- LAVINGTON, WILTS.—Forthwith in the parish church of Lavington, in the county of Wilts, and on and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the parish churchyard, the Independent and Baptist Burial-grounds, except in existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner, and except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or bones.
- LEE, KENT.—Forthwith in the vaults and catacombs beneath Saint Margaret's Church, Lee, in the county of Kent, and that the entrance to the vaults be closed with brickwork :—That, with the exception of family vaults and graves, the burials in the Old and New Churchyards be restricted to the bodies of parishioners; and, with the same exception, that only one body be buried in each grave, and that no new grave be made except in unoccupied ground.
- STAMFORDHAM. Forthwith in the parish church, and on and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the parish churchyard, except in graves not less than five feet deep which can be opened without the exposure of bones and coffins.
- KINGSTON-ON-HULL.—Wholly on and after the first July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the burial-ground of the parish of *Holy Trinity*, in *Castle-street*.
- SAINT JOHN'S BERWICK, WILTS.—Forthwith beneath the parish church.
- GREAT CARFORD, DORSET. In the several churches and chapels within the parish, and in the churchyards of Parkstone and Longfleet and in the Independent Burial-ground, except so far as may be compatible with the observance of the Regulations for New Burial-grounds: and the churchyard of Parkstone to be drained, so that no water shall accumulate in any vault or grave, and an outfall for the drainage to be carried into the stream below the neighbouring wells.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-sixth day of June next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twenty-sixth day of June.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled II An Act to amend the Burial Acta," it is,

amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to order such acts to be done by, or under the directions of, the churchwardens, or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health ; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do, or cause to be done, all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish ; provided always, that no such representation should be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation should have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Cornewall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation had been duly given to the churchwardens, or other persons having the care of the vaults in the churchyard of SAINT JOHN ZACHARY, in the city of London, has made a representation, stating that he was of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the said vaults from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an order should be made for the adoption of the measures hereinafter set forth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of the vaults in the said churchyard of SAINT JOHN ZACHARY, do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures in respect of such vaults ; viz. :

1. That the coffins contained in the public vault in the said churchyard be laid down and covered with earth and powdered charcoal, and that the entrance be filled up with earth, and closed with brickwork.

2. That the work be effected under the superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the city of London, and that disinfectants be used whenever necessary.
