IO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

ADDRESSES.

The same regulations apply to the presentation of Addresses or Petitions.

A card containing a statement of the object of the Addresses or Petitions, with the names of the persons who are to present them, must be sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office two clear days before the Levee. Two other cards, containing similar information, are to be taken to the Levee, one to be delivered to The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to The Queen.

On these occasions no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The members of a Deputation, who have not previously attended Court, must be presented to The Queen.

"Hutchison Shoal, Moreton Bay."

Her Majesty's Ship Herald, Sir, Port Jackson, 15th October, 1859. I have the honour to acquaint your Excellency, for such notice as may be deemed necessary, of a shoal in the north-eastern approach of Moreton Bay, which—though not having at present less than 22 feet water over it—may come within the draft of heavy ships, and should be avoided by loaded coasters on account of its broken water when the 1½ knot E.S.E current sets against a strong easterly wind.

2. This nucleus of a danger—which I name "Hutchison Shoal," in compliment to Lieutenant John Hutchison, of this ship, whose zeal led to its development—is situated 2 miles N. \(\frac{3}{4}\) W. from Flinder's Rocks, when Cape Moreton Lighthouse bears N. \(\frac{1}{4}\) E., distant 5\(\frac{1}{2}\) miles, and the southern of the Glasshouse craigs bears W.

3. The lighthouse in line with the centre of Flinder's Rocks, and bearing S. \(\frac{3}{4}\) W.; leads \(\frac{1}{3}\) a mile outside this shoal; or, to ensure being inside, the lighthouse should not be brought southward of S. by E.; while to pass northward of it the Glasshouses should not bear westward of W. S. W.; but fishermen can find it, for a take of schnapper, by bringing Mount Tempest over the Yellow Sand Slip at North Point bearing S. \(\frac{3}{4}\) W.; and when the Glasshouses bear W. by S.

4. In pursuing this coast examination, on my way from the Torres' Straits Outer Route survey, I took opportunity for testing the position of the black buoy which I suggested as a guard for our Smith Rock of last year, in the south-eastern approach to Moreton Bay; and I found it laid down correctly, and "showing out" most satisfactorily.

I HAVE the honour to report, for such promulgation as your Excellency may deem fit, that, I

find the broken water, which from time to time has been noticed outside Breaksea Spit, to reveal on close examination a fearful danger, directly in the track of vessels trading to and from Port Curtis, and which will henceforth be known as Sandy Cape Shoal.

2. The danger consists of a coralline knowl with as little as nine feet water upon it, and is situated 3½ miles outside (east) of the easternmost elbow of Breaksea Spit, when the bright sand-slip on Sandy-Cape bears S.W. by S., distant 11½ miles.

3. The trend, nature, and distance of the coast feature admit of no clearing marks. All that can be recommended is to keep the breakers of Breaksea Spit as close aboard as 8 to 10 fathoms' water warrants, if desiring to pass within the shoal; or by night, to ensure passing it a mile outside, the soundings should not be less than 35 fathoms on approaching its latitude, which is 24° 36′ S. (intersected by longitude 153° 22′ E.), understanding that, at this season, the current was found to set steadily S.S.E. over the shoal, at the rate of 1 to 1¼ knots.
