Genoua, April 22.

He two Gallies of this State which are to joyn the Pope's Squadron, failed from hence the 16th Instant for Civita Vecchia. The 20th arrived here a Durch Convoy, composed of Seven Merchant Ships and one man of War; They brought about 100 thousand Crowns for the account

of the Merchants of this place.

Venice, April 25. The 16th Instant a Ve sel arriwe had received of the Turks having Befieged Sign with the following particulars. That the Infidels were divided in two Budies, one of 12000 men, which was employed in the Siege, the other of 8000; who defigned to make an incursion into the Province of Zoga. That on the 9th of this Month 50d Turks advanced to possess themselves of some Outworks of the Town, which were fecured with Palifado's, but that the Befieged obliged them with the fire of their Muskets to retire with confiderable loss; That the Garifon was composed of 600 chosen Men, airhong whom were feveral Banditi of Naples That they defended themselves with great courage and had made several Sallies upon the Enemy, in which they had taken seven Colours, and nailed up two pieces of Cannon. That in the mean time Signior Cornaro, Proveditore General of Dalmaria affembled the Forces of that Province, and of Istria, with whom were to joyn the Morlaques, Commanded by the Chevalier Janco, for the relief of sign. And by Letters from Spalatro of the 19th Instant we are farther informed, that the Turks had made two Affaults upon the place, but were beaten off with great loss; That they had already lost 800 Men in the Siege, and among others, a Baffa that Com-manded the Cavalry, who was killed with a Cannon flot: And that General Cornuro had ap-pointed the Rendezvous of his Forees at Cliffa, where he had already drawn 10000 together; and that he intended, fo foon as the other Troops that were on their march had joyned him, to advance towards Sign. The Senate by the last Convoy that Sailed for the Morea, fent a Basin of Gold to the value of 6000 Ducats, as a Present to General Coning smarke, in consideration of his Services. The 17th Instant Signior Quintilianto Razzano and his Brother, were received by the Great Council, into the Body of the Nobility, they making each the 'infinal Present of 100000 Ducats...

Maxfeilles; May 2. This morning arrived here a French Bark from Argiers, the Patron reports, that a Sally Man of War having carried into that Port three French Barques, that Government had caused them to be secured with their Lading, with a promise of restoring them to the French Consul.

Moscow, March 27. The Preparations that are made on this fide for the War against the Turks and Tatears are very extraordinary. The Czars standing Forces are moving from all Parts; And besides these, the Governors of all the Frontier Provinces have Orders to raise the fourth Man of these that are fit to bear Arms within their respective Governments; And the Gentry, are commended to mount on Horseback, and to appear completely ar-

med at the General Rendezvous, Which is appointed on the Frontiers of the Crim Titian. About the middle of the last month 26 Regiments of Foot, called Strelitzen, which were quartered in and about this City, and several other Regiments of Hosseand Foot, to the number of 7,000 men, after having been mustered in the presence of the youngest Czar Puter Aewiwitz, marched strong hence under the Command of Lieutenant General All Seminobic; and the 27th of the same month, the General Kness Ghizen took his Leave of the Czars, and went with a great mumber of Boyars and Officers to put himself at the Head of these Forces, which have but lince joined near Stolitz by 17000 Volontiets; and 28000 Strelitzen. The Calmuque Tartans which are subject to the Czars surnish 24000; Those of Astracan 30000; The Collacks make a Body of 70000, under the Command of Kness Samulowitz; And in the whole it's reckoned the Czars will have above 400000 men in the Field this Summer, with a Train of Artillery of 400 pieces of Cahnon. We have advice that the Tartars have cut off 600 of our men who were sent to convoy 300 Wagons lated with Provisions.

Vienna, April 24. The Amballadors of Moftouy will have to morrow their last Conference with the Imperial Commissioners, after which they will take their Audience of Leave, the two first intending to return Home, and the other two to go to Venice. The Bishop of Primissia will likewise have his Audience of Leave in few days, having finished his Negotiation at this Court; He will go from hence to Venice, and afterwards to Rome, with the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary from the Crown of Poland. The Duke of Lorrain has daily Conferences with Prince Herman of Baden President of the Council of War, the Count de Staremberg Mareschal de Camp General, and the other Generals, to concert the Operations of the Campagne, of which there are various Discourses, but that which seems most probable is, that the first design of the Imperial Army-will be upon Alba Regulis, which place they may hope to make themselves Masters of, before the Turks can be in a condition to re-lieve it; And by the taking of it, they will be at Liberty to draw out greatest part of the Garisons of Comorra, Javarin, Gran, and Buda, to reinforce the Army, and the Convoys will be in no danger of being diffurbed by the Enemy, as they must be if the Imperialists leave so strong a Garison as that of Alba Regalis behind them. General Caraffa has sent hither the Letter from the Grand Vifier to Prince Herman of Baden, which the Aga, who we told you was come to Debrezen, was charg'd with: In it the Visier presses again for a Peace, and that a place of Conference may be appointed, and offers to deliver up Teckeley, if thereby an End may be put to the War; but, it's believed, the same Answer will be returned to this Letter that has been given upon the former Overtures of this kind. We have advice that the Croats of the Neighbors hood of Canifa having mounted on Horseback, upon the Notice they had that the Turks designed to put a Convoy of Provisions into that place, and marching with great diligence towards them, they met and defeated them not far from that place, and took all the Wagons they had with them; Twas a Party of the Garison of Canisa, which had been sent out to gather Provisions from the Neighbouring Villages, whom they likewise forced to furnish them with Wagons: And they were greatly furprized to fee themselves attacked by the Croats - of whose march they had not had the least News, and fled,

after having made a very weak Defence.

Bruffels, May 9. The Spanish Letters which we received yesterday tell us, that the Moors had besieged the Fort of Penon on the Coast of Africa, but that the Spaniards had from Gibraltar put some Men and Ammunition into the place, and that the Wice-Admiral Papachino had Orders to send some Ships to their Succor. They write from Vienna of the 27th past, That the Emperor had ratified the League with the Czars of Moscow, and that the Moscowice Ambassadors were to have their Audience of Leave the 28th of the last Month.

Hague, May 9. The States of Holland and Westfriesland met again the 7th Instant. The Deputies of Zealand had yesterday another Conserence with those of the States General. The Count d'Avaux, Ambassador of France, will part from hence the jeginning of the next week for Luxemburghs.

Paris, May 10. The King begun this day his Journey to Luxemburgh, and lies this night at Clayer, being accompanied with the Dauphin 3 but the Dauphiness continues at Versailles. Prince d'Izenghein died the 6th Instant at Versailles. The Duke of Mortemar parted from hence on Tuefday last for Toulon; His Squadron will be compofed of 7 Men of War, with which he he has, it's faid, Orders to fail to Cadiz, and from thence to pass over to the Coasts of Barbary. Thirty four Gallies are fitting out at Marseilles, of which, 15 under the Command of the Chevalier de Noailles, areto carry the Marquis de Lavardin, the King's Ambassador to Civita Vecchia; the rest are to cruise upon the Coasts to keep the Soldiers and Slaves in exercise.
