Here are now at the Lido 1000 Foot and 900 Dragoons, which were Mustered there the 16th Instant. They will embark in few days on the Vessels that are to transport them to the Morea, to make room for the Cavalry that are expected from the Terra Firma, and the Troops of Hanouer and Hesse, which are likewise expected in few days. Colonel Mocenigo has with the Emperor's leave, made an agreement with the Senate to raise a Regiment of Horse in Croatia, for the Service of the Republick; And another Person of quality has undertaken to raise a Regiment of Foot in The Senate have Catalonia for the same Service. refolved to fend 1000 Foot to Dalmatia; We have an account from that Province, that the Turks, to the number of 12000 Men, had advanced with 6 pieces of Cannon and 2 Mortars to Sign, while another Body of 8000 moved towards Zara, with adefign to make an incursion into that Province; and that the Proveditore-General Cornaro, and Signior Zen, General of the Horse were thereupon drawing all the Troops they could together for the relief of Sign; the Garison of which place had in a Sally they made upon the Enemy, killed 120 of them, taken feveral prisoners, with 7 Colours, and nailed up their Cannon. The Letters from Constantinople of the 20th of February, of which you had some account in our last, tell us farther, That the Caimacan, to raise Money for the War, had fent to all the rich Musselmen, to require them to assist the Grand Signior according to their several circumstances, fixing at the same time the sums that were expected of them, by which means 6000 Purses had been already raised at Constanti-nople; and it's not doubted but the same method will be taken through the whole Ottoman Empire : That the Caimacan made likewise his utmost efforts to raile Men, And that a Bueangee having defired to be excused from being sent to the War, in regard his Education had not qualified him for that fort of Service, had after receiving 500 Drubs, been obliged to comply with the Grand Signior's Command; And that another who pretended to fuch extreme Poverty, that he was not able to provide any one part of his necessaries for the War, had been sent to the Gallies. And that Officers had been dispatche ed into all the Provinces, to hatten the Levies which the Bassa's have Orders to make within their re-

spective Governments. These Letters add, That the Caimacan had sent for the Greek Patriarch of Constantinople, and had obliged him to write to the Patriarch of Moscovy, to endeavour by his means, to divert the Czars from their resolution of entring into the War against the Grand Signior; for that the Turks, upon the first act of Hostility, committed by the Moscovite Forces, would revenge it upon all the Greeks within the Octoman Dominions. And that 5 Men of War were fitting at Constantinople to carry a reinforcement to Napoli di Malvassa, the strongest place which the Turks remain Masters of in the Morea.

Dantzicke, April 15. The Letters from Lemberg of the 2d Instant tell us, they had received advice by the way of Valadbia, that the Cham of Tartary l.ad, at the instance of the Grand Signior, notwithstanding the great need he has of his Troops to defend his own Countries against the Moscovites, resolved to send a considerable Body of Tartars, under the Command of Sultan Galga, to joyn the Ottoman Forces in Humgary the next Campagne; That Sultan Nuradin is to act with 20000 Tartars against the Poles, to give them a diversion by their incursions into the Frontier Provinces of that Kingdom; while the Cham with the rest of his Forces makes

Vienna, April 20. The Emperor has named the Count de Coneng sec Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, and the Count de Straetman Great Chalicellor of the Court, to confer with the Bishop of Primislia, who, after he has dispached his Affairs at this Court, will go to Rome and Venice, where he will appear with the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary from the Crown of Poland. The Moscovite Ambasfadors having finished their Negotiation with the Imperial Ministers are preparing for their departure; the two first have Orders to return to Mescon, and the other two to go to Venice, to confirm the League with the Republick.
