. They write from Wilna, that the Army of Lithuania will be much more numerous, and earlier in the Field this year than twas the last. The Court will remove the next week to Wire-som.

Copenhagen, March 29. There was Istely cast away not far from Elseneur, an English Vessel, laden at Newcastle with Goals, Lead, and other Merchandises; the Master (whose name was Medsford,) and all the Seamen, 12 in number perishing with the Ship; which Sir Gabriel Sylvius, His Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary at this Court having notice of, he immediately made application to the hing of Demma k, that the Goods which were saved, might be preserved for, the Owners, which he obtained, and accordingly part of the Lead, with the Cables and Ankors that had been taken up, was put into the hands of the English Consul, who by Sir Gabriel's direction, has employed People to fish for the rest, for the benefit of the Proprietors; for whose sake this Notice is given, that by their Agents they may apply themselves to Sir Gabriel Sylvius, or the English Consul at Elseneur, who will give them all requisite assistance.

Vienna, April 13. The Duke of Lorrain arrived here the 11th Instant from Insprucke, to assist at the Councils of War that are now held here, to prepare things for the opening of the Campagne. A great many Boats pass daily down the Danube with Provisions and Ammunition, to fill the Magazines in the Frontier places of Hungary.
